Monasteries in England.

After a suppression of three hundred years monastic life has revived again in England, and its spread is one of the most remarkable signs of the times.—
Under the spirit of religious toleration, the various ancient orders of monks—the Benedictines, Dominicans, Capuchins, Augustines, Cistercians and others—have established themselves in various parts of England, and have evinced the ancient aptitude of the Roman church for seeuring choice localities. One of the most noted of these modern English monasteries is that of Mt. St. Bernard, in Chamwood Forest, Leicestershire, It teries is that of Mt. St. Bernard, in Chamwood Forest, Leicestershire. It was begun in 1835, and for some time there were only five monks who lived on a little farm and tilled the adjacent land. In 1842 the present extensive abbey buildings were commenced. They are in the plain early English style, but with the church, cloister, chapter-house, refectory, dormitory, guest-house, havatory, kitchen, offices, etc., with massive walls and buttresses, long and narrow windows, high gables and roofs, with deeply-arched door-ways, the pile presents an imposing appearance. THE GREAT MANITOULIN. A subscriber writing to us from the Great Manitoulin Island says:—This Great Manitoulin Island says:—This Island is one of the healthiest places that I ever set my foot on, but it is very rough, mountains of lime stone and quartz rock being spread over the whole Island, and smaller rocks and stones abounding almost everywhere. Where the land is free from rock it is of a very superior quality. I never saw better wheat—both fall and spring—grown anywhere. Peas, oats and barley of the finest quality are also grown. The size and quality of the roots could not be beat in Canada. As for potatoes you would be astonished to see such heavy crops grown. I had over 200 bushels off very small piece of ground. I have been farming 32 years, and take it on the average, one year with another, I could not raise in Ontario over 15 bushels of spring wheat per acre. One of my neighbors here last seas on had 32½ bushels per acre, all clean grain and fit for market. I have now been over a good part of the Island, and think that on an average there are not more than 40 to 50 acres out of the 100 fit for cultivation. Myself and family own 1345 acres, about the half of which is sit for tillage. Most of the other half will make fair pasturage.

DEATH OF JOSEPH MAZZINI.

A despatch from Pisa, in Italy, an n ounces the death of Joseph Mazzini, the great Italian, Republican and Agitator. During his whole life Mazzini has laboured for the unity and independence of Italy under a Republican form of Government. When but a young man he was an active member of the Carbonari, a secret political Society, and for his connec tion with it he 'was arrested, tried, and condemned to exile. He took refuge in France, where he started a paper called Young Italy, and formed sociation under the same name both of which were devoted to the dissemination of Republican ideas. He was driven from France to Switzerland, and from thence to London where he remained till after the French Revolution in 1848. when Rome declared itself a Republic was elected a member of the Constituent Assembly, and took an active part in the struggle between the Republicans and the Pope's when the Republicans and the Pope's army. When the Roman Republic was destroyed by the aid of French bayonets, Mazzini fled to England, where he remained till 1857, when he organized an expedition to revolutionize Italy: This attempt also failed and he again returned to Irac.

Death in the Milk Pail.

Not long since Professor Lnwe, of Cornell University, observed a poeularity in the cream from the milk furnished by the milkman. It appeared to be ropy, and on subjecting it to an examination under a powerful miscroscope, it was found to contain a large number of living organisms in different stages of growth. Pushing his investigations further, the Professor called upon the milkman to enquire concerning the management and keeping of his cows. Here he found on looking over the premises, that the cows, for the lack of good, clean water—the season being unusually dry—were forced to slack their thirst in a stagnant pool located in a muddy swale. Taking specimens of this water and examining it under the microscope, the same class of organisms was found as those in the milk, It was now pretty evident where the cause of the trouble lay, but to make the matter more clear, specimens of blood were taken from the cows and examined under the microscope, when these were also found to contain the same class of organism. The animals, on applying the thermometer tests for determining health or disease, were found to be hot and feverish, thus showing that these living organisms, introduced through the medium of the filthy water, and taken into the circulation, by the power of repro-


