Largest Land Sale Ever Made to a Single Person.

On Friday last a formal sale was made by General Robt. E. Carr, President of the Kansas Pacific Railway, to George Grant, Esq., of London, England, of a large body of land, covering twenty-four square miles of territory, lying contiguous to the Kansas Pacific Railway, in Ellis county, Kansas.

Mr. Mowat's Seat.

As will be seen by a paragraph from the Woodstock Sentinel, Mr. Perry, the popular member for that constituency in the Ontario Legislature, has offered to resign in order to make way for the Hon. Mr. Mowat. Mr. Perry has done this unsolicited, and done it too with the cordial consent of his constituents, who feel proud to have the opportunity of electing the Premier of Ontario, and moreover a man of worth, weight and ability. We understand that several other representatives offered to resign their seats to make way for Mr. Mowat. In choosing North Oxford, he has pitched upon a constituency which is thoroughly Reform, and which will no doubt elect him by acclamation. The writ will at once be issued, and as it is almost certain there will be no opposition, the election will take place in good time to allow Mr. Mowat to take his seat at the opening of the House.

Editorial Items.

Dr. Miller, of Burford, lately returned from New Zealand, gives a most gloomy account of that distant Isle in a two column letter to the Globe. He says, take it all in all, Canada is the best country in the world. This Ontario Government hold frequent Cabinet meetings, and are working hard in the preparation of measures for the ensuing session. Everything will be ready for prompt despatch of business.

VICTORIA (Australia) is going to establish a compulsory education bill compelling all children between six and fifteen years old to attend school. All betting and gambling houses have ceased to exist, in accordance with a Parliamentary Act.

The accounts of the Province of Quebec have been distributed, and show that on the 30th of June last the Treasurer had in the Bank a surplus of \$659,035.33 realized since the inauguration of the Federal regime. For the year ending at the same date the receipts are declared to have been \$1,746,458.68, and the expenditure \$1,725,685.23, thus showing a surplus for the year of \$20,773.45.

At 9:10 on Friday morning the Governor General received the following telegraphic message, which was dated November 15, 6.20, Australian time: "Telegraph banquet held; desire health of the Queen and union of the Empire. Signed, Governor of Adelaide." At 11:10 the following telegraphic message was sent in reply: "Canada re-echoes Australia's toast—'The Queen and the United Empire'—Dufferin." Congratulatory messages were also exchanged the same day between the Mayors of Adelaide and New York, upon the completion of telegraphic communication.

The name of William Smith, Deputy Minister of Marine and Fisheries, and a protege of Hon. Peter Mitchell, has been freely used in Ottawa within the past few days as the forthcoming Governor of Manitoba.

We believe there is no doubt that the Hon. Mr. Howe is to be made Governor of Nova Scotia, and that the Hon. Mr. Archibald is to fill his place in the Cabinet.

North Oxford—A Seat for Mr. Mowat.

It affords us no ordinary degree of pleasure to announce this morning, that from the many constituencies placed at the disposal of Mr. Mowat since his return to political life as Premier of Ontario, he has selected North Oxford as his seat, Mr. Perry having, in the most handsome manner possible, and with the full concurrence of his friends, consented to resign in order to make way for him. This announcement will, we are assured, be received with the most cordial satisfaction by all classes of electors throughout the county. The honor and advantage of being represented in Parliament by a minister of the Crown, especially the first minister—and that too of so popular an administration as the present Ontario Government—aside from his unexceptionable political record, are so apparent, as to ensure for Mr. Mowat the hearty support alike of Reformers and Conservatives in the County of Oxford. His election by acclamation in a few days, will verify the truth of our assertion. Meanwhile, we shall only say that the patriotic action of Mr. Perry in the matter cannot soon be forgotten by his constituents. In the enjoyment of their entire confidence, having but a few months since received their unanimous verdict of approval of his Parliamentary course as their representative, and with every prospect of an indefinite continuance of that confidence, he has, upon the first opportunity which presented itself of securing for his constituency the services of a Cabinet Minister, with a fealty and magnanimity but seldom exhibited by public men, sunk all personal ambition and placed his resignation at the disposal of his friends. We have little fear that such patriotic conduct will fail to receive fitting recognition at the hands of the people of the County of Oxford. Next week, we shall probably be able to announce the day of nomination.

It is stated that the Executive Council for the Northwest Territory is to be appointed under the provisions of the act passed in 1871; it will be composed of seven persons, five English and two French, and that Mr. Donald A. Smith, and other well known representative men, will be included on the Board.

There is a rumour in existence to the effect that Col. Cumberland will lead the Opposition in the Ontario Legislature next session.

COLLISION ON THE GRAND TRUNK.—A collision occurred on the G. T. R. on Saturday between Weston and Carleton. The downward bound train was a freight, loaded in part with live hogs; the train which met this one consisted of empty box cars. Both engines were disabled, two or three of the cars were wrecked and a number of the porcine passengers were killed and wounded. One car rolled down the embankment on to the high road. Fortunately none of the men on either train were hurt. The track was not cleared of the wreck until Sunday morning, and an exchange of passengers had to be made between the mixed train going out and the express coming in on Saturday evening.



**SETTLEMENT OF ST. JOSEPH'S ISLAND.**  
We are glad to learn that a movement is on foot for the settlement of St. Joseph's Island. This most desirable and praiseworthy object is to be accomplished by a joint stock company with a capital of \$500,000, who propose to place upon the island no less than 300 families selected from the best agricultural districts of Great Britain. The Ontario Government have agreed to give the proposed company a franchise to the island under certain restrictions, for the purpose of colonization, and the company bind themselves to maintain 300 families on this island for not less than eighteen months. Those who have explored St. Joseph Island say that a large portion of the land is of the very best quality; and as it lies in the direct route between Ontario and the North-west, there is no doubt but it will become exceedingly valuable. We hope the proposed scheme will be speedily brought to a satisfactory consummation.—*Collingwood Bulletin.*

Well, now, here is a religious sect sprung up in London which, if it continues and increases, will certainly make some noise in the world. The real name of it has not been reported to us, but the ungody style is "The Howling Repentants." The main business of the votaries is to howl. At stated periods during the day they elevate their voices, and twice during the night they get out of bed and howl. Divine services they conduct in the open air, probably for fear of bringing down the roof. We mourn to say that the police are hard upon these devotees, and do often conduct them to the station-houses, where, if they go on with the exercises, they are probably gagged.

Tea importers are beginning to appreciate the advantages offered by the Suez Canal route; half a dozen steamers have taken cargoes for New York by this route during the present season. No better proof of the great public importance of this work could be given than the fact that New York importers can bring goods cheaper by it than by the western or overland route.

Some Scotch miners at Wishaw recently did a remarkable thing. They voluntarily refused an offered advance of a shilling a day in their wages, on the ground that the coal masters had raised the price of coal seven shillings per ton. The men were unwilling to lie under the imputation of having occasioned this rise, and so, in a public meeting, requested the masters to "take the last advance of the price of coal, and take back the shilling."
