Mr. McGowan, the newly elected member for the North Riding, gave the Tories on Friday night a specimen of his independence which some of them will by no means relish. The chief question before the Legislature on that day was Mr. Mowat's bill respecting the incorporation of Benevolent, Provident, and other Societies. When the Bill came up Societies. When the Bill came up for the third reading, Mr. Merrick moved the aix months' hoist. A long debate followed, during which the Opposition did their best to inthe Opposition did their best to influence the House against the measure. Mr. M. C. Cameron went so far as to say that the course adopted by the Government in bringing in this bill was an affront to the Orangemen of the Province. Although the Opposition exerted all their influence to defeat the bill, the third reading was carried by a majority of 12 in a thin House, 24 voting for the six months' hoist, and 36 against. Mr. McGowan voted with the Government for the third reading. We are told that Messrs. Cameron and Lauder looked daggers at the youthful legislator when he recorded his vote, and immediately after walked him off to the smoking room, where no doubt they gave him a suitable lecture for daring to exercise his own judgment, and vote contrary to the wishes of his chiefs and the party with which he is associated. Mr. McGowan deserves credit for his independence, and his course on this question tends to show that he will not be the unthinking tool of the Tories. Meantime we commend his vote to the attention of the Orangemen in the Riding, especially those in Amaranth and Maryboro' who gave him such a large vote.

The New Marriage Law.

A Government Bill is now before the Ontario Legislature in reference

The first clause provides that all marriages which have before the passing of the Act been celebrated in Uping of the Act been celebrated in Upper Canada, by any person legally authorized to marry, between persons not under any legal disqualification for matrimony, are declared to be lawful and valid so far as respects all matters within the jurisdiction of the Ontario Legislature, provided that the parties lived together as husband and wife, and that the validity of the marriage has not hitherto been questioned in any law suit. The effect of this will be to prevent vexatious actions being brought in the courts to declare a marriage invalid and the offspring of it illegitimate merely because there may have been some informality in the license, the banns, or the ceremony.

In the case of marriage by banns, the new Act provides that it is only necessary for the parties to he called in church once, instead of three times, but one of the parties must have lived at least fifteen days in the municipality where the banns are published. This will tend to prevent clandesting marriages, as under the old act banns might be, and often were, published far away from the evidence of the intending man and wife, in a place where they were entirely unknown.

A certificate from the Provincial Secretary may be substituted for the present Governor's license; but before any certificate or heense is granted, one of the parties to the instended marriage shall personally make oath that he or she believes that there is no affinity, consanguinity, precontract, or other lawful or legal impediment to the marriage; and that one of the parties has for the preceding lifteen days had his or her usual place of abode within the municipality where the marriage is to be solemnized; and, in case either of them is under the age of twenty one, that the consent of the parent or guardian has been obtained. If there is no parent or guardian, an eath to this effect must be taken. It will be seen that the residence clause; comes in here again. The boad formerly required is abolished.

Sin,—I see by the newspapers that an American "agent" has come to this country to organize "granges" amoung our farmers. Already one has been formed in the Township of Westminster, and it is understood that an effort is about to be made in the same direction all over this country.

Having attended several of the most important "Grange" meetings held in the State of Illinois during my brief sojourn in Chicago early in last year, I am able to speak "from the book" in regard to the movement, and beg respectfully to call your attention and the view of stating at least two serious objections to our having anything to do with it.

Orange Societies incorporated, he would be sorry to see them avail of the provisions of this Bill.

The Attorney-General pointed out that the Bill before the House gave really greater advantages to the Orange Societies than their own proposed Bills, and admitted of the incorporation of their local lodges, nor did he see any reason for excluding the latter from that privilege. In England there was no limit to the value of land an incorporated society could hold for its own use, but he had imposed as a limit an annual value of \$5.000. He did not suppose any one would advise the Orange Societies not to avail of the general Act except to make a little political capital by so doing. He believed the true friends of the Orangemen sat on those (the Ministerial) benches, and that hon, gentlemen opposite only cared for them for political purposes.

Mr. Deacon did not desire to obtain incorporation for the Orange Societies at the cost of such a measure as the one under discussion.

Mr. Robinson had worked as hard as anybody for the Orange Association, but would not, like the dog in the manger, beguage to there sthe privileges that he claimed for himself and his friends. He should support the Bill.

Mr. D'Arcy Boulton opposed the Bill in the interest of the Orangemen.

Mr. M. C. Cameron objected to giving extensive powers to bodies of men whose objects were not understood. The law now allowed charitable societies to be incorporated, and they should come to the Legislature for their Acts.

Mr. Richards denounced the Bill as an innovation upon liberal principles. He predicted all sorts of societies, political and others, would seek incorporation under the Bill, and regarded this eventuality as highly dangerous.

Mr Lander, in his usual personal style, attacked the Government, and opposed the Bill.

The amendment was lost, by yeas 24, and the Bill read a third time
