EGVPT OFFENDED AT ENGLAND

The Khedive Wants to Know What is to be Done About the Soudan.

CAIRO, Jan. 4 .- The relations between England and Egypt are strained. The government of Egypt has sent a note to Great Britain declaring that the present state of things in Egypt cannot continue, and asking that a final decision be given upon the Soudan question. If England refuses assistance the khedive and ministry have determined to abandon Eastern Sou-

have determined to abandon Eastern Sou-dan to Turkey and to reduce the tribute paid to the porte The Egyptian troops would then be concentrated to Egypt proper, thus giving a force of 15,000 men to protect the frontier without the aid of England, Sir Evly Baring thinks 15,000 men would be sufficient for that service. Besides the khedive the English officials have agreed to a reduction in their salaries, and it is expected that the cabinet minis-ters will do likewise. The saving thus ef-fected is estimated at £448,000. It is stated that the European powers having interests in Egypt are about to ad-dress England asking what measures she intends to adopt for the protection of their respective subjects in Egypt.
