DANGERS TO WORKINGMEN

DISCUSSED BY THE TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL

Election of Officers—Sympathy With the Sufferers—Investigation by Government—Demanded—Other Business.

The regular and first meeting for January 1884, was held last evening, Mr. March, the president, in the chair.

Mr. O'Donoghue for the delegates to the labor congress gave a brief report of the business done thereat.

A communication from the semi-centennial secretary asking that a deputation from that body be heard before the council was read.
