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Our Finance Minister Among the Curtains.

The appearance of the Honorable Minister of Finance at the Curtains' Feast, Sheffield, where he responded to the toast, "The Colonies," is a highly interesting and welcome event.

The Youngest in the Largest Baptist Church in the West.
