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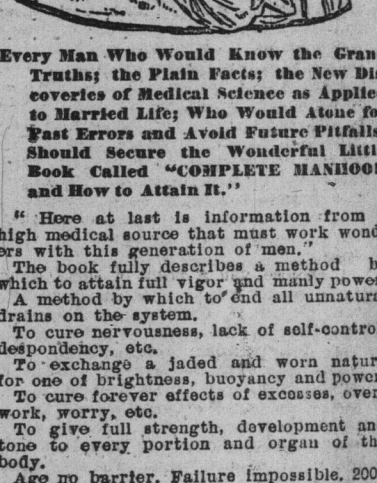

KNOX COLLEGE FACULTIES. General Assembly Decides Not to Make an Appointment for a Year. London, June 19.—Dr. Ward of Montreal, the choice of the Assembly as the successor to Dr. Reid, the venerable clerk and agent of the church, asked leave to give the matter mature and deliberate consideration, and the assembly granted his request.

Overtures were read from the Presbytery of London and Toronto respecting the appointment of a professor to the vacant chair of Old Testament exegesis and apologetics at Knox College. The former prayed for a rearrangement of the chairs, so that only cognate subjects should constitute the normal professional chairs, and the latter asked for a year's delay in the appointment.

Dr. Lyle, Hamilton, moved that the overture be set aside and that the Assembly confirm the selection of the College Board in naming Dr. Macintosh, Philadelphia, for the position. The matter was further discussed and several amendments proposed, when Principal Caven spoke. He took the first public opportunity of stating that the lecturers who had temporarily filled the chair for the past year, Messrs. Ramsay and Duncan, had done their work exceedingly well. He admitted that the staff would be strengthened by an additional professor, that he knew nothing unfavorable of Prof. Macintosh, and that in the opinion of six-sevenths of the alumni he would greatly hesitate to complete the appointment at the present time.

An amendment to Dr. Cochran's allowing the College Board to rearrange the matter of an advantageous rearrangement of chairs and delaying the appointment until next Assembly was carried.

East Toronto. A meeting was held at the Swanwick-avenue Presbyterian Church last evening to elect church managers and trustees in the place of Messrs. J. Loudon, W. H. Mason and J. Alexander, who recently withdrew to establish a congregation at Key Beach. Those present for managers were: T. Marshall, Gilbert, and Devar. Messrs. Robert Brown and Geo. Bell were elected trustees.

J. Monaghan, before Magistrate Richardson with the charge against him of being drunk and disorderly, was fined \$1 and costs. The magistrate allowed him a week in which to meet it.

Messrs. Wilkinson, Kingston-road, and William Taylor, John-street, were both in court last evening on the charge of letting a call and a mare run at large. The latter owner got off with costs, but the former had to face a dollar and costs. Mr. Wilkinson retorted that he hadn't come there to be robbed but to secure justice, whereupon Magistrate Richardson warned him that a repetition of his remark would mean another dollar.

Sunday next will be the last Sunday of Rev. Mr. Langford's charge at the Hope Methodist Church, East Toronto. His place will be taken by the Rev. J. D. Fitzpatrick, formerly of Scarborough, who is ship, but who has been lately living in the city of Toronto, pursuing his college course at Victoria University. Mr. Fitzpatrick has had three years' experience in preaching in the Midlands and gave the work up to take his degree. Mr. Langford goes to Dundalk.

The R.Y.P.L. give an entertainment at the Kenilworth-avenue Baptist Church this evening.

There is a considerable amount of feeling on the Island in reference to the cyclist residents riding their wheels on the sidewalks, which some parties think is not only exceedingly inconvenient for pedestrians, but also dangerous. They are anxious that the by-law regarding bicycles and sidewalks should be enforced on the Island as in other parts of the city, and to that end a petition has been signed and forwarded to the Police Commissioners for their action. The decision of the Police Commissioners is being awaited with interest.
