He later took a definite stand for the christian life and is now a member of the church and an active worker in the Young Men's Bible Class. Another young man from a distant point was visited by a Key-man and as a result the young man, as well as his father and mother, were united with the church. Thousands of these names are secured from Immigration Secretaries and from Key-men in municipalities throughout the Province from time to time. This is a good work and one in which every right-minded man should be interested.

Lignite for Coal

Ontario, with its large deposits of lignite, is specially interested in a report by Frank A. Herald recently issued by the United States Geological Survey. Lignite, it appears, is being used by the United States reclamation service for the generation of electricity, which is conveyed over cable lines to Buford, where electrically operated pumps are used to lift water to an extensive irrigation system operating in the Missouri River valley. Lignite, it is said, appears to be well adapted to this work and can be cheaply mined. It serves furnaces equally well, whether these are fed by hand or stoked automatically. The main point is that a novice handling it usually meets with difficulty, and is apt to condemn it without realizing that the method, not the fuel, is at fault.

Systematic tests have shown that lignite, when properly handled, is thoroughly satisfactory when boilers and fire boxes are properly constructed and the fires correctly fed and controlled. When these requirements are met it is claimed that lignite produces results superior to those obtained by the use of ordinary coal. Not only this, but lignite holds valuable possibilities for use in producer-gas plants and in the making of briquettes. Those who have been experimenting with lignite believe that it can be made successful as a business proposition and the value of this to Ontario can hardly be overestimated. The province has suffered from lack of coal deposits, and if a means can be devised to make lignite available for domestic

So irrefutable are the reasons advanced for spelling reform that no real counter-argument is attempted. What is advanced is largely based on prejudice, arising from ideas imbibed before reason began to operate. Ignorance, too, lies at the root of much of the opposition offered to a revival of the existing system, which only became stereotyped at a comparatively late period, and then under erroneous conceptions of the origin and affiliations of the English language.

No one who studies the question impartially, but must be convinced that the facts and the weight of argument are wholly on the side of the reformers. The judgment of Viscount Bryce, better known as Professor James Bryce, late British ambassador to the United States, must be taken as that of a man accustomed to estimate the relative value of educational methods. His statement is, therefore, worth special attention, when he declared that simplified spelling would be worth millions to British trade as a time-saving business proposition. Why should children be laboriously taught and be compelled to waste their time in learning how to spell individual words of identical sound, but different collection of letters, when

the adoption of a system representing each sound by one symbol would at once remove every difficulty?

Teachers everywhere not only recognize, but are individually up against the present obstacle created by an absolutely indefensible and really artificial system of spelling English words. A favorite defence is that the spelling indicates the origin and derivation of the word. This, in most cases, is not only erroneous, but misleading. The English language has been carried over the world, but what holds back its expansion is the difficulty foreigners find in mastering its endless intricacies. Structurally it is logical and simple, but its individual words are too often stumbling blocks to the child and to the foreigner. The simplification of English spelling should appeal to every imperialist as a very practical way of making English the link between nation and nation.—Toronto World.

Beware of Canned Goods

"Beware of canned goods and foods put up in packages that have been kept for too long a time. During the past two weeks the Chief Inspector of Foods in the Medical Health Department on two occasions has found pork and beans which had been canned over eight years ago. At the same time he found fermented canned strawberries, and on investigation discovered that they had been purchased by the dealer over two years ago. Inspectors frequently find that this class of goods is often held, either by the canners, the wholesale or retail merchants, for very long periods." Dr. Hastings declares in the March Bulletin of the Health Department. The department at Ottawa with a view to obtaining legislation "requiring cans and packages for all goods to contain the date stamped on the bottom and tops of tins, and blown in the glass of bottles and jars, of the year at least that they were canned."

BANKERS AID RURAL LIFE.

State and Federal Help Urged in This Direction.

Resolutions providing for changes in the conditions of rural life in this country, which it was stated would decrease the burdens and increase the opportunities of the farmer and his family, were adopted at the third annual meeting of the committee of agricultural development and education of the American Bankers' association.

Vocational training in the public schools, plans to make the marketing of farm products easier and more profitable and federal aid to make farm demonstration work more general throughout the country were among the things urged.


The resolutions in part follow:

"Our committee, being especially concerned with agriculture and instruction in that line in the country schools, realizes that it needs and must have the largest measure of aid to the end that the country boys and girls may be placed on an equal footing with those in town. Therefore we urge both state and federal aid in this direction."

"As farm demonstration work through local or country demonstrators has proved to be the most practical and effective means of improving farming methods and as the government has contributed thousands of dollars toward such work in certain states and little or nothing in others, we indorse and earnestly urge legislation on the part of congress that will provide generous federal aid in all the states for such work."

An Up to Date Gate.

The frame of this gate is made from boards six inches wide and an inch thick. Of course the gate frame is cut to any size the maker desires. One brace is placed corner ways across between the frames. Field fencing is used for the body of the gate. It is

cut the right size with wire nippers and attached to the frame with small staples. The gate is suspended from a long pole set solid in the ground. To make this post solid set it in concrete. The gate is fastened to the pole with large hinges, and a wire cable or small chain holds the weight of the gate up to the top of the pole.

WINTER FEED FOR FOWLS.

An ample as well as a varied supply of green feed to hens during the winter is important for the health of the fowls. Its value does not lie in the amount of nutriment it contains, but as an agent in digestion. Fowls eat more when fed green food than otherwise. Vegetables induce increased eating, hence increased egg production.

Nearly all the common vegetables are relished by fowls, and they should be fed at regular intervals. Mangels are easy to raise and keep well. Cabbage is a good food; the hens like it, and it does not flavor the egg. Turnips are an excellent vegetable for fowls when grown right, stored and cooked. Rape is an excellent green food to plant in the runs. Potatoes are good only when boiled. As a rule, they are too expensive to feed to poultry. Onions, when they can be had, are an excellent feed and, like lettuce, are excellent for chicks. Silage may be used, provided that only a small quantity is fed at first until the hens become thoroughly accustomed to it.



RURAL ORGANIZATION.

That rural life should be organized and can be organized is clear. Various agencies are definitely attacking its intellectual side. We are effectively studying rural physical improvements, especially good roads. The country roads are prerequisites for many important rural undertakings. They are prerequisites for better marketing, for better schools, for comfortable living and for the promotion of social life.

There is obvious need of organization for sanitary purposes and for social development. Whether all these shall come through definite attack of private or public agencies or as byproducts makes no difference; they must come. We can no longer entertain the notion that rural life shall remain isolated, disjointed and unorganized. Its organization is a national, economic and social necessity. It is more difficult to organize a scattered rural population than a concentrated one, but the great need is to give the rural population at least approximately the primary advantages which the town enjoys.

The town is organization, and because of its organization and of its consequent advantages it has tended to attract to it the most ambitious youth of the country. The task of rural organization is difficult, but as the greatest educator of America has said, "The difficulty of a task constitutes no reason for declining it." And in this way lies the largest promise for national upbuilding and stability—David F. Houston, Secretary of Agriculture.

Canada's Mineral Production

According to the preliminary report on the mineral production of Canada for the calendar year of 1913 issued by the Dominion Department of Mines, its value showed an increase of close on \$9,000,000 over that of the previous year. Only two items, those of copper and silver, showed comparatively small decreases. In others, particularly gold, pig iron and nickel, substantial advances were made. Ontario again returned the largest output, valued at \$58,697,602 equal to over 40 per cent. of the total for the Dominion, and a slightly higher proportion than that of 1912. The leading feature of last year was the large increase in the production of gold from the Porcupine district of the province.

One of the ways by which Canadian industrial expansion has been retarded is undoubtedly that due to the proximity of a country much further advanced in manufacturing development. When that happens the younger community is apt to become a mere producer of raw material for its neighbor and pays a double toll when it later imports the finished article. The Dominion has borrowed largely and had to do this in order to open up its vast resources of tilth and mineral deposits. It has now reached the stage when it must encourage the growth of the industries which are native to its resources.



Fatal Accident at Wyoming

Miss Goodhand Instantly Killed by G. T. R. Special

While crossing the G. T. R. tracks at Wyoming on Wednesday evening, April 8th, Miss Janet Goodhand was struck by the engine of a special emigrant train and instantly killed. She was thrown over 100 feet and had both legs and one arm broken and was badly cut and bruised on the body and face.

Miss Goodhand had just visited her sister, Mrs. Hiram Barber, and was returning to the house of Mrs. Wm. Hyke, where she made her home, when the accident happened. Deceased was near-sighted and deaf and did not notice the approach of the train. Barber, Wyoming; Mrs. James McNaughton, 4th line Warwick, and Mrs. Donald Wells, East Williams. The funeral took place on Monday to the Wyoming cemetery and was largely attended.

Strathroy, April 13.—Herbert G. Boyd, aged 15, was accidentally killed at 5 o'clock this evening by his eight-year-old brother, Charles, while the boys were playing with a shot gun.

The lads were visiting with their uncle, Charles Sifton, who resides in Mosa Township, eight miles west of here, and while playing about the barn with some other boys found the shot gun. They were examining it when it suddenly went off, the charge tearing a great hole in young Boyd's right shoulder. He died in about ten minutes. One of the Sifton boys ran to the house and Dr. McCabe, of Strathroy, was called. Mr. Sifton was away on business when the accident happened.
