NOTES ON CANADIAN STAMPS

The 1868 issue, except the half cent black have all been found on water-marked paper. It is not a government watermark, but probably the maker's name. The fifteen cent violet is the rarest.

It is stated that some two cent vermillion registered stamps were in a safe somewhere in Nova Scotia. Burglars blew it open, and the powdersmoke caused the stamps to turn brown. Hence two cent brown registers.

The 7½d and 10d. stamps, are found in three varieties. The difference is in the size of the oval.

A retired army general who has spent most of his life in India, has taken up his abode in England. He is a stamp crank, and is very anxious to obtain a 9 penny Natal, 1857. Mrs. Croker has evidently heard of the Tapling Collection, as she mentions it, in an off-hand

way. Of course there is the usual amount of love, but we can stand it, at least those who have not found marriage a failure. The question is—Is Mrs. Croker a philatelist?

The official circular of the American Philatelic Association, for Dec. is at hand. We see by the Secretary's report that there is a membership of 577 and over 35 applications. Truly if this keeps up, the A P. A. will leave the famous Dresden Society in the rear.

AFGHAN POSTAGE STAMPS

The collectors of stamps may like to know that Ameer Abdur Rahman has had three issues of stamps When he first came to the throne he had dies struck for two postage stamps, both round in shape and of a dull red colour. One of these was valued at one abasi, or four annas, and the other two abasis; the former was used on letters weighing one miskal, or half the weight of a Cabuli rupee. The latter carried a letter up to two miskals. The inscription on these stamps is "Darus Sultaneh Cabul" on the margin, and the price is in the middle. Three years ago a small black oblong stamp, about an inch long, valued at one abasi, was issued. This was merely inscribed "Masul Kagaz Dak Khana Dowlat-i-Afghanistan fi miskal ek abasi." This has now been superseded by a much larger red oblong stamp, which bears the same words, but has in addition a mosque and two flags

The report of the superintendent of the railway mail service for the past four years shows that the percentage of killed and injured in railway accidents is pretty high among the postal clerks There were 34 killed and 553 injured.

SEVEN YEARS IN PENITENTIARY.

A large audience gathered in the Court of General Sessions on Saturday morning, December 16th, in anticipation of sentence being pronounced upon those prisoners who had been convicted during the present sitting of the court. The principal interest centred round the convicts Charlie Jacobs and Charles Baker, alias King, the Kettleby Post office robbers, as it was generally understood the serious nature of the offence, and the bad records of the offenders would bring upon them heavy punishment When asked what they had to say before sentence was passed, Jacobs admitted his guilt, and declared he alone was to blame, alleging that his companion was innocent. Judge McDougall evidently accepted the first part of his statement as correct, and gave him seven years in Kingston Penitentiary, but he declined to place much credence in the alleged innocency of Baker, to whom he awarded three years in the same institution.

USING OLD STAMPS.

Flesherton, Dec. 15.—Deputy P. O. Inspector James Henderson, of Barrie, had John Simpson, of Osprey, near Maxwell, before John W. Armstrong, J.P., of Flesherton, on a charge of using old postage stamps the second time. He pleaded guilty, and was fined \$10 and costs.
