Reports relating to expenditures for charity, from the Town of Lindsay, and the Villages of Bobcaygeon, Woodville and Omemee, respectively.

From the Prisoners' Aid Association, Toronto, respecting its work and objects.

From the Clerk of the County of Hastings, asking co-operation in petitioning the Legislature to reduce the fees of officials under its control.

From the Clerk of the County of Frontenac, enclosing petition to the Legislative Assembly, asking that power be given to County Councils to appoint all officials whose salaries are paid by the Counties.

From the Clerk of the County of Carleton, asking co-operation in seeking extended powers for Township Councils in certain matters.

From the Clerk of the County of Grey, asking co-operation in petitioning the House of Commons and the Legislative Assembly for legislation reducing passenger fares on railways.

From the Clerk of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry, enclosing petition to the Legislative Assembly for an Act to reduce the number of members of County Councils.

From the Canadian Institute, asking the Council to grant rewards for the collection of historical data, to be used in compiling a history of the County.

From Alan McDougall, Esquire, C.E., calling attention to a proposed convention on road-making.

On motion of Mr. Kylie, seconded by Mr. Crandell, the before mentioned documents were referred to the committees to which they respectively belong.

The Warden informed the Council that the term had expired for which a settlement had been made with the Board of Education, Lindsay, for maintenance of county pupils at the Collegiate Institute.

On motion of Mr. Lithgow, seconded by Mr. Kelly, the question was referred to the Standing Committee on Education.

Moved by Mr. Johnston, seconded by Mr. Bryans, that the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment be instructed to consider the advisability of making the usual charity grants, to be applied towards relieving distress existing in the municipalities hereinafter named, viz:—To the Town of Lindsay, \$200.00; Village of Fenelon Falls, \$25.00; Omemee, \$25.00; Woodville, \$25.00; and Bobcaygeon, \$25.00.—Carried.

Moved by Dr. Cornwall, seconded by Mr. Ferguson, that the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment be requested to recommend, if they see fit, the following grants to the various Mechanics' Institutes in this County, for the current year:—To Lindsay, \$100.00; Fenelon Falls, Bobcaygeon, Manilla, Coboconk, Omemee and Woodville, \$50.00 each.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Lithgow, seconded by Mr. Shaver, that the Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment be instructed to consider the advisability of granting the sum of \$25.00, each, to the East and West Victoria Farmers' Institute.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Alton, seconded by Mr. Thompson, that the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges be instructed to consider the advisability of making the usual grants of \$100.00 to each of the several Townships north of the second range.—Carried.

On motion of Mr. Walker, seconded by Mr. Bryans, By-Law No. —, to appoint an Auditor of County Accounts and to con-

firm the appointment of an Auditor nominated by the Warden, was received and read a first time, and

The Council went into committee thereon,

Mr. Crandell in the chair.

Committee rose and reported the second reading of the By-Law without amendment.

By-Law read a third time and passed by a two-thirds vote, and signed by the Warden and sealed.

On motion of Mr. Bryans, seconded by Mr. Walker, By-Law No. —, to appoint Auditors to audit all accounts against the County of Victoria for the Administration of Justice within the County of Victoria, was received and read a first time, and

The Council went into committee thereon,

Mr. Johnston in the chair.

Committee rose and reported the second reading of the By-Law without amendment.

By-Law read a third time and passed by a two-thirds vote, and signed by the Warden and sealed.

On motion of Mr. Lownsbrough, a deputation from the South Riding Agricultural Society, composed of Col. Deacon, Messrs. Thos. Beall, Thos. Connolly and Jos. Rickaby, addressed the Council relative to a proposed visit of His Excellency the Governor-General and Lady Aberdeen to the Central Exhibition in the fall of 1894.

On motion of Mr. Lownsbrough, seconded by Mr. Shaver, the second report of the Special Legislative Committee, was received and read, and

The Council went into committee thereon,

Mr. Switzer in the chair.

Committee rose and reported the report with amendments.

Report received and adopted as amended.

Moved by Mr. Bailey, seconded by Mr. Alton, that the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges be instructed to consider the advisability of recommending that Joseph Thompson, Esquire, Reeve of Dalton, be paid the balance of his account for time spent in building Johnston's Bridge.—Carried.

On motion of Mr. Walker, Council adjourned until 10 o'clock to-morrow.

The Council went into committee thereon,

Mr. J. McFarland in the chair.

Committee rose and reported the report without amendment.

Report received and adopted.

On motion of Dr. Wood, seconded by Mr. Laidlaw, Rule 45 was temporarily suspended to allow the presentation of a petition.

Dr. Wood presented the petition of Alexander Matheson, and 26 others, praying that a grant be made for the improvement of the boundary between the Township of Eldon, in the County of Victoria, and the Townships of Mara and Thorah, in the County of Ontario.

The petition was read.

Petition referred to the Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges.

On motion of Mr. Crandell, seconded by Mr. Kylie, the report of the Standing Committee on County Property was received and read, and

The Council went into committee thereon,

Mr. Morrison in the chair.

Committee rose and reported the report without amendment.

Report received and adopted.

Mr. Kylie gave notice that to-morrow he will introduce a petition to the Governments of Canada and Ontario for improvements on our inland waters

Moved by Dr. Wood, seconded by Mr. Walker, and unanimously resolved, that in the inscrutable wisdom of Providence, this County has been deprived by death of one of its most useful citizens—Arthur McQuade, Esquire, of the Township of Emily, —for many years a respected member of this Council. GENTLEMEN :—

Your committee, in compliance with your instructions given at the November session, have further considered the provisions of the bill for the purpose of amending the Assessment Act.

Your committee recommend that the attention of the Legislative Assembly be directed to the provisions of the bill relating to the exemption from taxation of machinery used for manufacturing purposes. It is evident that the value of assessable property in cities, towns and villages will thereby be reduced, and the question arises, Will the increase that must necessarily be made on property, other than manufactories, to make up the loss resulting from the exemptions, bear unequally on other classes of ratepayers than manufacturers?

Taking the provisions of the bill as a whole, your committee cannot but commend them as a desirable step towards clearing away many of the difficulties and inequalities that now exist in connection with the assessment of personal property.

 REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND ASSESSMENT.

(ADOPTED 27TH JANUARY, 1894.)

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria :

GENTLEMEN :—

Your committee have examined the Treasurer's statement of current liabilities and available assets as they appeared on 1st January, 1894. It shows that the deficit on that date amounted to \$7,368.32. The adverse balance on the 1st January, 1893, was

\$9,033.89. There has been, it will be observed, a gratifying reduction, but not so large a reduction as was anticipated and desired. Your committee beg to re-affirm the decision of the Council last year, with reference to the deficit then existing, as to the duty laid upon the Council to exercise the most rigid economy in the expenditures.

The Treasurer's statement of the liabilities and assets on account of the Railway Debenture Debt, shews that the assets on the 1st January last amounted to \$74,869.04 against \$85,000.00 of Debentures to mature on the 1st April, 1896, leaving the sum of \$10,130.96 to be provided in the two years and three months yet to elapse, a large part of which amount will be provided by the earnings of the accumulated securities and moneys at the credit of the account.

The Registrar's statement of fees and emoluments for the year 1893, and of commission payable to the County thereon, has been submitted. The commission amounts to \$123.79.

The seventh annual report of the County Police Magistrate has been submitted. Your committee beg to express their satisfaction therewith, and would recommend that it be received and filed.

In compliance with the order of the Council passed in January, 1893, requiring that reports be furnished by all associations and municipalities to which appropriations have been made for any purpose, there have been presented to the Council, and submitted to your committee, reports as follows:—From the Victoria Rifle Association, from the Mechanics' Institutes at Lindsay, Fenelon Falls, Bobcaygeon, Woodville, Omemece, Cobocok and Manilla; from the Town of Lindsay and Villages of Omemece, Bobcaygeon, Woodville and Fenelon Falls, of expenditures for charity; from the East Victoria and West Victoria Farmers' Institutes; and from the South Victoria and North Victoria Agricultural Societies. Your committee have carefully examined the reports mentioned and beg to recommend that they be received and filed.

Your committee beg to express approval of the action of the President and Directors of the Society of Agriculture and Arts of the South Riding of Victoria, of which the Council was informed by a deputation from the Society, in extending an invitation to their Excellencies Lord and Lady Aberdeen, to visit the County of Victoria during the time of holding the Lindsay Central Exhibition, and would recommend that the Warden, the Chairman of this Committee, and the Treasurer, be a special committee to co-operate with the central reception committee should the County be honored by the presence of their Excellencies.

In obedience to the instructions of the Council your committee have carefully considered the resolutions of Council submitted to them, and beg to recommend as follows:—

That in view of an anticipated exceptional expenditure this year in connection with the Central Exhibition to be held at Lindsay, the sum of \$300.00 be granted to the South Victoria Agricultural Society, provided, however, that if the exceptional expenditure referred to be not required, the amount to be paid shall be \$200.00 only, and that the grant be paid to the Treasurer on the order of the President on or after the 1st of September next.

That the sum of \$200.00 be granted to the North Victoria Agricultural Society, the amount to be paid to the Treasurer on the order of the President on or after the 1st September next.

That the sum of \$200.00 be granted to the Town of Lindsay for purposes of charity.

That no grants be made to the Incorporated Villages for purposes of charity.

That the following grants be made to Mechanics' Institutes, namely: To Lindsay, \$50.00; and to Fenelon Falls, Bobcaygeon, Woodville, Onemee, Coboconk and Manilla, \$25.00 each.

That the question of making grants to the East and West Victoria Farmers' Institutes be deferred until the June session.

That the sum of \$50.00 be granted to the Victoria Rifle Association.

Your committee recommend that the sum of \$10.00 be granted to the Prisoners' Aid Association.

Your committee recommend that the subscriptions to the "Municipal World" be not renewed.

The Registrar of the County has submitted an account for certain services in preparing titles, (examining and copying in detail, engrossing, etc.,) of lands shewn on a large number of plans of town and village properties, involving the final re-entering of 4,847 registrations. The Inspector of Registry Offices required this work to be done in the interest of the public, and the nature of it is explained in the report of this committee adopted at the November session. The account has been certified by the Inspector, and the amount named as a reasonable allowance for these services is \$400. Your committee recommend that the same be paid. The Registrar has informed your committee that a large volume of similar work remains to be done. Your committee recommend that after the 1st day of July next, the work be not proceeded with at a faster rate than the Registrar will be compensated for by the rebate payable to the County on his fees and emoluments, and that future work, and that now in course of completion, be paid for at the rate of eight cents per registration, on the certificate of the Inspector.

The Registrar has also submitted an account for compiling a new index to the General Register, comprising entries from the year 1842 forward to the year 1893, and including about 2,000 instruments. This account, also certified by the Inspector, amounts to \$150.00, and your committee recommend that the same be paid.

Referring to a mortgage for the collection of which proceedings have been taken, your committee recommend that the Reeve of Verulam be requested to act in conjunction with the County Solicitor in his efforts to effect a sale of the lands.

Your committee recommend that members of the Council attending meetings of committees between the sessions, be paid the same per diem allowance and mileage as is paid to members of the Council for their attendance at the sessions of the Council.

The Treasurer has called the attention of your committee to the recent death of Mr. Arthur McQuade, one of his sureties. Your committee are satisfied of the present sufficiency of the bond, but would recommend that the Treasurer be instructed to notify the remaining sureties of the death of Mr. McQuade.

The Treasurer has informed your committee of certain claims existing against the Government of the Province, for services in connection with the Administration of Justice in the County, for which, until recently, the Treasurer had not understood the

Province was liable. Your committee recommend that, with a view to an early settlement being effected, the Warden, the Chairman of this Committee, and the Assistant Treasurer, be appointed to wait on the Provincial Treasurer respecting the claims.

Your committee beg leave to introduce a by-law to authorize the Warden and Treasurer to borrow money.

Your committee recommend payment of accounts as follows:—Legislative Committee, attendance and mileage, \$8.20; Andrew Jackson, cab hire, insane person to station, 50c.

Your committee have considered the documents and communications submitted to them, and beg to recommend as follows:—

That the request of the High Constable and other constables and peace officers of the County, that the Council petition the Right Honorable the Minister of Justice for the re-establishment of the scale of fees payable to constables which was in force prior to the passing of the Criminal Code of 1892, be complied with, and your committee beg leave to introduce a petition.

That the memorial to the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province, in the interest of Prison Reform, transmitted by the Prisoners' Aid Association of Canada, be introduced to the Council.

That no action be taken upon the request of the Council of the County of Hastings as to memorializing the Ontario Legislature for the reduction of the fees under their control, of all County officials appointed by them.

That no action be taken upon the request of the Council of the County of Frontenac, as to memorializing the Legislative Assembly for power to County Councils to appoint all officials whose salaries are paid by the Counties.

That a petition to the Legislative Assembly be introduced to the Council, asking that the powers conferred upon the Councils of cities, towns and incorporated villages, by section 52 of the Consolidated Assessment Act, 1892, be extended to Township Councils, and that power be given to Township Councils to have the assessment made triennially, as indicated by the Council of the County of Carleton, but that no action be taken upon the proposal to combine the offices of Treasurer and Collector, referred to by the same Council.

That no action be taken towards memorializing the House of Commons and the Legislative Assembly for legislation reducing the passenger rates charged by railway companies, as indicated by the Council of the County of Grey.

That no action be taken relative to the proposed reduction of the number of members of County Councils, as indicated by the Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

That the request of the Canadian Institute that the Council grant rewards for the collection of historical data, to be used in compiling a history of the County, be not acted upon.

That no action be taken upon the request of the Canadian Institute for the appointment of a delegate to attend the Road Reform convention to be held in Toronto in the month of February next.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON ROADS AND BRIDGES.

(ADOPTED 27TH JANUARY, 1894.)

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria :

GENTLEMEN :—

Your committee have carefully considered the various resolutions of Council submitted to them, and beg to recommend as follows :—

That the usual grants of \$100.00 to each of the municipalities north of the second range of Townships, be not made.

That the proposed grant of \$150.00 to assist the Township of Dalton in building a bridge across Head River on the second concession of that Township, known as Powell's bridge, be not made.

That the sum of \$100.00 be granted to the United Townships of Laxton, Digby and Longford to assist in rebuilding a bridge across Rush Creek, in Laxton, the bridge, in the opinion of the committee, being one towards the erection of which the County would be required to contribute under the provisions of section 533^a of the Municipal Act.

That the additional sum of \$18.00, claimed by the Reeve of Dalton for services in the construction of Johnston's Bridge in 1893, be paid.

Your committee recommend that the request of the Reeve of Eldon for permission to withdraw the resolution of Council relative to the proposed grant of \$100.00 to be expended on the sixth concession of Eldon, from consideration, be acceded to.

Your committee have considered the petition of Mr. Alexander Mathieson and others, relative to the approaches to the bridge across the Talbot River, on the boundary between the Township of Eldon and the Townships of Thorah and Mara, in the County of Ontario, and beg to recommend that the Reeve of Eldon be authorized to act on behalf of this County in conjunction with a commissioner on behalf of the County of Ontario, in making the necessary improvements.

In continuation of the action of the Council at the November session, your committee recommend that the Reeve of Laxton be authorized to carry on and complete such repairs and improvements on the Gold Creek and Black River Bridges as he deems to be necessary to place the bridges in a safe and satisfactory condition.

The Deputy Reeves of Emily and Ops have submitted satisfactory vouchers for the expenditure of the sum of \$40.00 granted at the November session for the repairs of Brown's Bridge, and have informed your committee that the work which has been completed or is in progress will cost the Townships of Emily and Ops about \$100.00 over and above the amount granted by the County.

A communication has been submitted from the Counties' Council of Northumberland and Durham, in reply to the request made by this County that these Counties should contribute towards the repairs of Brown's Bridge, stating that a committee has been appointed to examine the bridge and report.

The First Deputy-Reeve of Mariposa has reported that in compliance with the request of the Council at the November session, he examined the Nonquon Bridge in

company with a commissioner for the County of Ontario, and found that the bridge needed very little repairs. They let a contract for the work to be done, at an expense of \$6 75, one-half of which is to be paid by this County.

A statement of the expenditure made by the County of Peterborough in repairing Pigeon Creek Floating Bridge in 1893, has been submitted, which includes the salary of the caretaker, amounting in all to the sum of \$304.92. Your committee recommend that the Treasurer be instructed to pay three-tenths of the amount, namely, \$91.48, in accordance with the general agreement with the County of Peterborough.

A statement of the expenditure on Little Bob and Forest House Bridges, at Bobcaygeon, made by this County subsequent to the settlement in April last, has been submitted. It amounts to \$183.75, one-fourth of which amount will be paid by the County of Peterborough.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

(ADOPTED 26TH JANUARY, 1894.)

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria :

GENTLEMEN :—

Your committee recommend that the account of the Board of Examiners for holding the Model School Examination, 1893, amounting to \$131.00, be passed.

The statement of the Treasurer of the Board of Education of the Town of Lindsay, relating to fees paid by County pupils who attended the Collegiate Institute during the year 1893, and of the balance payable by the County under the agreement as to maintenance, has been examined, and your committee recommend that the same be accepted as correct.

With reference to the information conveyed to the Council by the Warden, and referred to your committee, that the term of three years for which an agreement was made between the County Council and the Board of Education of the Town of Lindsay as to the proportion of the cost of maintenance of the Collegiate Institute to be borne by the County, has expired, your committee recommend that a committee composed of the following members of the Council, namely, Messrs. Johnston, Shaver, Dr. Wood, Bryans and Dr. Cornwall, be appointed with power and authority to enter into agreements with the Boards of Education of the Town of Lindsay and the Village of Omemeé, under the provisions of the 31st section of the High Schools Act, 1891, as to the maintenance of County pupils at the schools controlled by the Boards respectively.

Your committee have considered a communication from the Inspector of Schools for East Victoria, accompanied by a resolution of the Board of Examiners for the County of Victoria, respecting the large percentage of pupils who fail to pass the Entrance Examination, and suggesting that some plan be adopted that would have the effect of preventing so badly prepared candidates from presenting themselves for examination, has been considered. Your committee recommend that no action be taken for the present year.

Your committee recommend that the special committee which has been appointed to open tenders and award contracts for printing and advertising, be authorized to ask tenders and award a contract for printing 20,000 blank reports of the standing of pupils, for the use of the Public School teachers of the County, and that the Inspectors be instructed to distribute the blanks to the teachers in their Inspectorates, and direct that they shall be used in every school section under their control.

Your committee recommend that Mr. Robert Kennedy be re-appointed a trustee of the Lindsay Collegiate Institute for the term ending in January, 1897, and that Messrs. Samuel J. Best and Thomas C. Ivory be appointed trustees of the Omemeé High School for the terms ending in the month of January, in the years 1896 and 1897, respectively.

Your committee beg leave to introduce By-Laws to give effect to the foregoing recommendations for the appointment of a committee and the appointment of trustees.

Your petitioners therefore pray that your Government will at once, before the opening of navigation, have the said Scugog River widened between the Wellington street bridge and the lock in the Town of Lindsay, by taking off a sufficient portion of the eastern bank of the said river, and that the basin at the lock be enlarged so that steamers may turn freely when tows are passing up or down the said river.

The Petition of the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Victoria :

Humbly Sheweth :—

1. That the Government of Canada has made large grants towards the construction of the Trent Valley Canal, so that there is now unobstructed navigation from the Village of Port Perry to the Village of Lakefield, opening up stretches of navigation upwards of 150 miles in extent, and the completion of such work has already proved to be of great benefit to the different localities through which the said canal passes.
2. That during the past two years the volume of traffic passing through the lock and canal at the Village of Bobcaygeon has been over 80 per cent. of the total amount of trade passing through all points of the said canal.
3. That on account of age the lock at Bobcaygeon has so fallen into decay that it is almost impossible at times for steamers and tows to pass through the said lock.

4. That there is a mill flume taking water from the canal just at the head of the said lock, which causes such a stiff current down the canal that it is almost impossible at times to pull tows of barges and logs through the said canal.

5. That at the lower entrance to the said canal and lock there is a quantity of loose rock, upon which steamers and tows frequently get fast, which could be removed at a small cost, thereby greatly improving the navigation at that point.

6. That the upper entrance of the said canal is very narrow and crooked and requires the removal of a portion of the eastern corner so as to make the entrance easier and safer.

Your petitioners therefore pray :

1. That your Government make a grant sufficient to reconstruct the lock at the Village of Bobcaygeon during the winter of 1894-'95, and that during the summer of 1894 preparations be made to do the said work, so that the same may be ready for navigation in 1895.

2. That the Government extinguish the water power taken from the canal, by buying the same, or removing it to some other point, where it will not interfere with the free navigation of the said canal or lock.

3. That your Government have the upper and lower entrances of the said canal dredged and properly protected by breast-works, so as to have the same ready for the opening of navigation of the present year.

The Petition of the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Victoria :

Humbly Sheweth :—

1. Whereas, the County of Victoria is intersected by large inland lakes and rivers, forming an important portion of the Trent Valley waters ;
2. And whereas, these are supplied partly from the fertile lands of this County, but chiefly from the granite regions of Haliburton and Muskoka, on the height of land to the north ;
3. And whereas, formerly while forests covered the said granite regions, and lumberers operating there maintained dams, which together regulated the gradual flow of water throughout the season and prevented (1) flooding of the arable lands in spring, (2) scarcity of water for milling and manufacturing purposes, and (3) interference with the navigation in the lower lakes in this County, yet now these conditions are all changed. The forests are largely exhausted, leaving the country bare, so that melting snow and rains are not held back by leaves and brushwood as in early days ; and the lumberers' dams, no longer of use to them, are not maintained ;
4. And whereas, the lock at Rosedale is not of the same size as those at Fenelon Falls, Bobcaygeon, Lindsay, or other points along the Trent Valley waters, and as the recent completion of the swing bridge at Fenelon Falls has greatly extended the water intercommunication in the County of Victoria by permitting steamers to enter Cameron Lake and Burnt River, but owing to the small size of the aforesaid Rosedale lock, between Cameron and Balsam Lakes, the vast territory bordering on Balsam Lake, with its extensive bays, and Gull River, including the Townships of Eldon, Bexley, Somerville and Laxton, do not receive the full benefit of the improvements recently made ;
5. And whereas, the vessels of the large fleet of steamers engaged on these inland waters, giving employment to many men in hauling large quantities of valuable freight, besides passengers, are many of them so large as not to be able to pass through the Rosedale lock, farmers and dealers in timber, manufacturers and millers, in the large territory above, Cameron Lake, being thus denied the full benefits arising from the very necessary improvements just completed at Fenelon Falls ;
6. And whereas, your petitioners are aware that owing to the partial control exercised by the Government of the Province of Ontario over a portion of the navigable waters in question, a conflict of authority has arisen which has the effect of preventing necessary and urgent improvements being made ;

Your petitioners therefore pray, that to prevent these drawbacks and to facilitate navigation, the regular running of the mills and manufacturing establishments along the entire route, and to prevent the flooding of arable lands in spring, your Government will consider the whole question with a view to overcoming the difficulties referred to, and as a preliminary step towards the accomplishment of the desire of your petitioners your Government will assume full and complete control of all the waters of and tributary to the Trent Valley Canal system, including Scugog Lake and Scugog River, from Port Perry through the Town of Lindsay to Lakefield :

That the Rosedale lock be enlarged to be uniform in size with the other locks in the system ;

And that such further steps be taken by your Government as will ensure to your petitioners full and continuous benefits from the use of the waters of the Trent Valley system.

And your petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray.

Humbly Sheweth :—

Whereas, the Prison Reform Commissioners appointed by the Government of the Province of Ontario, in their report to the Lieutenant-Governor in April, 1891, state that one of the principal causes of crime in this Province is drunkenness ; that the evidence of Sheriffs, Gaolers, etc., shows that the present gaol treatment of habitual drunkards has very little deterrent effect—that their presence in the County Gaols is a double evil, firstly, because it prevents a proper classification of the other prisoners on account of over-crowding, and, secondly, because it is found difficult or impossible to supply such prisoners with proper industrial employment.

And whereas, such Prison Reform Commissioners have recommended the establishment of one or more Industrial Reformatories in the Province, by the Government of the Province of Ontario, for habitual drunkards, both with a view of their reformation and also with a view of making their labor remunerative, both to the province and their families ;

And whereas, said commissioners recommend the re-organization of the Boys' Reformatory, so that farming may be well taught and proper classification effected ;

And whereas, the commissioners also recommend the removal of the Refuge for girls from association with the Woman's Reformatory.

Your petitioners beg to endorse these recommendations of the Prison Reform Commissioners, and pray that full effect be given by the Government to the same with as little delay as possible.

AUDITORS' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 1893.

To the Warden and Council of the Corporation of the County of Victoria :

GENTLEMEN :—

Herewith we beg to submit for your consideration and approval the following statements which show the transactions of your Treasurer, on behalf of the Corporation, for the year 1893, and its financial position at the close of the year :

1. Detailed statement of Receipts and Expenditures.
2. Abstract statement of Receipts and Expenditures.
3. Non-Resident Taxes Cash Account.
4. Non-Resident Taxes Percentage Account.
5. Non-Resident Taxes Redemption Account.
6. Railway Debenture Rate Account.
7. Railway Sinking Fund Account.
8. Railway Sinking Fund Interest Account.
9. Railway Sinking Fund Securities Redeemed Account.
10. General Balances.

We have verified the correctness of the above several statements from the books and vouchers, and have examined the securities held by the Corporation in respect of the Railway Debenture Rate and find them in excellent shape with the exception of one small mortgage for two hundred and sixty dollars, (\$260.00), which has been foreclosed, but not realized on as yet.

Included in the before referred to securities are notes of the corporation for twenty-two thousand dollars, (\$22,000), borrowed from this fund for current expenditure as authorized by Order in Council, passed on 15th December, 1892.

We have examined and verified the statement of Current Liabilities and Available Assets as on 31st December, 1893, also the statement of Liabilities and Assets, shewing the position of the Railway Debenture Account at same date.

We have examined the security held by the Corporation on behalf of the Treasurer and report the same first-class, and deposited in the Registry Office vault. One of the parties to the bond, Arthur McQuade, ex-M.P., is dead, but the other names on the instrument are sufficient and satisfactory for the purpose for which it was given.

As required by Statute, we also report that the Treasurer keeps the funds of the Corporation in a separate bank account from his own, as the Corporation of the County of Victoria Bank Account.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE OF FINANCE AND
ASSESSMENT.

(Adopted 16th June, 1894.)

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria :

GENTLEMEN,—

Your committee have examined the Auditors' report and statements of accounts for the year 1893, and beg to recommend that the same be adopted.

Your committee have duly considered the estimates for the present year. They show that to meet all requirements, including the deficit which existed on the 1st day of January last, the sum of \$27,417.32 is needed. Your committee recommend that a rate of $2\frac{1}{4}$ mills on the dollar of the equalized value of the County, amounting to \$10,164,615, be levied this year. This would realize the sum of \$22,870.00, from which is to be deducted the sum of \$69.00, the sum proper to be allowed the Town of Lindsay for the proportion of the County Police Magistrate's salary, leaving the net sum \$22,801.00. In the event of the estimates not being exceeded a substantial reduction of the deficit will be effected. Your committee beg leave to introduce a By-law for the levying of County and other rates.

The Treasurer has submitted a comparative statement of the estimated and actual receipts and expenditures for the year 1893, for the purpose of accounting for the

deficit existing at the beginning of the year. Your committee recommend that the statement be appended to this report.

Your committee have given consideration to the resolutions of Council submitted to them and beg to recommend as follows :—

1. That no grant be made to the Fruit Growers' Association.
2. That the annual allowance to the Warden after the present year should be \$100.00.
3. That the sum of \$50.00 be granted to the Mechanics' Institute recently established at the Village of Kirkfield.
4. That no grants be made to the incorporated villages in the County for purposes of charity.

Your committee recommend that the sum of \$25.00 be granted to the East and West Victoria Farmers' Institutes, respectively, consideration having been deferred from the January session.

Your committee recommend that the sum of \$25.00 be paid to the Lindsay Law Association in accordance with the request of the Secretary.

Your committee recommend that the following accounts be passed, namely :—

Your committee have considered the communication from Miss M. H. Orr, offering a property in the Village of Bobcaygeon for the purposes of a House of Refuge, and beg to recommend that Miss Orr be thanked for the offer, and informed that in the opinion of the Council the property mentioned is not so situated as to be suitable for the purpose indicated, and that in any case the Council is not at present prepared to take any action towards establishing such an institution.

The Treasurer has called the attention of your committee to the tardiness of the County of Haliburton in paying the arrears due to this County on account of Administration of Justice. Your committee recommend that the Treasurer make a demand for immediate payment of all arrears and interest.

Your committee beg to express approval of the action of the committee appointed to wait on the Provincial Treasurer, relative to the claims against the Province in connection with the Administration of Justice, as now reported by them, and recommend that the committee be empowered to continue negotiations for a settlement.

Your committee beg to express approval of the action of the Warden in calling a meeting of the Advisory Committee to consider an application for the use of the Court House for society purposes, and of the decision of the committee as now reported.

Your committee recommend that the Treasurer be authorized to pay the usual allowance of \$200.00 to the Warden, in recognition of his services, payment to be made in the month of December next.

Your committee have given due consideration to the communications from municipalities and associations referred to them, and beg to recommend as follows :—

1. That a petition to the Legislative Assembly, asking that the fee system of payment of County officers appointed by the Ontario Government be abolished, be introduced to the Council.
2. That a petition to the House of Commons for regulation of ocean freights for shipments of cattle to Great Britain, be introduced to the Council.
3. That a petition to the Governor-General in Council, for the establishment of a reformatory for young men, and for certain amendments of the law relating to the punishment of crime, be introduced to the Council.
4. That petitions to the Governor-General in Council, the Senate and the House of Commons, respectively, asking that a grant be made to the Industrial Exhibition Association of Toronto, to assist in holding a Dominion Exhibition in 1895, be introduced to the Council.
5. That no action be taken towards asking legislation for reduction of passenger rates on railways.
6. That no action be taken towards petitioning the Legislature for local option in taxation.

McRae, who was Deputy-Reeve of Eldon in the year 1892, for the refund of moneys granted by the County of Victoria for expenditure on a certain road in the Township of Eldon, for the expenditure of which the said W. A. McRae was appointed commissioner, or which was unearned by any person to whom a contract was let by the said W. A. McRae to expend any part of said moneys, be acceded to. Your committee beg leave to introduce a By-law to give effect to the proposed transfer.

Your committee have considered the report of the Overseer of County Bridges, relative to the condition of the bridge across the Burnt River at Kinnmount, and beg to recommend that as the judgment of the late Chief Justice Wilson, in an action brought by the County of Peterborough, in 1882, to restrain the County of Victoria from compelling the former corporation to arbitrate under the Municipal Act, as to the maintenance of the bridge in question, states that the County of Victoria is not bound to maintain it, no action be taken upon the report.

REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR OF SCHOOLS, EAST VICTORIA,

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria :

GENTLEMEN,—

I beg to present my twenty-third annual report of the public schools in East Victoria.

The number of schools and departments in the inspectorate is 69, an addition of 2 since last year. An additional department has been opened in the Town of Lindsay, and a school in Somerville, that has been closed for the last three years, has been re-opened.

Since last report two brick school-houses have been completed, one in the Township of Verulam, about seven miles south-west of Bobcaygeon, usually known as the Scotch Line, the other in the east ward of the Town of Lindsay. The former is a neat and commodious school-house, well adapted to the requirements of a rural section. The other is a four-roomed building, which with the exception of its outward appearance, is all that could be desired, being furnished with the best system of heating and ventilation, sufficiently large rooms, and comfortable desks for pupils and teachers. This school is also well supplied with an excellent quality of black-boards. Very few trustees can be convinced that it is necessary to have an abundant supply and of first-rate quality. If the quality is bad, it may be hard to write or draw on, it may be difficult for pupils to read, and injurious to their eye-sight. As to quantity, there should be some where every pupil may see from any seat, and under all conditions of light. There should be black-boards at the side, which pupils may use without going far from their places, and black-board where work may remain for several days without being rubbed out to make room for other matter. These things have been provided for in most of the recently erected schools, but unfortunately it is not so in some others.

Arrangements are in progress for the erection of a brick school house in Union School Section Number Eleven, in the Townships of Verulam, Somerville and Fenelon. About five years ago it was proposed to form two sections instead of one, by enlarging the Somerville portion to form an independent section, and by adding to the territory of the Verulam and Fenelon portions. Although the site was always unsuitable, and the building had become unfit for use, I was unwilling to urge the trustees to take action until the proposed change was either matured or abandoned. But having been lately assured that the proposed change had been abandoned, I urged the trustees to delay no longer. A meeting of ratepayers was called, and a new site, which I had already recommended, was selected and agreed upon. I believe the building will be completed this year.

The school house in Section Number Twelve, Emily, known as Scully's, has for a number of years been in a very dilapidated condition, and impossible to make comfortable in winter. Instead of building a new school house, as I recommended, the trustees made some extensive repairs last year which it was supposed would do for two or three years. I think it was mistaken policy. However, the trustees have promised to build not later than 1896.

The school accommodation at the village of Kinmount is inadequate. A few years ago the trustees erected a small addition to a badly-built frame building. Had the addition been larger it might have served for some years. As it is the pupils are too crowded, the site is too small, and almost impossible to enlarge. The only satisfactory arrangement would be to erect a new school house on a different site, but this would be a great burden to a section in which nearly all the ratepayers are poor.

Section Number Ten, Verulam, near the Red Rock, is another in which the school house is too small. The building, though rather old, is in better condition than many that have been erected since. If it were half as large again it would do very well.

Although many of the school houses are not as good as they should be, it may be safely asserted that improvements in buildings have advanced more rapidly than improvements in teachers. We have good High schools at which teachers are prepared in their non-professional work, a good Model school for the training of Third class teachers, two good Normal schools for the training of Second class teachers, and conventions for the discussion of Methods of Instruction. The legal age has been raised from 16 for females and 17 for males to 18 for both, and yet the average teacher is very little in advance of 20 years ago. The wretched correspondence frequently received from teachers, and the slovenly manner in which most of the Registers are kept, show that too many of our teachers are unfit to impart instruction in the English language. The great trouble seems that most of the candidates take the examinations a year too soon. The low standard allows too many to get through. They are admitted to the Model school even if under age, and when admitted it is hard to prevent their passing the examination. The new teachers crowd out the old ones. Trustees generally prefer a cheap teacher to an efficient one, and the schools suffer.

The discipline in most of the schools is all that can be desired. In some schools it would be good under any teacher, as the pupils show no disposition to be other than obedient, industrious and peaceful. In most schools, however, the discipline, no less than the instruction, depends on the character of the teacher. In many sections the trustees employ a female teacher until the pupils become unmanageable; then they engage a male teacher to undo the mischief that has been done. Formerly undue severity was frequently practised in many schools. It is a question whether we have not gone to the opposite extreme in relying too much on moral suasion, instead of

insisting upon good behaviour at any cost. The unfortunate stone-throwing incident at Ingersoll may prove valuable if it only teaches us that it is possible to make our schools too democratic; that it is folly to expect a teacher to coax pupils to do what is right, while we withhold the authority to compel obedience. In the United States they have carried the moral suasion theory much further than we have, and they are now reaping the fruits of their folly in murderous strikes, threatening armies of out-laws, and general want of submission to constituted authority.

At the entrance examination held at Omemeé last year, the county candidates were charged a fee of one dollar each. I trust that you will make such arrangements with the Board of Education at Omemeé that such pupils may be admitted on the same terms as at other places.

The number of pupils in the County who wrote at the Entrance Examination in 1893 was 283, of whom 131 were admitted by the local examiners.

Previous to this year the inspectors and the model school teacher were examiners of the public school leaving examination. In future the examiners are to be the same as at the entrance examination.

In addition to the inspectors and principal of the high school, who are ex-officio members, the High School Act provides that "the trustees of the public and separate schools of the 'town' in which a high school is situate shall, on or before the 1st day of June, each appoint an examiner." "The persons qualified to be appointed examiners shall be persons holding certificates as first class teachers actually engaged in teaching, provided always that any person actually engaged in teaching who is a holder of a second class provincial certificate and who has had five years' experience as a teacher may be appointed examiner where a first class teacher is not available in such high school district."

The trustees of the Lindsay Public School have each year appointed a first class teacher, but the trustees of the Separate School have in every case appointed a second class teacher, although six or seven first class teachers were available. The trustees most likely made the mistake of supposing that they were required to appoint one of their own staff if possible, whereas they are to appoint a first class teacher if possible, and only fall back on a second when a first class is unavailable.

The fact that the answers of the Leaving Examination are to be read makes it more desirable that competent examiners only be appointed.

The number of candidates who wrote at the Leaving Examination in 1893 was 27, of whom 17 were successful.

The number of candidates who attended the County Model School in 1893 was 37. They were all awarded third class certificates at the final examination which commenced on the 4th, and ended on the 14th day of December. Four teachers whose certificates had expired wrote on this examination, and were awarded renewal certificates.

The annual convention of the East Victoria Teachers' Association was held at Lindsay on the 7th and 8th of May. Mr. William Houston, Director of Institutes, Mr. A. T. Cringan, teacher of vocal music in the Toronto Public Schools, Mr. A. F. Newlands, of Kingston, and Mr. J. O'Sullivan, of the National Business College, Lindsay, attended and gave very valuable assistance. The attendance was large and included all the public school teachers in the inspectorate except 8, all the high school teachers but 3, and all the teachers of the boys' Separate School.

I beg to call your attention to the necessity of more care in the selection of auditors of school accounts by trustees and ratepayers. In some cases the wrong balance is brought forward, in others amounts are placed in the wrong column, and in others the columns are incorrectly added. Such mistakes would be detected if competent auditors were appointed.

In January last the Minister of Education issued a circular to the inspectors asking for information in various subjects, among others in Agriculture, as follows:—

“In what percentage of your schools is agriculture taught? Is the practical value of this subject kept before the pupils? Are pupils taught to give reasons for ordinary agricultural processes?”

This is what I wrote in reply: “There is very little agriculture taught at present. If the teachers could be induced to attend the summer lectures at the Guelph Agricultural College, some live work might be done. Would it not be a good thing if there were a picture of the Agricultural College in every rural school?”

And this is what the “Empire” newspaper said: “The inspector for East Victoria, Mr. J. H. Knight, seems to think that all the requirements of agriculture might be met by placing a picture of the Agricultural College in every rural school. He actually suggests such a thing.”

The facts are that some years ago a text-book on agriculture was authorized, and at the Entrance Examination agriculture was made a bonus subject, that is, the marks obtained were added to the pupil's total. For a while the subject was as well taught as could be expected considering that the teachers had never learned it themselves. Then it was made an optional subject, which means that unless a pupil obtained half the marks he would be better not to try it. This stopped the teaching of agriculture. At present it is not a subject of examination, and need not be taught unless the trustees require it.

At a Farmers' Institute held at Lindsay, January 8th, Prof. Panton, of Guelph, explained the objects of a summer school held at Guelph for the purpose of preparing teachers to give instructions in agriculture, and recommended that trustees pay the expenses of any suitable teacher if they wished the subject taught.

Soon after this I wrote to the Minister of Agriculture recommending that he offer a picture of the Guelph Agricultural College to any trustees who would agree to frame it and place it in the school-room. He replied stating that he would consider the matter. My object was two-fold. First, I am in favor of making schools as attractive as possible. I had seen a good picture of the college. It could be produced in quantities for a trifle. Very few trustees would refuse to pay for a frame. Secondly, it would be the means of inducing boys to attend the college, and teachers to attend the summer school, many of whom possibly hardly know that such an institution exists as the Agricultural College at Guelph.

“Truth is mighty.” The extract from the “Empire” is an example of misrepresentation which is the offspring of prejudice, and shews the depth to which a once respectable newspaper can descend when under the control of a dishonest writer.

REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR OF SCHOOLS, WEST VICTORIA.

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria :

GENTLEMEN, —

I have the honor to report that the schools of West Victoria, with scarcely an exception, have made satisfactory progress during the past year. They are now all kept open during the whole year with the exception of five schools, one in Laxton, two in Carden and two in Dalton. Of course the best results cannot be expected of those schools which are maintained only a part of the year. I have succeeded in securing a Poor School Grant for each school in Laxton, Digby, Carden and Dalton, for several years past. This has been the means of enabling many of them to keep their schools open during the whole year, that would otherwise be unable to do so.

I am glad to be able to report that the Government Poor School Fund has been lately largely increased, which gives me reason to hope that I shall be able to obtain still larger grants from this fund for the above named schools.

The Public School Leaving or Fifth Class Examination, the object of which was to bring back the 5th class to the rural schools, and the establishment of which your Council was mainly instrumental in bringing about, has now fair prospects of becoming a success. Regulations have lately been issued by the Department giving fair play to the rural schools as to this examination, and placing them on a par with graded and village schools, and the holder of a Public School Leaving Certificate upon entering a high school now takes rank one class higher than pupils who enter the high school upon Entrance Certificates. Three years ago there was no fifth class in any rural public school in West Victoria; now fifth classes are quite commonly met with, and there is reason to hope that ere long a fifth class will be found in every rural school.

I beg once more to call your attention to the inadequacy of the public school audit. I have annually called the attention of the Department to this great defect in the school law, but so far without avail. The public school audit is a farce. One has only to examine a dozen of the financial reports of public school trustees to be convinced of this. Every financial report of public school trustees is required to be signed and certified to by the three trustees, by the secretary-treasurer and by two auditors, and attested by the corporate seal of the section—and notwithstanding all this nearly one third of them come to me incorrect. Sometimes the error is against the secretary-treasurer, but more commonly in his favor. For example, in 1893 a treasurer of a rural section by an error in his financial account was making an even hundred dollars out of the section. Moreover, mistakes could be made by an incompetent or dishonest treasurer that would be quite out of the power of the inspector to detect.

I can only see one way of having this great evil remedied. That is by having the school law so altered as to make it the duty of township auditors to audit school section accounts. The secretary-treasurer or any trustee could go with the books and vouchers upon a day fixed by law, and meet with the township auditors' and in a few minutes could have his accounts properly audited.

It would be of great advantage to me if your Council would provide my office with a good typewriter. The cost would not be very great and the machine would, of course, remain the property of the County.

TO THE HONORABLE THE HOUSE OF COMMONS OF CANADA, IN PARLIAMENT ASSEMBLED.

The Petition of the undersigned, humbly complaining, sheweth :—

1. That the Cattle Industry of Canada is one of far reaching importance.
2. That large quantities of cattle have been annually exported to Great Britain by the port of Montreal, practically the only available Canadian port, and by reason of uncertainty in ocean freights, excessive ocean freights and scalping in respect of ocean freights, the trade is greatly prejudiced, all of which is greatly to the public detriment.
3. That owing to the limited number of vessels in the cattle carrying trade, and to the circumstance that our cattle are compelled to go by the one port of Montreal, those interested in the ocean carrying trade are enabled to combine, whereby excessive rates are imposed upon this industry.
4. That your petitioners are advised and believe that cattle freights on American cattle to Great Britain are lower than are those of Canadian cattle from Montreal to Great Britain, owing to lack of competition in the Canadian route.

5. That the practice of Canadian vessels, (some of which belong to lines largely subsidized by the Canadian Government in connection with certain branches of the public service) is most prejudicial in the first instance to the cattle industry, and generally to the best interests of Canada, and has now attained to such an extent as to demand redress at the hands of Parliament.

Your petitioners therefore pray that your Honorable Body may be pleased to pass such legislation, as will free the cattle industry from such unfair treatment at the hands of those interested in the carrying trade as aforesaid, and will provide such safeguards as will prevent those engaged in the cattle industry from hereafter being at the mercy of the ocean steamship companies, and for such other relief as to your Honorable Body may seem proper.

And your petitioners as in duty bound will ever pray.

(b) The inauguration of the indeterminate sentence and parole system.

(c) Conferring upon the Provincial Government all necessary authority to deal absolutely with all youthful offenders without reference to Dominion authority.

(c) Providing for the separate trial and separate custody of all children under arrest.

That at an interview with a deputation from the Prison Reform Conference in Toronto, in January, 1893, the Premier of Canada was pleased to signify his approval of these Prison Reform recommendations.

That one session of Parliament has passed since the interview referred to without practical effect being given to the same.

That the petitioners desire to signify their approval of the recommendation referred to, and their regret that as yet practical effect has not been given to the same.

That the Prisoners' Aid Association of Canada is desirous of extending the Prison Reform movement, but is without adequate means at its disposal for so doing.

Your petitioners therefore pray that your Excellency, in Council, will be pleased to take such steps as may be deemed requisite for giving effect to the recommendations above recited, and that such a sum of money be granted to the Prisoners' Aid Association as will enable it to efficiently prosecute the laudable work it has undertaken.

And your petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray.

TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL OF THE DOMINION OF CANADA, IN COUNCIL.

To the Honorable the Senate of the Dominion of Canada :

To the Honorable the House of Commons of the Dominion of Canada :

The humble petition of the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria in the Province of Ontario, respectfully sheweth :

1. That your petitioners have viewed with increasing satisfaction the continued success achieved by the Industrial Exhibition Association of Toronto during the past fifteen years, each succeeding exhibition outstripping its predecessors.

2. That the grounds and buildings of the said Association, as recently enlarged and improved, are, in the opinion of your petitioners second to none on the continent, and are well adapted to the holding of a Dominion Exhibition where all the Provinces of Canada will be fittingly represented.

That in the opinion of your petitioners the holding of a Dominion Exhibition at least once in five years, or oftener if practicable, would be of great advantage to the whole Dominion by stimulating intercolonial trade and commerce, and thereby contributing to the advancement of the material prosperity of the several Provinces, and also by promoting social intercourse between the people of the different Provinces, thereby promoting and strengthening national sentiment.

4. That in the opinion of your petitioners such an exhibition could be advantageously held by the Industrial Exhibition Association of Toronto, at Toronto, in the year 1895; but for the holding of such a Dominion Exhibition, at which all the Provinces would be fittingly represented, the said Association will require not only the moral support of, but also substantial aid and assistance from, the Government of Canada, which in the opinion of your petitioners the circumstances warrant being given and granted.

Your petitioners therefore pray :

That it may please His Excellency the Governor-General in Council to approve of and sanction, and the Parliament to grant, such substantial aid to the Industrial Exhibition Association of Toronto as will enable it to hold a Dominion Exhibition at Toronto in the year 1895, open to the world, at which the several Provinces will be fittingly represented.

And your petitioners as in duty bound will ever pray.

The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Victoria enacts as follows :—

That for the aforesaid purposes the said sum of twenty-two thousand eight hundred and one dollars shall be assessed, levied and collected in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, upon the whole rateable property in the County of Victoria, liable to Assessment, according to the law now in force concerning rates and assessments, in the manner following, that is to say :—

In the Municipality of Mariposa, the sum of five thousand three hundred and sixty-nine dollars.

In the Municipality of Ops, the sum of three thousand three hundred and seven dollars.

In the Municipality of Emily, the sum of three thousand three hundred and four dollars.

In the Municipality of Eldon, the sum of two thousand two hundred and thirty-nine dollars.

In the Municipality of Fenelon, the sum of one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one dollars.

In the Municipality of Verulam, the sum of one thousand eight hundred and eighty dollars.

And whereas, by By-law numbered 186, passed by the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria, on the Ninth day of March, A.D. 1876, it is provided that the total sum to be raised annually in certain municipalities and portions of municipalities therein named, by special rate, for paying the debt thereby contracted, and interest, is nine thousand three hundred and fifty dollars ;

And whereas, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Act respecting sinking funds and investments, it is estimated that the sum of six thousand one hundred dollars, levied annually, will be sufficient for the payment of the interest, and to form a fund which, with the interest on the investments thereof, and the securities and moneys already accumulated and the interest thereon, will be sufficient to pay the debt contracted under the By-law ;

The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Victoria enacts as follows :—

That for the said last mentioned purposes, the said sum of six thousand one hundred dollars shall be assessed, levied and collected in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, upon the whole rateable property in the said municipalities and portions of municipalities hereinafter mentioned, and in that portion of the Village of Woodville which formed a portion of the Township of Mariposa, liable to assessment, according to the law now in force concerning rates and assessments, in the manner following, that is to say :—

In the Municipality of Mariposa, the sum of two thousand three hundred and three dollars.

In that portion of the Village of Woodville which formed a portion of the Township of Mariposa, the sum of twenty-two dollars.

In the Municipality of Ops, the sum of one thousand three hundred and forty-two dollars.

In the Municipality of Fenelon, the sum of eight hundred and seventy-four dollars.

In the Municipality of Lindsay, the sum of nine hundred and eighty-one dollars.

In that portion of the Municipality of Verulam lying south of Sturgeon Lake and west of the concession line between the fifth and sixth concessions, the sum of one hundred and sixteen dollars.

In that portion of the Township of Emily lying north of the concession line between the sixth and seventh concessions and west of the quarter line between lots numbers twelve and thirteen, the sum of four hundred and sixty-two dollars.

A By-law to transfer certain claims to the Municipality of the Township of Eldon.

That all rights or claims which the said Corporation of the County of Victoria may or might have for the refund of any part of the amount of the said grant from the commissioner, or from any person to whom the said commissioner let a contract for the doing of any part of the work to be done in the expenditure of the said grant or any part thereof, be, and the same are hereby transferred to the Municipality of the Township of Eldon, absolutely and completely, provided nevertheless, that the said County shall not, directly or indirectly, be responsible for any costs or charges in any suit or action in connection with the recovery of or in respect of the said moneys.

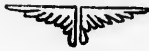

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THE WARDEN'S MESSAGE.

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria :

GENTLEMEN :

The fall session of the Council, as you are aware, is one not provided for in the Municipal Act or by the standing rules of the Council, but, nevertheless, it has been held every year under the authority given to the Warden for the calling of special meetings, in order that the Council might have an opportunity to receive reports of the expenditure of moneys granted for various services, and generally, where possible, to wind up the business that had been initiated at the January and June sessions.

Owing to the fact that the Council has exercised rigid care and economy during the present year in undertaking expenditures, however pressing the necessity might appear to be, I apprehended that less than the usual amount of business would require attention, and therefore considered whether the fall session might not, for this year at least, be dispensed with. Several matters have, however, in my opinion, made it necessary that I should call you together.

For the past ten years gas has been used for lighting the Court House. In the month of September I was informed that the gas works had been closed, thus cutting off the means of lighting. As a considerable expenditure will probably be required to provide appliances for other suitable means of lighting, and as it is a somewhat urgent question, I have to ask you to take the matter into consideration, and I would suggest the advisability of taking steps for lighting all the county buildings, including the gaol and registry office, by one system.

The special committee appointed at the January session to settle with the Boards of Education of Lindsay and Omemeë, relative to the maintenance of County pupils at the Collegiate Institute and High School, under the control of the respective boards, has discharged its duties and is prepared to report. It is desirable that the action of the committee should be considered with a view to its confirmation, if it meets with your approval.

Since the June session my attention has been called to the need of repairs to the Omemeë, Fenelon Falls and Coboconk bridges. I instructed the overseer of County bridges to examine the structures, and on his reports such repairs as appeared to be justified for the protection and safety of the public have been made, on my authority, on all the bridges mentioned.

In the month of August I received a request from the chairman of the Toronto committee on deep waterways to send delegates to represent you at the convention on the subject held in Toronto in September. It seemed to me inadvisable that any expense should be incurred for the purpose, and no steps were taken in the matter.

It is becoming that I should take this opportunity to refer to the great loss this Council and the whole community have sustained by reason of the death, in the month of September, under circumstances of peculiar sadness, of Mr. Robt. N. Johnston, second deputy-reeve of Lindsay, that you may put on record an expression of your appreciation of his great worth as a man of character and ability, and as a representative of his fellow citizens.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE APPOINTED AT THE JANUARY SESSION OF THE COUNCIL WITH AUTHORITY TO SETTLE WITH THE BOARDS OF EDUCATION OF THE TOWN OF LINDSAY AND THE VILLAGE OF OMEMEE, RESPECTIVELY, THE AMOUNTS TO BE PAID FOR THE MAINTENANCE OF COUNTY PUPILS AT THEIR RESPECTIVE HIGH SCHOOLS.

(ADOPTED 21ST NOVEMBER, 1894.)

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria :

GENTLEMEN :

Your committee beg to report that on the eighteenth day of July instant a conference was held at the Court House with the finance committee of the Board of Education of the Town of Lindsay. Your committee found that the position of matters was relatively about the same as it was at the time a settlement was made in 1891, and would therefore recommend that the County should be responsible for the same amount per annum as was then agreed upon, namely, \$3,050.00, which amount is inclusive of the amount of fees received from County pupils, for a term of three years, commencing on the 1st day of January, 1894, and ending on the 31st day of December, 1896. Your committee would further recommend that, in the event of the Board of Education employing an eighth teacher, the County should be liable for a further sum equal to thirty six one-hundredths of the salary paid to the eighth teacher, under the provisions of the High Schools act, such salary not to exceed \$700.00 per annum, for the period the said eighth teacher may be employed. The Board of Education, through their finance committee, concur in the agreement above set out.

On the same day a conference was held with a representative of the board of education of the village of Omeme. As the proportionate cost of the maintenance of County pupils at the Omeme high school does not exceed the equivalent of the legislative grant paid by the County, no claim was made.

REPORT OF COMMISSIONER APPOINTED TO RENEW BLACK RIVER
BRIDGE, ON THE BOUNDARY BETWEEN THE TOWNSHIPS OF
DALTON AND DIGBY.

(Adopted 24th November, 1894.)

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria :

GENTLEMEN :—

In compliance with the instructions and authority given to me at the November session, 1893, and the January session, 1894, the bridge on the boundary between the Townships of Dalton and Digby known as the Black River Bridge has been largely rebuilt. I advertised for tenders for the necessary timber. A contract was made with Mr. James McCaughey for the supply of cedar and one and one half inch plank, and with Mr. Andrew Gilmour for the supply of pine timber. The contractors received orders on the County Treasurer for the amounts payable to them. Some additional timber needed was supplied by the Longford Lumber Co., free of cost. The Company also loaned me tents, a portable forge, blacksmith's and other tools, and ropes for use during the progress of the work. This action on the part of the Company enabled me to house and board the men at the bridge, and to get the blacksmithing done on the ground, thus saving time and expense, besides the convenience afforded. The westerly end of the old bridge rested on a rock six feet higher than the level of the floor of the easterly end, causing an incline from east to west. I had this rock blasted and the material taken off, with the result that ten feet of an approach was done away with, and it was practicable to reduce the height of the pier which it was necessary to rebuild. As the bridge now stands it is 104 feet long. Of the length, 48 feet is entirely new, including a span of 41 feet. The remainder of the bridge, with the exception of the flooring and railing, which are new, I repaired with the best of the old timber. The flooring of the bridge is of good cedar, not less than 10 inches in diameter in the rough, flattened to five inches, and the railing is constructed of cedar scantling, 5 by 5 inches square. The new pier is filled with stone. I put two coats of paint on the new portion. To prevent passing timber from knocking against the new pier and wearing the corners, I put on a glance boom, which, owing to the bend in the river at the point where the bridge stands, had to be 140 feet long. The vouchers show that liberal wages were paid to the workmen; they were, however, all good men, one doing the blacksmithing. The cost was as follows :—

A sketch of the bridge as it now stands, a bill of the timber purchased, and vouchers for the moneys disbursed for labor, etc., are attached to this report.

I would suggest that, when the old portion of the bridge needs repairs, it should be filled with stone.

Your committee recommend that one-half the amount of fine imposed recently by the County police magistrate for unlawful driving over the Rosedale bridge, be paid to the complainant, in consideration of his regard for the interests of the County.

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON ROADS AND BRIDGES.

(Adopted 24th November, 1894.)

To the Municipal Council of the County of Victoria :

GENTLEMEN :—

A report has been submitted by the Reeve of Laxton, who was appointed commissioner to renew Black River bridge, on the boundary between the Townships of Dalton and Digby, giving full information as to the work and the expenditure. Your committee recommend that the report be introduced to the Council.

The Reeve of Laxton has submitted a report of the expenditure of \$100 00 granted at the January session to assist the Municipality of Laxton, Digby and Longford, in rebuilding Rush Creek bridge in the Township of Laxton, accompanied by vouchers for the amount of grant. The total expenditure on the bridge is \$280.00. Your committee beg to express approval of the manner in which the expenditure has been made.

The Reeve of Laxton, as commissioner for the repairs of Gold Creek bridge on the boundary between the Townships of Dalton and Digby, has reported that the repairs most urgently needed have been made, and that the Longford Lumber Company have agreed to repair the remainder of the bridge at their own expense so far as the balance of timber purchased by the commissioner will go. The expenditure reported is \$50.40.

The Reeve of Dalton has submitted vouchers, which are satisfactory, for the expenditure of \$69.10, being the balance of grant for roads in Dalton made in 1893.

Your committee have considered a report from Mr. A. G. Cavana, O.L.S., relative to the Head River bridge on the boundary between the Township of Dalton, in the County of Victoria, and the Township of Rama, in the County of Ontario, and the resolution of Council respecting the same bridge. Your committee recommend that action upon the report and resolution be deferred until the January session.

Your committee recommend that no action be taken on the communication from Messrs. Gilmour & Co., asking co-operation in raising the bridge at the Village of Norland, so as to admit of the passage of the Company's barges.

Your committee recommend that the communication from Messrs. McSweyn & Anderson, respecting the claim against Mr. W. A. McRae, transferred to the Township of Eldon, be filed.

Your committee have considered the resolution of Council relative to the thorough repair of the Talbot River bridge on the Victoria Road, between the Townships of Bexley and Carden, and beg to recommend that the Reeve of Bexley be authorized to make such repairs as he may find to be necessary.

With reference to the resolution of Council respecting the re-building of the bridge on the boundary between the Townships of Eldon and Thorah, across McCorquodale's creek, your committee recommend that the Deputy Reeve of Eldon be authorized to act in conjunction with a commissioner for the County of Ontario, in making such repairs as may be immediately needed, and to report at the January session as to further requirements.

The Reeve of Eldon reports that in conjunction with the commissioner for the County of Ontario, the approaches to the Talbot River bridge, on the boundary be-

tween the Township of Eldon, in Victoria, and the Townships of Thorah and Mara, in Ontario, have been placed in good condition, the cost of the work having been equally divided between the Counties. The net expenditure on behalf of the County of Victoria is \$59.50.

Referring to the paragraph of the Warden's message relative to repairs of certain bridges, made under his authority since the June session, your committee beg to report :—

1. The Omemee bridge has been re-planked throughout at a cost of \$100.88.

2. Owing to the shutting out of the water at the dam in the Village of Fenelon Falls, during the present fall, the foundations of the piers of the iron bridge were exposed, making an inspection by the Overseer of County bridges possible. It was found that much of the cement had come out of the joints of the stone, leaving them open to receive further damage. Advantage was taken of the exceptional opportunity to make repairs, and the work has been done at an outlay of \$58.65.

3. The planking and hand rail of the Coboconk bridge have been repaired at an expenditure of \$42.97.

Your committee beg to express entire approval of the Warden's course in authorizing the foregoing expenditures.

Your committee recommend that the Reeve of Omemee be authorized to sell the unused plank, about 540 feet, purchased for the Omemee bridge, and account to the County Treasurer.

Your committee recommend payment of accounts and allowances for services in connection with bridges, as follows :—

Your committee cannot recommend any further action than that the Clerk be instructed to communicate with the Clerk of the County of Peterborough, calling attention to the facts as to the condition of the bridge and the apparent relations of the two Counties with regard to it.

Whilst assuming no responsibility as to the repairs and maintenance of the bridge, your committee recommend that, without prejudice, the sum of \$5.66, expended by the Township of Somerville for temporary repairs recently made on the Kinmount bridge, be paid to the Municipality.

GENTLEMEN :—

Your committee have considered the resolution of Council instructing them to ascertain on what conditions holders of Muskoka teachers' certificates are admitted to high schools to prepare for taking second class certificates. Mr. J. C. Harstone, principal of the Lindsay Collegiate institute, and Mr. J. H. Knight, inspector of schools for East Victoria, addressed the committee and gave much interesting and instructive information respecting the question. It appears to your committee that persons who write for and obtain the Muskoka district certificate, and who desire to prosecute their studies, enjoy an advantage over students who take the whole of the regular course up to a second class certificate. Your committee beg leave to introduce a memorial to the Minister of Education embodying certain objections to the present practice, and asking that a change be made in the law and regulations.

To the Honorable the Minister of Education for the Province of Ontario :

The Petition of the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Victoria :

Humbly Sheweth :—

That your petitioners are informed and believe that persons who write for and obtain what is known as a District Teachers' certificate, which enables them to engage in teaching in the Muskoka and other Districts of the Province, are not, in the examination prescribed, required to exhibit knowledge of all the subjects prescribed for persons who write for a primary or third-class non-professional certificate, some of the omitted subjects being essential to efficient teaching.

That notwithstanding the absence of certain subjects from the examination for a District certificate, persons who hold them are permitted to attend a High School and prepare for taking a junior leaving or second-class certificate, in the examination for which the omitted subjects referred to are not prescribed.

Your petitioners therefore pray that the School Law and Regulations be so amended as to prohibit any person holding a District certificate only being admitted to a High School to prepare for taking a second class certificate until the examination prescribed for a primary certificate has been passed.

And your Petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray.

BY-LAWS.

BY-LAW No. 469.

A By-law to confirm an agreement with the Board of Education of the Town of Lindsay, as to the amount for which the County of Victoria shall be liable for the maintenance of County pupils at the Collegiate Institute of the Town of Lindsay.

Whereas, the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Victoria did on the Twenty-sixth day of January, A. D. 1894, appoint a committee with authority to settle with the Board of Education of the Town of Lindsay the amount for which the County of Victoria should be liable for the maintenance of County pupils at the Collegiate Institute of the Town of Lindsay, under the provisions of the High Schools Act, 1891.

And whereas the said committee has agreed with the Board of Education of the Town of Lindsay, through the Finance Committee of the said Board, that the amount for which the County of Victoria shall be liable for the said maintenance for a term of three years commencing on the First day of January, A. D. 1894, and ending on the Thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1896, is three thousand and fifty dollars, inclusive of the fees received from County pupils, and shall undertake to pay a certain proportion of a specified additional expenditure hereinafter mentioned, in the event of the same being incurred by the said Board of Education.

And whereas, it is expedient and necessary that the action of the said committee shall be confirmed;

The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Victoria enacts as follows :—

That the County of Victoria shall be liable to the Board of Education of the Town of Lindsay for the maintenance of County pupils at the Collegiate Institute of the Town of Lindsay for the term of three years, commencing on the First day of January, A. D. 1894, and ending on the Thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1896, in the sum of three thousand and fifty dollars for each year of the said term, and the said liability shall be discharged as follows :—An amount equal to the half-yearly grant from the Province of Ontario to the said Collegiate Institute shall be paid by the County Treasurer to the Treasurer of the said Board of Education on notification from the Minister of Education to the County Treasurer that the said grant has been apportioned, and on the delivery to the County Treasurer at the end of each year of said term of a statement, certified by the Treasurer of the said Board of Education, showing the amount of fees received from County pupils in such year, the County Treasurer shall pay to the said Treasurer of the Board of Education an amount which, with the amounts paid as above provided and the aggregate of fees received from County pupils, will discharge the liability hereby incurred.

That, provided the Board of Education shall employ an eighth teacher on the staff of the said Collegiate Institute, during any part of said term, the County Treasurer shall pay to the said Treasurer of the Board of Education a further sum equal to thirty-six one-hundredths of the amount that shall be paid to the said eighth teacher, under the provisions of the High Schools Act, such salary, for the purposes of this clause, not to exceed seven hundred dollars per annum, and such further sum shall be paid to the said Treasurer of the Board of Education at the end of the year during the whole or part of which the said eighth teacher shall be employed.

BY-LAW No. 470.

A By-Law to appoint a committee for certain purposes.

Whereas, the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Victoria has determined to introduce the electric incandescent system for lighting the Court House, Gaol and Registry Office ;

Cornwall, M.D., and Robert Bryans, Esquires, members of this Council, be and are hereby appointed a committee with authority to prepare and complete and carry out the terms of a contract with the Victoria Electric Light Company of Lindsay, for the purpose of carrying out the intentions of the said Council in respect of the said Electric lighting, to direct the placing of the fixtures and appliances, and to exercise such supervision during the progress of the work as will ensure the carrying out of the contract in a satisfactory and efficient manner.

That the Warden be authorized to execute the contract.
