SUPREME COURT OF THE U.S. ORDERS THE DISSOLUTION OF THE STANDARD OIL CO.

Giant Corporation Held to Be a Monopoly in Restraint of Trade—Must Be Dissolved in Six Months—Decision of Lower Courts Upheld—Taft and His Cabinet to Consider Advisability of Federal Incorporation Law.

DECISION IN TOBACCO TRUST CASE IS EXPECTED ON MAY 29

WASHINGTON, May 15.—The Supreme Court of the United States to-day upheld the decision of the Missouri courts ordering the dissolution of the Standard Oil Co. of New Jersey.

The supreme court holds: That the Standard Oil Co. is a monopoly in restraint of trade. That this giant corporation must be dissolved within six months.

Corporations whose contracts are "not unreasonably restrictive of competition" are not affected. Other great corporations whose acts may be called into question will be dealt with according to the merits of their particular cases.

The court was unanimous as to the main features of the decision, Justice Harlan dissenting only as to a limitation of the application of the Sherman Anti-Trust Act.

President Taft and cabinet will consider immediately the entire trust situation and the advisability of pressing for a federal incorporation act.

The decision in the tobacco case was not handed down to-day, but is expected on May 29. Chief Justice White, in his opinion, first reviewed the preliminary proceedings in the case in the circuit court of the United States for the eastern district of Missouri.

Application of Sherman an Anti-Trust Law. In this state of affairs, the chief justice seized upon the single point of concord, namely, the application of the Sherman Anti-Trust Law, as the initial basis of an examination of the question.

In striving to get at the meaning of the two sections of the law he said that the sole subject with which the first section dealt was "restraint of trade," and that the "attempt to monopolize and monopolization" was the subject of the second section.

The first section, he said, applied not only to contracts in restraint of trade in a subjective sense, but to all contracts which theoretically were attempts to monopolize, but which in practice had come to be considered a broad sense as a restraint of trade.

The second section of the Sherman law, he said, had been introduced to supplement the first, and make sure that by no possible means could the public policy embodied in the first be evaded.

The chief justice said the rule of reason must be applied in applying a statute to any given case, but to all prohibitions against monopoly, he said, the statute indicates a consciousness of freedom of the individual to contract when not unduly or improperly exercised was the most efficient means for the prevention of monopoly.

The chief justice said the government contention could be reduced to the claim that the language of the statute embraced restraint of trade, and left no room for the exercise of judgment, but simply imposed a plain duty of abstention from violation to every case within its literal language.

The error of the government on this point, Chief Justice White said, was in assuming that the court had decided in accordance with its contentions.

"It is obvious," he said, "that judgment must in every case be called into play in order to determine whether a particular act is embraced within the statutory classes, and whether it is or is not within such classes its nature or effect causes it to be a restraint of trade within the intention of the act."

At this point, in this opinion Chief Justice White touched upon the phase of the case which formed the basis for Justice Harlan's dissenting opinion. It was that the opinion of the supreme court, in the cases of the United States v. Freight Association, and United States v. Joint Traffic Association, excluded the right to restrain in interpreting the statute. Chief Justice White declared that the general language of those opinions had been subsequently overruled, and that it could justify the broad significance attributed to them.

The chief justice next took up the facts and the application of the statute to them. As a matter of fact the court found that the result of enlarging the capital stock of the Standard Oil Co. of New Jersey, and the acquisition by that company of the shares of the stock of the other corporations in exchange for its certificates gave to the corporation an enlarged and more perfect way and control over the trade and commerce in petroleum and its products.

Justice White said the lower court had held, and he said, "the potentiality of competition," which otherwise would have existed to such an extent as to be a combination or conspiracy in restraint of trade in violation of the first section of the Sherman law.

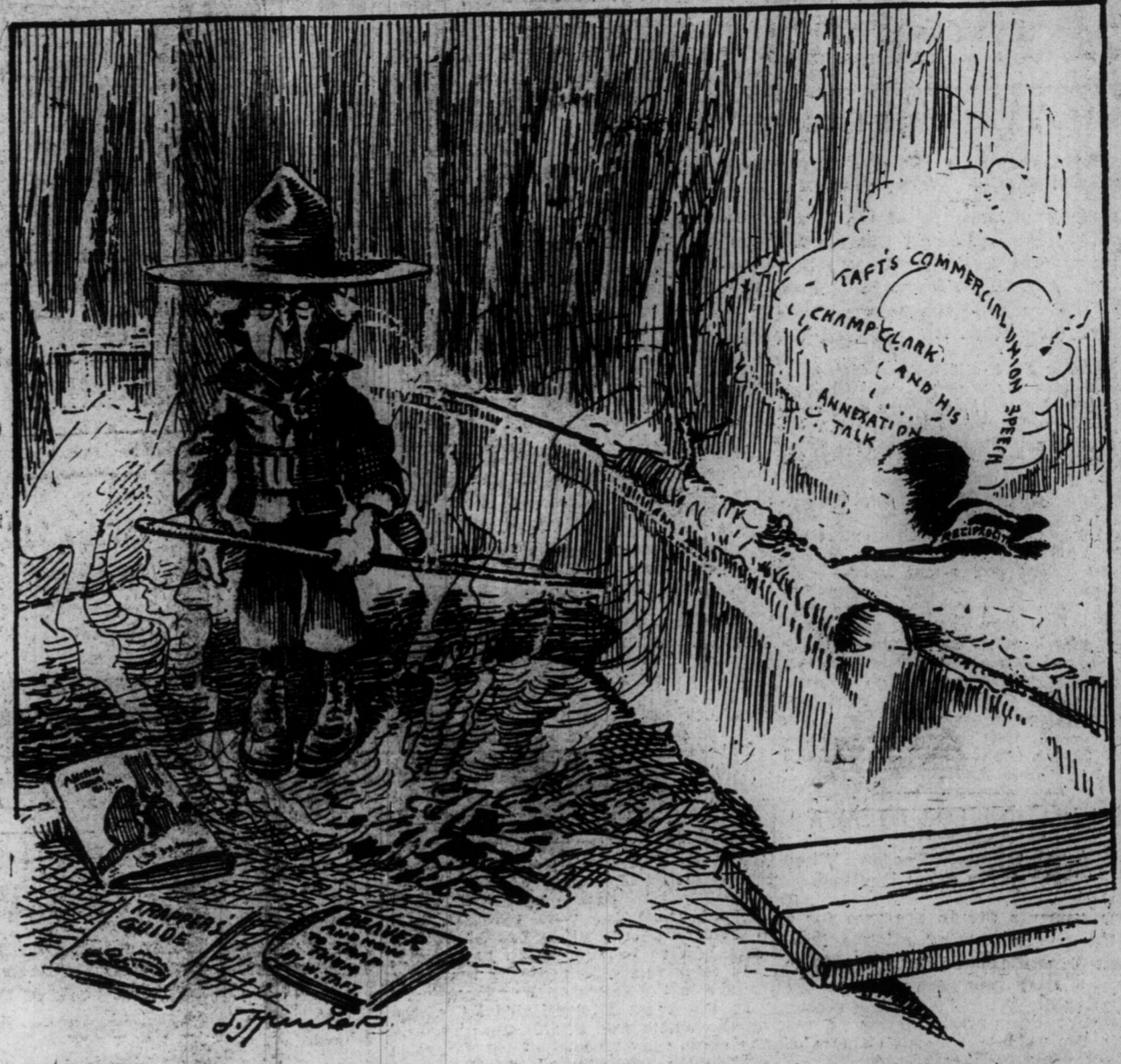

It had not been expected that there would arise any new developments in the waterworks question, but trouble started in plenty when Controller Church, seconded by Ald. But The Star simply reached for the Bird scheme as a sure head-off to a tube under-deck in a straight steel viaduct, and which would thus form a mainstay of a municipal system of tubes and surface lines. There could never be a tube under a curved road partly fill and partly steel. So The Star was for the curve.

A tube under Yonge-street will give quick transit from all North Toronto to down-town parts: from all Danforth-avenue to down-town parts; from West Toronto and along St. Clair-avenue. It will let in the Kingston-Radial to the centre of the city, the Metropolitan, the Davenport line; it will let in any radials the three steam roads may develop in connection with their systems; it will give Toronto a chance to go rapidly to the east of the west, to the north. It will followed in a few years by a still greater east and west tube.

But it is to be killed at the start if The Star and associates can kill it. That's why they fought the Bloor and Danforth viaduct. That's why The Globe attaches so much importance to the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board's deliberations. Toronto's not ready for tubes, but it's ready for being canned up again to the existing monopoly.

The people of Toronto, in their municipal capacity, have had to fight for public ownership of electric power and light. They've won at last. Now they are about to help themselves in the way of improved local traction by municipal tubes, surface lines, viaducts, etc. But they will still have to fight. Newspapers, railway boards (supposed to be in the public interest) are all ready to block the way, one for one reason, one for another. None of them admit that they are out to block municipal traction, but that's their game.

And yet the new municipal system will not hurt the remaining rights of the surface railway company. They can make big dividends for their remaining twelve years. But they want the franchise forever. They do not like to let go. They would prevent public ownership coming. Mr. Bryan says it must come.

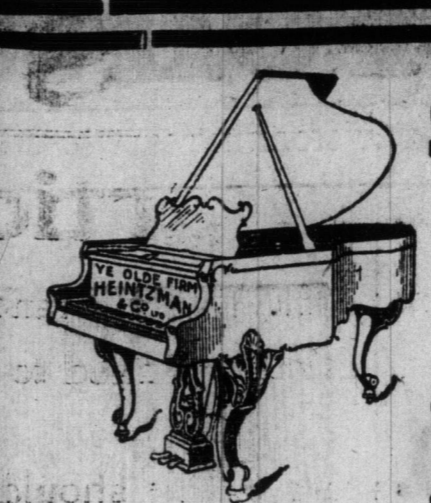

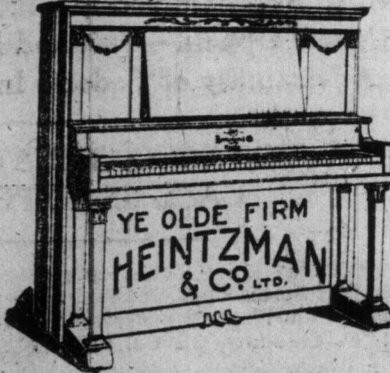

During the past year a progressive change for the better has occurred in the relations between the United Kingdom and the German Empire. This has been accompanied by an observable improvement in the personal sentiment of the closely allied reigning families.

Whether commendable or the reverse, royalty still commands general respect in European countries, even those that have dispensed with the institution. More than traces of the same sentiment can be found in new world democracies, enough, indeed, to discount captious criticism.

MEXICAN REVOLUTION AND REFORM. More than ever it is evident that the Mexican insurrection is of far more than local character. Beneath the external calm which the coterie of financiers have profited so extensively through presidential favors and their journalistic parasites in America and elsewhere, there has been growing up a seething mass of discontent.

HOUSTON'S COMMISSION GOVERNMENT.

While efficient city government is not so much a matter of systems as of the personal quality and ability of the men charged with its administration that system is undoubtedly the best which enables these to be most easily secured.

This does not represent all the benefit accruing to Houston from government by commission. During the same period, the commissioners secured a reduction in the price of gas from \$1.50 for 1000 cubic feet to \$1.15 and the cost of arc lighting was cut down from \$50 per year per light to \$20.

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TUBERCULOSIS PROBLEM. There is an earnest desire among citizens to see the consumption problem more effectively grappled with, and many expressions reached us yesterday approving of the suggestion that the city and the National Sanitarium Association should get together, and arrange for comprehensive and effective handling of the whole situation.

There were 153 deaths from consumption in the city up till yesterday since the beginning of the year, more than one every day. It is inconceivable that there should be any wrangling when the need for greater effort is so urgent, and when greater effort would prevent so many of these premature deaths.

Let us have a competent committee representing the association and the city; let the present activities and proposals for the future be investigated; and let the committee report with a view to co-operation between the city and the association. A strong committee will beget confidence, and there will be no grudging of whatever funds are necessary to deal with the plague.

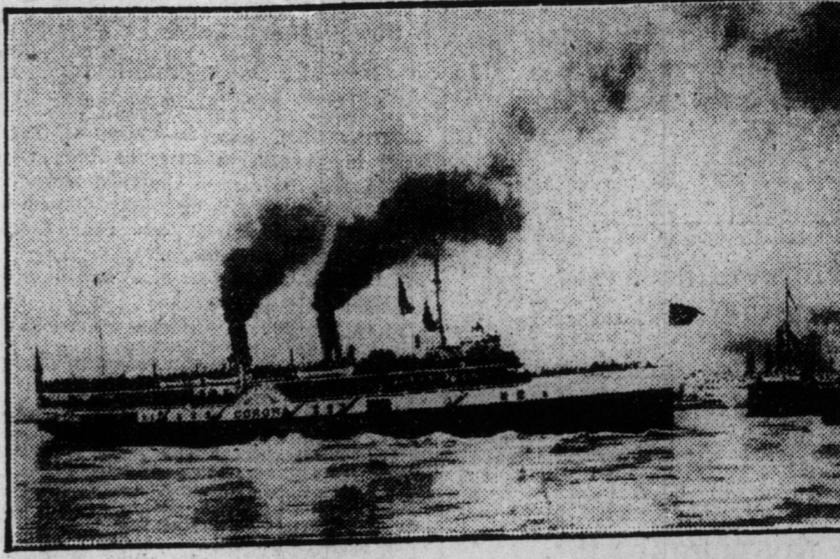

## Gold Stocks Under Pressure Beaver Leads the Cobalt List

### Porcupine Shares Turn Easier Under More Pronounced Selling Movement—Silver Mining Issues Show Responsible Undertone.

World Office, Monday Evening, May 15.—The mining exchange today is so far as Porcupine is concerned was almost devoid of feature, the trading being of smaller volume, and the price changes so narrow in the majority of instances as to call for no comment. About the only thing that could be said of the market as a whole was that from the opening of business there was no trace of the vigorous demand which characterized the exchange most of last week. After a few trifling advances due to short covering early in the day, a sagging tendency developed and this prevailed until the close.

In the Porcupine list the higher priced issues were naturally most influenced by the selling movement, Hollinger in particular seemed susceptible to realizing, and these shares dropped a full 20 points, and before the selling was taken care of. At this close traders were bidding \$12 for the stock, with offers 20 points above that price.

West Domes responded to profit-taking sales with a decline of 7 points, the shares dropping to \$2.58, with \$2.52 bid at the close. The shares of O'Brien, on the other hand, were not so open to pressure, and both of these held only slightly below last week's closing prices.

The cheaper Porcupines showed the same tendency as the bigger issues, and Preston East Dome, Vipond, Swastika and Tisdale were all lower, the latter stock dropping 2 points from Saturday, on what was taken to be forced selling.

The real feature of the market was the Cobalt section, which was quiet, but generally firmer than the gold mining issues. Beaver was in special demand, and the shares of one period sold as high as \$9. At the close \$8.50 was bid for the shares, with offers half a point removed. The rest of the list was comparatively unchanged.

## DELORO WILL RESOUND WITH ACTIVITY SOON

### Development Work Practically Held Up Now—Numerous Mines in Working Order.

Porcupine City, May 12.—(From Our Man Up North.)—Many enquiries are being heard just now relative to mine development work in Deloro. 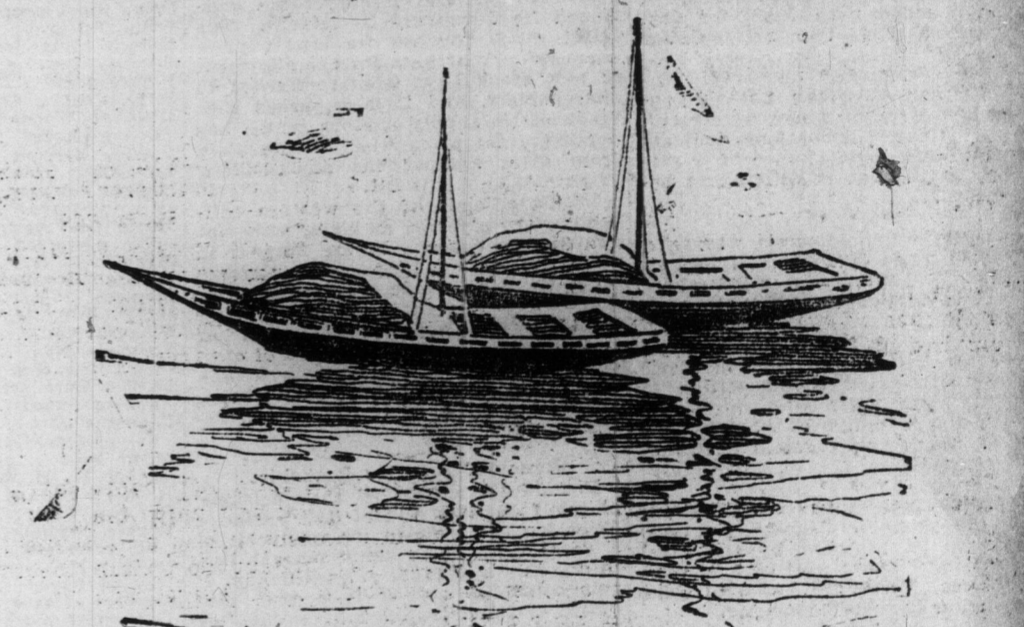
