NOTICE Military Service Act, 1917.

EMPLOYMENT OF MEN IN DEFAULT UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT.

The following Regulations, recently approved by the Governor General in Council, impose strict obligations upon every employer TO ASSURE HIM-SELF THAT EACH OF HIS EMPLOYEES OF MILITARY AGE AND DESCRIPTION IS IN POSSESSION OF DOCUMENTS PROVING THAT HE IS NOT IN ANY WAY IN DEFAULT UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT.

An employer who is charged with having a defaulter in his employ must be able to prove THAT THE MILITARY SERVICE PAPERS ISSUED BY THE REGISTRAR OR MILITARY AUTHORITIES TO THE EMPLOYEE IN QUES-TION WERE PRODUCED FOR HIS INSPEC-TION at the time when the employee was taken into his employment, and that it was reasonably established to his satisfaction that the man was not in default under the Military Service Act. It should be clearly understood that the Canadian Registration Certificates given on June 22, 1918, at the time of general registration, in no way define the status of a man under the Military Service Act.

MILITARY SERVICE

A great many new men are now in training on the street cars as motormen and conductors. The work is strange to them, and to a considerable number the city itself is strange. New York, Nov. 1 .- Gold producers, re-

presenting 85 per cent. of "the only de-clared essential industry that has not received consideration at the hands of the government," decided at a recent conference here to ask for relief corresponding to the increased cost of production, Eugene Davis, chairman of the finance committee of the American Gold Conference and the International Gold Conference, announced today, Under war conditions, gold is being mined at a loss, said Mr. Davis, adding that a large percentage of the normal pre-war production is in danger of being irretrievably lost. While deciding not to

irretrievably lost. While deciding not to make specific demands, merely stating their case and leaving the extent of relief, if any is granted, to the government, the mine owners went on record opposing a charge in the amount of gold in the dollar or placing a premium upon the commodity. This, in effect, would preclude an increase in price, so that the most logical course open, according to leading producers, would be a government insurance of the industry to cover the production deficit during the war and the period of reconstruction.

Mr. Davis cited a telegram received today from the Northwestern Gold Mining Association, announcing that mines were being sold or closed, and that the industry would be completely ruined unless prompt relief was given.

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

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
