The British are fighting typical field warfare. The line of attack is developing into a series of local combats in which cycling patrols are participating and doing excellent service with their machine guns.

Headquarters of the Fourth French Army, Nov. 1.—Gen. Gouraud's army attacked this morning on a front of five to six miles between the Aisne and the Argonne.

By the middle of the morning Gen. Gouraud's men had largely occupied their first line of objectives in spite of an energetic and increasing resistance on the part of the enemy.

Started at 6 a.m. The attack was launched shortly before 6 o'clock after a whirlwind artillery preparation of 30 minutes.

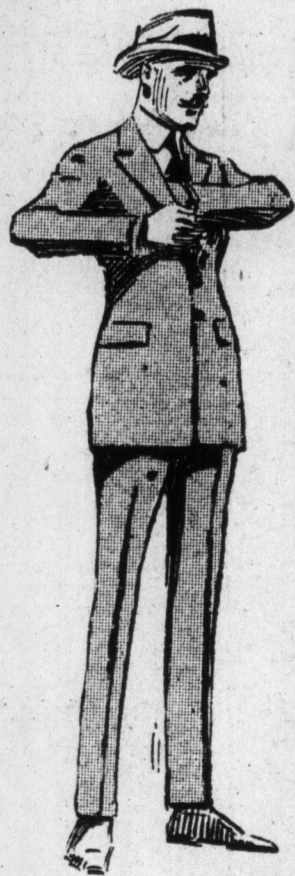

### SOLDIER WORRIED OVER CONDITIONS

Corpl. Parker, Now at Newmarket Hospital. Started a Course.

### SUGGESTS TREATMENT.

Different Bedding Accommodation Could Be Provided, It is Stated.

F. T. Parker, brother of Corporal Parker, whose disposition at the Newmarket Military Hospital has been subject to criticism, stated yesterday afternoon that the corporal left Liverpool in January, 1917, arriving in Canada three weeks later. He was sent to Spadina Military Hospital and shortly after started to attend the Technical school on Harbord street, where he studied mechanical drawing. It was his custom to leave the hospital early so as to arrive at the school on time. He was an amputation case and walking was difficult. Mr. Parker stated that his brother was ordered one morning by the O.C. of the hospital to delay starting for the school until after parade hours. This inconvenienced his plans to such an extent that it preyed on his mind. He had now to go out to school as an out-patient, and was unable to afford the expense. He was taken sick after attempting to continue his studies during the next few weeks. He was sent to Cobourg in June, 1917, remaining there until the Newmarket Hospital opened, September, 1917. He was kept in Newmarket until January, 1918, when he had to all appearances recovered. From there he was sent to Davisville Hospital to be fitted with a new limb. He was refused a ten-day pass and was told to go to Newmarket where he belonged. This further aggravated his worry, stated his brother yesterday. Instead of returning to Newmarket the corporal took 19 days' French leave, and then returned to Davisville where he was refitted for a limb. He was fined 18 days' pay, and was then immediately given two weeks' leave of absence, and this pass was extended until he had had nearly seven weeks' leave. Pay Held Back. **EMPLOYMENT OF MEN IN DEFAULT UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT.**  
The following Regulations, recently approved by the Governor General in Council, impose strict obligations upon every employer TO ASSURE HIMSELF THAT EACH OF HIS EMPLOYEES OF MILITARY AGE AND DESCRIPTION IS IN POSSESSION OF DOCUMENTS PROVING THAT HE IS NOT IN ANY WAY IN DEFAULT UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT.  
An employer who is charged with having a defaulter in his employ must be able to prove THAT THE MILITARY SERVICE PAPERS ISSUED BY THE REGISTRAR OR MILITARY AUTHORITIES TO THE EMPLOYEE IN QUESTION WERE PRODUCED FOR HIS INSPECTION at the time when the employee was taken into his employment, and that it was reasonably established to his satisfaction that the man was not in default under the Military Service Act. It should be clearly understood that the Canadian Registration Certificates given on June 22, 1918, at the time of general registration, in no way define the status of a man under the Military Service Act.

**REGULATIONS.**  
"106. Every person who employs or retains in his service any man who has deserted or is absent without leave from the Canadian Expeditionary Force, or who is in default in the performance of any obligation or requirement for reporting or for military service, imposed upon him by the Act or Regulations, or any proclamation thereunder, shall be guilty of an offence punishable on summary conviction by imprisonment not exceeding six months, or by a penalty of not less than One Hundred Dollars, and of not more than Five Hundred Dollars, or by both such imprisonment and fine, unless such person proves that he made due inquiry and that THE MILITARY SERVICE PAPERS ISSUED BY THE REGISTRAR OR THE MILITARY AUTHORITIES TO THE MAN SO EMPLOYED OR RETAINED IN HIS SERVICE WERE PRODUCED FOR HIS INSPECTION, and that it was reasonably established to his satisfaction by such inquiry and papers that the man was not a deserter or absent from the force without leave, or in default in respect of any of the obligations or requirements aforesaid."  
"106A. Every person who HARBOURS OR CONCEALS OR IN ANY WAY ASSISTS ANY MAN WHO IS A DESERTER OR ABSENT WITHOUT LEAVE FROM THE CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE, or who is in default in the performance of any obligation or requirement for reporting or for military service imposed upon him by the Act or Regulations, or any proclamation thereunder, shall be guilty of an offence punishable upon summary conviction by imprisonment not exceeding six months, or by a penalty of not less than One Hundred Dollars and of not more than Five Hundred Dollars, or by both such imprisonment and fine, unless such person proves that he was not aware and had no reasonable ground to suspect that the man so harboured, concealed, or assisted was a deserter or absent from the forces without leave or in default in respect of any of the obligations or requirements aforesaid."

LONG REST FOR THE MATCH RACE VICTOR

Will Not Be Started Again Until the Kentucky Derby.

New York, Nov. 1.—J. W. McClelland, owner of Eternal, announced the other day that the colt would be retired and will not be seen under colors again until the Kentucky Derby as a three-year-old next spring.

McClelland, since his victory over Billy Kelly in the 1918 season, did not make a standard for the 1919 season, his first year-old debut in racing. His first start was at Aqueduct, June 24, in a maiden race, Reports of Eternal's speed are omitted, the favorite at 2 1/2 to 1. But, he had been made apparent when, after lengths in 1:00 1/5, he won by six lengths in 1:00 1/5, with Dwayne second time this was the performance, but those he beat were of no great account.

At the same track and distance, Eternal was the only penalized starter, carried from 115 to 109 pounds, and finished in 1:00 1/5, making a new record. The others starting, at the end of a fast and well-contested race Dwayne was the victor by a length and a half in 59 3/5, with mark him eligible to the stake-winning class of the year.

The colt was not raced in the month of July, being held by and saved for the big stakes races at Saratoga. Then, on States Hotel Stakes, on August 1, he won a mile, good day and fast track. The following month he was back to the post at 18 to 5. Eternal had 115 pounds and was the favorite at 4 to 1. But, getting away last in a field of four, he had practically no chance, and finished by a length and a half with Dunboyne second and Terentia third. Dunboyne carried 120 pounds and Eternal 124. After such times he was the favorite at 5 to 1 in the post in a purse of \$10,000. He went on to win the 1 1/2 mile, three-year-old stakes, at Saratoga, on September 11, in 1:42 1/5, making a new record. This minor achievement was a part of the preparation for the chief race, the extremely valuable Hopeful Stakes, at three-quarters of a mile.

Subsequent to his victory in the Hopeful, Eternal was started in two races, and won them both. At the Aqueduct fall meeting, Sept. 16, he took up 126 pounds in a purse race at three-quarters of a mile and won easily by three lengths in 1:11 1/5. In the same race, 112 pounds, and Questionnaire, 113, three-quarters of a mile, he was the favorite at 1 1/2 to 1. He won the race in 1:11 1/5, making a new record. This was assigned 130 pounds, and was opposed by Mormon, 114 pounds; Cirrus, 112 pounds; and Star Realm, 110 pounds. Eternal won by a length and a half in 1:11 1/5, with Mormon second and Cirrus third. The race was sloppily that day. Under the conditions of the race, Eternal was handicapped at 130 pounds, and was the favorite at 1 1/2 to 1. He won the race in 1:11 1/5, making a new record.

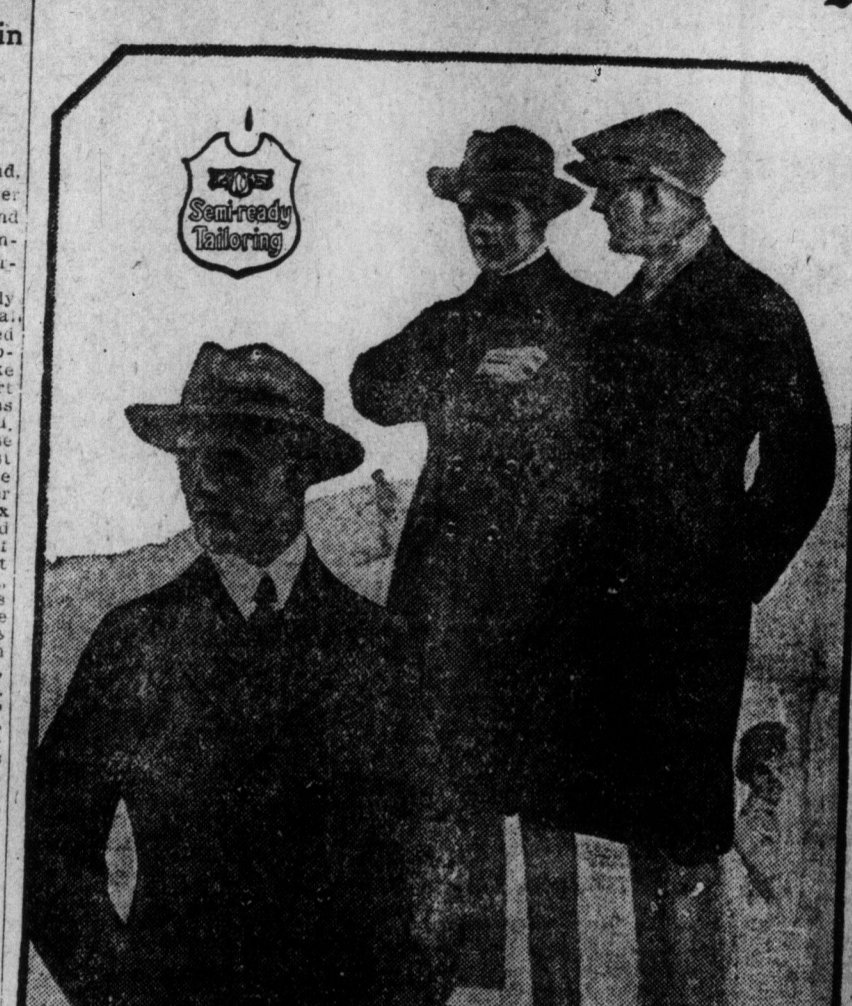

## SCORES ARE KILLED IN TRAIN WRECK

### Collision on Brooklyn Rapid Transit in Cut Takes Terrible Toll.

## OVER HUNDRED HURT

### Train in Charge of Green Motorman, as Result of Strike on Road.

New York, Nov. 1.—Between 75 and 100 men and women were killed and probably double that number injured in a rear-end collision tonight between two Brooklyn rapid transit trains in the cut near the Prospect Park station on the Brighton Beach line. The crash occurred when the train ahead, said to have been in charge of a "green" motorman, jumped the track at a switch and another train, running in the same direction, plunged into the rear cars.

The tragedy marked the first day of a strike called by the company's motormen to enforce the reinstatement of 29 discharged members of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers as ordered by the national war labor board.

Officials of the company professed three hours after the accident to have no definite information as to its cause. They said no reports had been made to them by members of the train crew.

District Attorney Lewis of King's County declared all the officials of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company and every person connected in any way with the accident has been ordered placed under arrest.

**Cars Took Fire.**  
Immediately after the crash the wrecked cars burst into flames, adding to the terror of those who had escaped injury and increasing the peril of those pinned in the wreckage.

Rescue work was retarded by the fact that the crash occurred in a deep cut. It was difficult for relief workers or survivors to clamber up and down the steep concrete walls of what is known as the Malbone Street "Tunnel."

The injured and dead were carried up ladders taken from fire apparatus. More than 100 members of the Women's Motor Corps of America responded with their cars to the calls for help. All kinds of vehicles were pressed into service to carry the dead and injured to hospitals and morgues.

The trains were packed with workers in Manhattan and with shoppers who had been detained on the New York side of the river by the crush in the Brooklyn bridge station resulting from the reduced train service.

Survivors of the crash crawled from the wreckage and ran thru the tunnel, screaming and weeping, unmindful of the danger from the live third rails which bordered the tracks.

At 1 o'clock more than 100 bodies had been recovered from the wrecked train.

## COUNCIL AUTOCRACY UNEQUAL TO TASK

### Financial Times Says Parlia- ment Should Deal With Reconstruction.

Montreal, Nov. 1.—Under the caption "Peace at Hand; Summon House of Commons at Once," The Montreal Financial Times will register editorially in tomorrow's issue a strong protest against the leaving of gigantic problems of reconstruction "to an order-in-council autocracy."

The editorial will say in part: "Peace is at hand. It will involve the entire and immediate adjustment of the whole economic life of Canada.

"Parliament should be summoned immediately. Government adjustment must not be left to a secret cabinet and a regime of orders-in-council.

"The entire government party, and not a mere handful of office holders, must be engaged in the task of devising that policy and selecting the men and machinery to carry it out; and an efficient opposition can make a valuable contribution to the work, both positive and negative, as the government party can."

"It is possible that Sir Robert Borden can continue to act in the dual role of head of the Canadian Government and minister plenipotentiary to Great Britain, for the re-organization of the British Empire. One or the other of these tasks he must hand over to someone else.

**OUR UNITED STATES

## KING CONGRATULATES VICTORS OVER TURKS

### Sends Messages to Marshall and Allenby and Awards Latter Grand Cross of the Bath.

London, Nov. 1.—King George has sent the following telegram to Lieutenant-General Sir W. R. Marshall, commander of the British forces in Mesopotamia:

"I am delighted to hear that you have finished the campaign in Mesopotamia by the capture of the entire Turkish force on the Tigris with its commander. In congratulating you and all ranks on this success I wish to record my grateful appreciation of the part played by the Mesopotamian Expeditionary Force in the complete capitulation of the Turkish army."

To General E. H. H. Allenby, commander of the British forces in Palestine, the King has sent the following message:

"I wish to express my admiration for the spirit and endurance of the troops under your command, who, regardless of fatigue and hardships, have so pressed the retreating Turkish columns as to overcome all resistance. Their efforts have been deservedly rewarded by the complete surrender of the Turkish forces. This is a glorious and memorable achievement and on behalf of your grateful fellow countrymen I thank you and all ranks of the Egyptian expeditionary forces. In recognition of your eminent services I have much pleasure in promoting you to be a Knight of the Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath."

## NEED IS IMPERATIVE FOR COAL CONSERVATION

### Amount Allotted to Canada is Million Tons Lower Than First Arranged for.

Ottawa, Nov. 1.—That there is imperative need of conservation as regards the use of anthracite coal in Canada was stated today by Mr. C. A. Magrath, fuel controller. A despatch from Washington, which was published recently in the Canadian newspapers, has to some extent been misinterpreted in that it has created the impression that there would be plenty of hard coal available.

Unfortunately, however, this is not the case. Whilst the statistics of shipments from the United States are approximately correct as stated in the despatch, it is necessary to emphasize the fact that the total tonnage, which has been allotted to Canada, still remains about one million tons lower than had originally been arranged for.

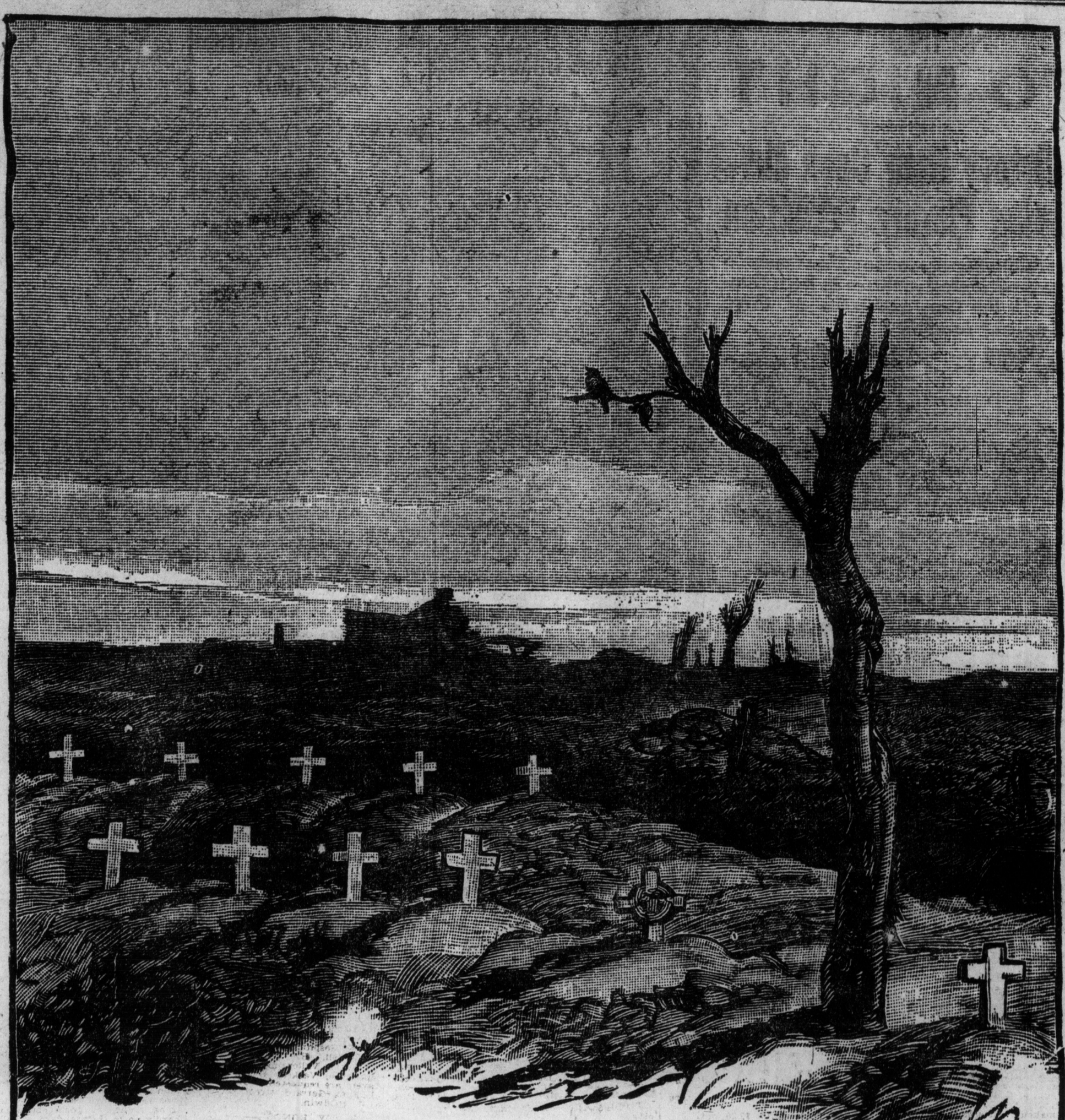
