BRANTFORD, July 6 .- (Special.)-The law and the Gospel are not on terms of the strictest intimacy in Brantford at present, that is to say, such law as is represented by the police magistrate and such gospel as is proclaimed by Messrs. Thompson, Imrie, Caswell, et al. In fact, the relations are rather strained between these two great civilizing influences. The issue is the official life of Magistrate Woodyatt, and they do say that Thomas Elliott, ex-mayor, and a prominent citizen generally, has been recommended by the local Conservative Association, and may be appointed any day by the government to succeed Mr. Woodyatt. Mr. Woodyatt was asked to resign while Hon. Mr. Foy was in England, and declined to commit official harikari. The most diverse views are given or this course of action, according to the political source of the opinion. The Conservatives remember that when Mr. Voodyatt was appointed in January, 890, he was the cleverest Liberal organizer in the district, and are quite sure the refusal to resign is according to the smartest rules of the same.



Examination of Accused Murderer Will Be Long-Defence Decides Not to Call Adams.

BOISE, Idaho, July 7 .- Counsel for the defence in the Haywood murder case held a long conference Saturday both at their downtown offices and in the cell of Haywood, Moyer and Pettibone at the county jail, and it was said afterward that it would be next Wednesday before Haywood would take the oath as witness in his own behalf.

The program as it now stands is to begin Monday morning by reading the depositions taken at San Francisco as to the explosion at the house of Fred Bradley. These depositions are to be supplemented later with the evidence of an expert in explosives. It is contended by the defence that if 10 pounds of dynamite had been exploded, as Orchard swears were contained in the bombs he used, that amount would have blown Bradley into pieces and destroyed the whole front of the build-

Additional testimony will be to show that before he fled from Coeur d'Alene in 1899 Orchard at-tempted to sell his interest in the Hercules Mine. There will be a showing also as to the movements and actions of Jack Simpkins when he went to Denver in the fall of 1905 after having parted with Orchard at Caldwell. This will about conclude the case, except for the testimony of Haywood and Moyer. It is believed that Moyer's testimony can be reached by

Steve Adams will not be called by the defence. To call him would open the way for the state to get his repudiated confession before the jury, and it is deemed the better strategy to avoid this.

The direct examination of Haywood according to the statement of counsel for the defence, will be long. He will give a sketch of his life which will embrace all of its important events, including his connection with the Western Federation of Miners. It is said that opportunity will be given for the fullest and widest cross-examination that the prosecution may decide to make. Haywood himself will explain that the \$100 sent to Jack Simpkins nine days before Steunenberg was murdered was the remainder of a federation expense account which Simpkins left with Haywood to be forwarded to him at his home in

Spokane. The presentation of the states' rebuttal will probably begin on Thursday next, and be carried over into the succeeding week.




