THESE ARE THE HORRIBLE STORIES OF MASSACRE ARE COMING FROM CHINA NOW

They Are Anxious to Procure the Evacuation of the Capital, and Won't Permit the Foreign Ministers There to Tell Their Story.

Did Li Hung Chang Promise Russia Three Manchu Provinces If Russia Could Procure Favorable Terms of Peace From the Powers and Secure the Evacuation of Pekin?—Foreigners in Treaty Ports Protest Against the Allies Leaving.

London, Sept. 5.—(4.15 a.m.—To-day's) despatches from Shanghai and Tientsin refer to the hopeless confusion of the management of the Chinese telegraph system, which may possibly account in part for getting no news from Pekin. Another reason for the delay, doubtless, is the anxiety of the Chinese authorities to procure the evacuation of the capital. No effort is being spared by them to bring this about. Their idea is that, should the foreign Ministers in Pekin be allowed to communicate with their governments, the full extent of the complexity of the Chinese Government in the anti-foreign outburst would be revealed, and would lead the allies to decide to remain until retribution had been exacted. A telegram has been conveyed by courier to Tientsin to Pekin and probably all other despatches have been stopped.

Li Would Surrender England.
According to Shanghai advices Li Hung Chang wired the Chinese Minister in London, Sir Chih Chen Lotung, as follows: "Our St. Petersburg Minister has persuaded Russia to leave Pekin. You are useless if you cannot persuade England."
Offers a Sop to Russia.
It is asserted that Li has promised Russia three Manchu provinces if the evacuation of the capital can be secured. The withdrawal of the allies from Pekin and favorable peace terms from the powers. Both the Empress Dowager and Li Hung Chang are said to be availing money to obtain these objects.

What Made the Empress Angry.
The Empress Dowager's anti-foreign feelings are said to be the cause of the despatch from Shanghai, was due to the presentation to her by Prince Tuan of an ultimatum, which is now known to have been forged. In which the powers demanded her abdication in favor of her son Kwang, the removal of the seat of government from Pekin, the placing of Chinese finances under foreign control, and other sweeping concessions.

Six Months Rations.
"Six months' rations for the British fleet," says the Daily Standard correspondent of the Standard, writing Aug. 27, "are being forwarded to Pekin."
Press Messages Detained.
Newspaper correspondents are being handicapped by the bad arrangement of the telegraph. Messages have been detained and tampered with and nothing has been safe unless sent to Shanghai.

Where is This Mail Here?
A good deal of curiosity is felt here regarding the fate of the mail bag containing official and press despatches, descending from the entry into Pekin, which was sent by an admiral to Chefoo in a Russian gunboat, and is reported not to have been received there.

Russians Are Taking a High Hand.
The proceedings of the Russians in and around Pekin are watched with some anxiety. The situation threatens to develop into a serious one. It is reported that the Russians intended to take Shanghai Kwang. They have assumed complete possession of the Hai Ku Hai arsenal at Tientsin. The arsenal still contains thousands of pounds of guns and ammunition.

Did Russians Cut the Wires?
The Chinese are charged with cutting the wires between this point and Peking, and with committing various other petty crimes of pounds' worth of goods and ammunition.
