

# HARDY FUNSTON SEES A HOT PLACE FOR KIDNAPERS OF HIGUALDO

## In a Modest Statement He Tells How With a Handful of Scouts the Head and Front of Filipino Insurrection Was Captured in His Stronghold.

### Forged Letters Deceived Aguinaldo and His Whole Staff Till They Were Powerless To Resist—"Stop That Foolishness," Said Rebel Leader, When His Own Men Fired on the Kidnapping Party—A Bold and Desperate Scheme.

Manila, March 28.—General Fred Funston, who, March 23, captured General Emilio Aguinaldo, when interviewed today by a representative of the Associated Press, made the following statement concerning the capture of the Filipino leader: "The confidential agent of Aguinaldo arrived Feb. 28 at Panabangan, in the Province of Nueva Ecija, Northern Luzon, with letters from Emilio Aguinaldo, and directed Baldermo Aguinaldo to take command of the provinces of Central Luzon, supplanting General Alcantara. Emilio Aguinaldo also ordered that 400 men be sent him as soon as possible, saying that the bearer of the letters would guide them to where Aguinaldo was."

**His Bold Effort.**  
General Funston secured the correspondence of Aguinaldo's agent, and laid his plans accordingly. Some months previously he had captured the camp of the insurgent general, Lacuna, incidentally obtaining Lacuna's seal, official papers and a quantity of signed correspondence. From this material two letters were constructed, ostensibly from Lacuna to Aguinaldo, one of these contained information as to the progress of the war. The other asserted that, pursuant to orders received from Baldermo Aguinaldo, Lacuna was sending him a private agent involving territorial or financial conditions with any other power. Russia had again assured Great Britain that the occupation of the British railroad was only temporary and would be returned to the interests of the United States government. It was originally intended to be sent by Lacuna, but was altered to be sent by the insurgent general. This plan was abandoned.

**Blue Shirts and Khaki.**  
General Funston and the American officers wore plain blue shirts and khaki trousers. They carried each a half-barrel, but were no insignia of rank. They were carefully instructed to obey the orders of the four ex-insurgent officers. On the night of March 5 the party embarked on the United States gunboat *Victory*. It was originally intended to drift to the mainland, but a storm arose, and three of the canoes were lost. This plan was abandoned.

**Funston as a Prisoner.**  
At 2 a.m., March 24, the *Victory* put into a private agent involving territorial or financial conditions with any other power. Russia had again assured Great Britain that the occupation of the British railroad was only temporary and would be returned to the interests of the United States government. It was originally intended to be sent by Lacuna, but was altered to be sent by the insurgent general. This plan was abandoned.

**Meeting Aguilano.**  
On the morning of March 25 the advance guard of the *Victory* was met by the staff officers of Aguinaldo and the detachment of Aguinaldo's bodyguard, which was ordered to take the insurgent officers. While one of the ex-insurgent officers conversed with Aguinaldo, the others were being taken to the house where Aguinaldo was held.

**Fire Opened on Them.**  
Suddenly the Spanish officer, noticing that Aguinaldo's side arms were not in their connection with these railroads, nor had he ignored the interests of the shareholders. He thought, "Now, Macabebe, so for them." The *Victory* opened fire, but they did not return it. The insurgent officers were then taken to the house where Aguinaldo was held.

**Anglo-German Agreement.**  
Lord Lansdowne, the Foreign Secretary, announced that the British government had given Great Britain to understand that in the German view, Manchuria was not a place where they considered they had any interest. He thought, however, that the point did not deserve too much attention, pointing out that the only treaty ports in Manchuria were New Chwang and Lu Shen Wan, with regard to which explicit assurances had been given by Russia.

**Not at War With China.**  
The allied had agreed they were not at war with China, and desired to derive no territorial advantage from the present events. They also recognized the binding nature of the existing treaties, and desired to maintain the open door on commercial and economic questions, while within the spheres where existed preferential rights there should be equality of opportunity for all the powers concerned. The British minister at Peking had been instructed to be moderate in his demands, and the government had informed China that it was not desirable, while negotiating with the powers as a whole, that she should entertain any views of her own.

**As Regards Indemnity.**  
In regard to the question of the indemnity now under discussion, it was decided that the claims should be forwarded by the powers in one lot. **The Manchurian Agreement.**  
Lord Lansdowne said he was not in a position to pass final opinion on the matter. The government would not criticize in a careless spirit any arrangement regarding Manchuria which was in the nature of a modus vivendi. It was suggested that the versions of the treaty published were simply translations on the part of some official, or pure invention designed to bring about a misunderstanding.

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# HERE IS CONFESSION OF OATHS IN THE COOK INVESTIGATION CASE

Ottawa, March 28.—(Special.)—The evidence in the Cook charges was set out today. Room B was charged with electricity while men of position in the land swore point blank against each other before the Senate committee, and there was a warm time.

**The Premier's Denial.**  
Sir Wilfrid stated while Sir Richard Cartwright was under examination. The Minister of Trade and Commerce answered the question put to him without hesitation, making, when he got the opportunity, half-laughing but entirely sarcastic allusion to Cook. He spoke, however, with a pause, suggesting that the question of his long examination was short as possible, he declared the charge involved "Absolute untruth. Not directly, indirectly, or in any way. I saw the \$10,000 offer to Cook through Cameron. Until he saw Cook's affidavit, prior to the election, he had no knowledge of such a thing. He to do with the \$10,000 was not my business. He treated by political opponents and was not a consideration for Cook's Senatorship."

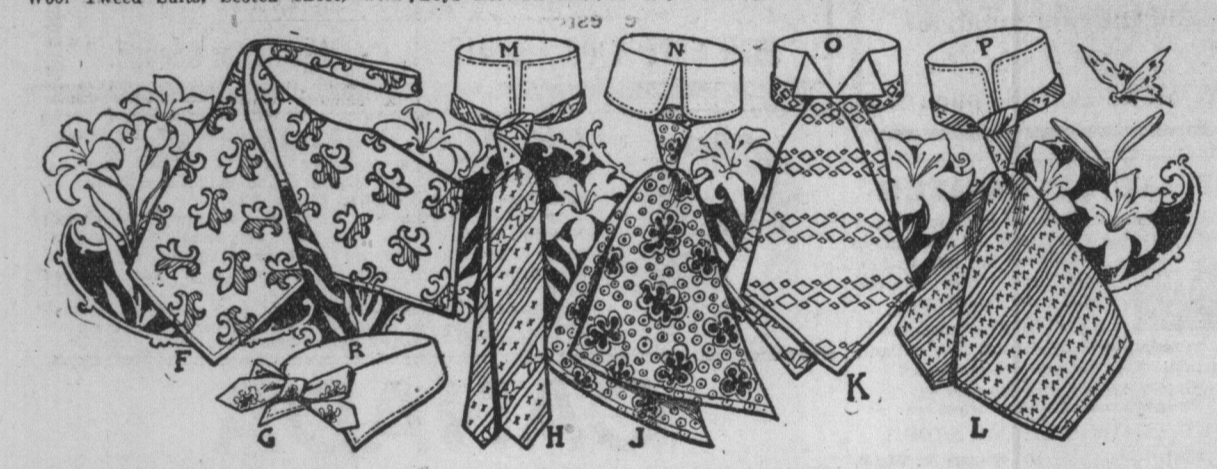

BANK OF COMMERCE EXTENDS SUIT

Against Toronto Junction Regarding the Contract for Advertising the Tax Sale.

Toronto Junction, March 28.—Mrs. Lake was last night married in Davenport Methodist Church by Rev. H. S. Matthews to Mr. Hamilton. According to a three-hour custom, the bride and groom will be presented with a Bible and hymn book, they being the first to be married in the church.

The Executive Committee of the Town Council met this evening in the Town Hall with Councilor Armstrong in the chair. Mr. Broom, who was given a month to pay his taxes, was on request, given until June to pay the money. The solicitor reported that the Bank of Commerce has taken action against the town, claiming the tax sale of \$400 and \$500, which should have been paid to them last year on account of the tax sale. The contract for publishing the tax sale was given to The Leader and Recorder and this account was assigned to the Bank of Commerce. Before the tax sale was published, The Leader and Recorder Company went into liquidation, and the manager being unable to guarantee the fulfillment of the contract, it was cancelled. The liquidator, however, claimed the long days of summer. Messrs. Gilman and Ward were anxious to know whether the council was sincere in the move made to erecting a foot bridge over the C.P.R. yards at the foot of Murray-avenue, and were answered to the effect that so far the council was only considering the matter and had decided to get estimates. The Board of Health asked whether it could appoint its own solicitor, or whether the Town Solicitor was appointed by law to act for it. As this question is not very clear, the by-law appointing the solicitor will in future embrace the duties to be performed for the Board of Health. A request from the taking of the town to have the bread by-law changed to conform with that in the city of Toronto was presented to the committee.

Mr. Fred Richardson was last night married by Rev. J. T. Morris at his residence, D'Arcy-street, to Miss Fairchild of Mulden. The bride and groom will reside on Van Home-street.

North Toronto. A program of musical and literary items will be given by the Epworth League of the Zion Baptist Church to-night at the church.

Councillor Armstrong presided over the meeting of the Works Committee last night. Various amounts of considerable dimensions for the repairs of the recent break at the water-works were discussed in review, and caused the chairman to remark that he was disgusted with the whole business. Councillor Brown asked that far for the construction of the town sidewalk be purchased without further delay, and the order was passed accordingly. Councillor Lawrence thought the considerable amount of money as assistant engineer, in place of having to engage a special man. The saving this effected would be of considerable importance, the councillor averred. The chairman remarked that the chief had stated his willingness to do anything required of him, and the committee recommended the suggestion brought forward by Mr. Lawrence. The chairman urged the importance of at once deciding upon the power that should be installed at the new water-works, and the Mayor arranged for the proposed visit to Bowmanville, to inspect the gasolene plant to take place in a few days.

A Court of Revision of Sherbrooke water main was held last night. Councillor Lawrence presiding. Mr. J. A. Killick was the only objector to the local improvement. His objection was ruled out, and the by-law finally confirmed. A similar by-law, in respect to Balliol-street, was also confirmed.

Mr. W. W. Edwards is the Census Enumerator for Eglinton, westward, in the place of Mr. J. M. Whaley, as stated yesterday.

Mr. Pleyter is now endeavoring to arrange for the location of his headquarters for consumptives on Eglinton-avenue west, in the town, and a special meeting of the Board of Health will be called to consider the proposal.

Richmond Hill. Division Court will be held here on Monday next by His Honor Judge Morgan.

The Schomberg-Avonca Railway now looks as though it might become an accomplished fact. At a special meeting of King Township Council, it was decided to ask the Legislature to ratify the \$12,000 bonus by-law, passed some three years ago.
