



It was to be noted that God did not create all species personally. He said: "Let there be fishes," "Let there be animals." "Let there be birds." It was not stated that each species bad a separate creation. This idea had been inculcated by poets, especially Matton, who pictured the animals rising from the ground and shaking the earth from their manes and horns. He thought the poets were responsible for the tenacity with which the world clung to this idea, which was held till about 1850, when Darwin wrote his epoch-making book, Origin of Species by Natural Selec

It was well to admit that evolution had its difficulties. It could not account for the origin of life. Many links were missing in the chain connecting modern animals with their prehistoric ancestors, but these were being found.






