#### THE CENTURY OF PEACE.

On Dec. 24, 1814, the Treaty of Ghent which diplomatically ended the war of 1812-14, was signed. Hostilities did not then cease, since early in January, 1815, General Pakenham was defeated and killed at New Orleans, but still the treaty inaugurated the century of peace between the two main branches of the English-speaking peoples, whose expiry it is proposed to commemorate by an international monument. Memorials, many of them, have been erected with less reason, and if the proposal is conceived and carried into effect in the right spirit it will witness both to the past and the future. For unless this international undertaking, whatever form it may ultimately take. is as much a pledge as a memorial, it had as lief not materialize.

It must not be forgotten that this century of peace is of greater scope than some of those who favor its commemoration appear to concede to it. No doubt there has been no clash of arms between the peoples north and south of the boundary line separating the Dominion and the United States, but that has happened because of the peaceful adjustment of the many differences-some serious-between the
