FORTY MILES OF FIGHTING.

Armies Engaged in Close and Desperate Conflict.

London, Oct. 14.—The despatches of yesterday gave little information regarding the developments of the great battle which has been raging for five days north of Yentel. The contending armies were reported to be engaged in close and desperate conflict along the entire front of forty miles, and Marshal Oyama's despatch reported that everywhere the Japanese were making satisfactory progress.

Other despatches from both the Russian and Japanese front gave further details of the struggle of Tuesday and Wednesday, which both agree in stating was of the most desperate character, the fighting exceeding in fierceness even the terrible combat at Liaoyang. The losses on each side are reported to be enormous, one despatch from Paris via Rome placing the Russian losses to Thursday at the colossal total of 37,265. A late bulletin from the front stated that the Russians had 15,000 wounded, hundreds of whom were streaming back from all directions.

Kuropatkin officially admitted the loss of the artillery attached to the brigade on his right flank as a result of General Oku's attack, and as the number of guns to a brigade is 24 this would correspond with the Tokyo report. Japanese advances seem to place the total of Russian guns captured at 23, with 24 ammunition wagons. A despatch to a news agency from Mukden dated yesterday and received by the wire reported that the Japanese had won a great victory, and that the Russian lines were withdrawing slowly.
