## Press On In Verdun Region

Make Advance West and South of Fortress of Vaux; Germans Give Russians SERGEANT MAJOR **Temporary Set-back** 

Paris, Oct. 27-French troops made further progress last night in the Verdun region, advancing west and south of the fortress of Vaux, according to the official announcement issued this afternoon by the French war department. One hundred Germans were made prisoners.

German artillery, the statement adds, is violently bombarding Chenois Wood and Fort Douaumont, which were captured by the French in their surprise attack on Tuesday. In the region of the Somme last night, French artillery destroyed a Ger-

man munition depot near Ablaincourt.

Lisbon, Oct. 27.—General Gill, command ling the Portuguese troops in East Africa, reports that his column encountered the opposing troops, at Nakatala on October 21 and that, after a prolonged combat the enemy retreated precipitatery ly, abandoning a quantity of arms and ammunition which fell into the hands of Portuguese. General Gill reports that his command was within a mile of New

Berlin, Oct. 27—Russian troops in the district west of Lutsk, in Volhynia, made a heavy attack at midnight on the Austro-German lines in the Kiselin sector, after prolonged artillery preparations. Mangin's group: In four hours, by a magnificent assault, you wrested at one blow, from a powerful enemy, ground northeast of Verdun bristling with obstacles and fortifications which he took eight months to tear from us bit by bit at the cost of desperate efforts and considerable sacrifice. You have added fresh and splendid glory to the flag of the army of Verdun. In the name of that army, I thank you. You have deserved well of your country."

Roumanians And Russians Forced To Retire

**ENEMY ATTACK CONTINUES** 

Are Striking Along Entire Dobrudja Front-A Gain by Rosmanians in Moldavia, Bad Weather, Reports the French War

Victor Eminanuel conferred medals for valor on three members of the Italian air corps.

On the morning of Oct. 12, while off the Aibanian coast, an Italian dirigible piloted by Captain Ercole, with Captain Corbelli and Captain Albino as observers, was surprised and attacked at a height of 16,000 feet by an Austrian aeropiane.

The aeroplane, on obtaining a favorable position, turned its machine gun on the dirigible, mortally wounding the observer and disabiling Captain Ercole's left arm. Ercole, however, succeeded in overcoming the aeroplane and in killing the pilot, but the dirigible was obliged to land thirty miles within the enemy lines.

Captain Ercole destroyed the dirigible and after two days of wandering and suffering from cold and hunger, managed to clude the Austrians and, recrossing the mountains, finally reached an Italian camp on the River Voyusa.

King Victor Emmanuel conferred a gold medal for valor on Captain Ercole and silver medals on Captains Corbelli and Albino.

Petrograd, Oct. 27.—Although offering stubborn resistance to the German-Bulgar-Turkish forces attacking in Dobrudja, the Russians and Roumanians, according to today's official Russian statement, are retiring to the north of a line between Hirsova and Casapkeui. This iine is approximately between forty and sixty miles north of the Tchernaveda—Constanza Railroad line.

The statement adds that the forces of the Central Powers and their allies are continuing their attack along the entire front in Dobruja.

Roumanian troops on the western frontier of Moldavia, however, have captured the Transylvanian village of Balan and the Piatrarotkul heights. Fierce fighting is continuing on both banks of the Osik river.

All Farmers' Organizations in the West; President Says Still

Calgary, Alta, Oct. 27—The News-Telegram says:

"The big consolidation of all the farmers' organizations in Western Canada is about to be completed. At the recent meeting of the representatives of the several organizations of the three prairie provinces in Winnipeg, all points were agreed upon and the final action is about to be taken by submitting to all the shareholders of all the organizations for a vote, the issues involved. A meeting of the representatives of each organization will take place early in November, and thereupon a vote will be ordered and taken when, with a majority in favor, the greatest grain merger of the world will have been effected. Calgary, Alta., Oct. 27-The News-

ed.

"The organizations involved are the Grain Growers' Company of Manitoba, the Alberta Farmers' Co-operative Elevator Company, the Grain Growers' Association, the United Farmers of Alberta, the Saskatchewan Co-operative Elevator Company, and the Manitoba Grain Growers' Association. The Canadian council of Agriculture is a party to the move, and the other provinces also have signified their intention to join in the great merger.

so have signified their intention to join in the great merger.

"The scheme embraces a system of transferring of shares of the Alberta and Saskatchewan organizations for shares of the Grain Growers' Grain Company of Manitoba.

"A subsidiary company of the Grain Growers' Company, the New York Exporting Agency, also will be involved in the gigantic plan.

"Thus, with one stroke, if the final consummation takes place, the leaders of the farmers of Western Canada will effect a stupendous farmers' organization. It will comprise membership of more than 100,000 farmers, with the good-will and support of twice as many more. It will be a potent factor in Canadian politics and finance, and will in the end do much of its own manufacturing, importing, building of towns, hospitals, roads, elect its own men to office, and in fact enter as an octopus with the interests of the grain growers at heart into the public life of the Dominion.

### Says Report Misleading.

Winnipeg, Oct. 27—This statement was presented to a meeting of the directorate of the Manitoba Grain Growers' Association and representatives of the Grain Growers' Grain Company, which happened to be in session, and President R. C. Henders, speaking for the meeting, said: "The statements contained in the despatch are not correct. In the first place, some of the organizations mentioned have not considered amalgamation very favorably. A tentative basis of union for various commercial purposes has been arrived at by the executives of some of these organizations. This will be submitted to the general meetings of the bodies secking union and in course of time something as a basis of union may be arrived at. At present, however, the whole matter is in a very nebulous state, and the despatch is entirely misleading."







MERRILL TO GO TO THE PROVINCIAL HOSPITAL

Dorchester, N. B., Oct. 26—Capt. John E. Merrill, charged with the murder of John F. Rogers at Moncton, was found day and will be sent to the provincial hospital at Lancaster.

This verdict was reached at the request of Attorney-General Baxter, who was prosecuting, following the presentation of evidence by the defence.

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




