200 REBELS KILLED

Reported Captured -Airplanes in Attack.

Mexico City, Dec. 24.—Fearing a rebel thrust from the south, President Obregon despatched General Arnulfo Gomez, military commander of the capital, with 1,500 men to Cuernavaca, State of Morelos. General Figuero's rebel force occupied Puente de Ixtle, just south of that city Saturday.

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Two hundred rebel dead were left behind when the De La Huerta force was driven from Puebla and 1,000 prisoners were taken. Airplanes and artillery were used in the attack before the city was captured.

Vera Cruz, Dec. 24—Rebel forces made their nearest approach to Mexico City so far with the capture yesterday of Guernavaca, forty miles south of the capital, it was stated in a revolutionary communication issued here.

The forces advanced from their position in the state of Guerrero into Morelos, of which Guernavaca is the capital. No heavy fighting was reported. The general situation is unchanged except for the nearer approach to the national capital.

An official Government bulletin issued from Mexico City states that Puebla was captured Saturday and that 1,000 prisoners were taken by the Federal forces.

# **NEW GERMAN**

Ramsay MacDonald, Labor Leader, Prepares to Take Over Government.

DANGERS AHEAD

France and England Predicted as in Head-on

Collision. (British United Press.) London, Dec. 24.—Ramsay MacDonald, if the premiership falls into his hands next month, will find the stage all set for his

promised new international conference to reconsider reparations, inter-allied debts and post-war problems generally. The present machinery has temporarily at least broken down. France and England are

in head-on collision over details of the proposal to re-examine Germany's financial situation, and on another important issue the Reparations Commission is deadlocked.

Germany recently applied for permission to purchase food from the United States to the amount of seventy million dollars, and have her debt in this regard given priority over her war repara-

Proposal Is Rejected.

When this came before the reparations commission, France and Belgium flatly objected to the proposal with Britain and Italy favoring it. The American observer, Col. Logan, was present, and was not allowed to vote because of America's non-participation in the treaty. Out of consideration for his presence, the French chairman, Louis Barthou, declined to give the casting vote. In the circumstances, with the machinery created by the Versailles Treaty in such condition, the proposal for a new conference is likely to receive more favorable opinion from the allied and associated Governments than would otherwise have been the case.

#### Six Are Dead In Shooting In Maine

Six persons are dead as the result of the act of a madman at Cooper's Mills, Me., five of whom were murdered by John Snow after which he committed suicide. The story pieced together by the police is that Snow visited the home of Deputy Sheriff Frank Jewett, at North Whitfield, and asked for the use of their automobile. This was refused and he shot Mrs Jewett and her son, Kenneth, a boy fifteen years of age. He then took the car and drove to Cooper's Mills where he shot his wife, Mrs. Ida Snow; her aunt, Mrs. Eva Eaton and her mother, Mrs. Ruth Brann, finally shooting himself.

Passenger on the Minnedosa Tells of Establishment of Industry There.

That a silver fox farm has been established at Golspie, in the North of Scotland, and is to be known as the Ben Bhragie Farm, was an announcerent made by A. E. Jarvis of Torco, who is representing the new enerprise and who arrived here last night on the Canadian Pacific Steamship Minnedosa. Mr. Jarvis will proceed to P. E. Island where he will purchase some prize animals. They will be kept on the island until next summer and will then be shipped to Golspie. The new enterprise is in its experimental stages. The conditions in the North of Scotland are reported ideal for fox raising.

Harrower, an engineer in the employ of the Marmon Tube Company of Montreal, who had been to England, Paris, Vienna looking into manufacturing conditions.
