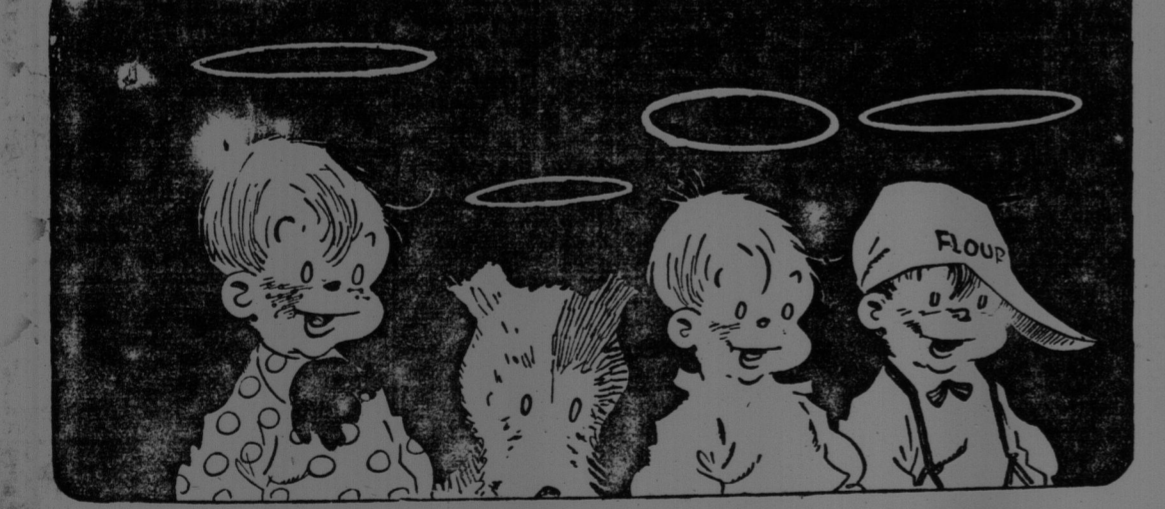

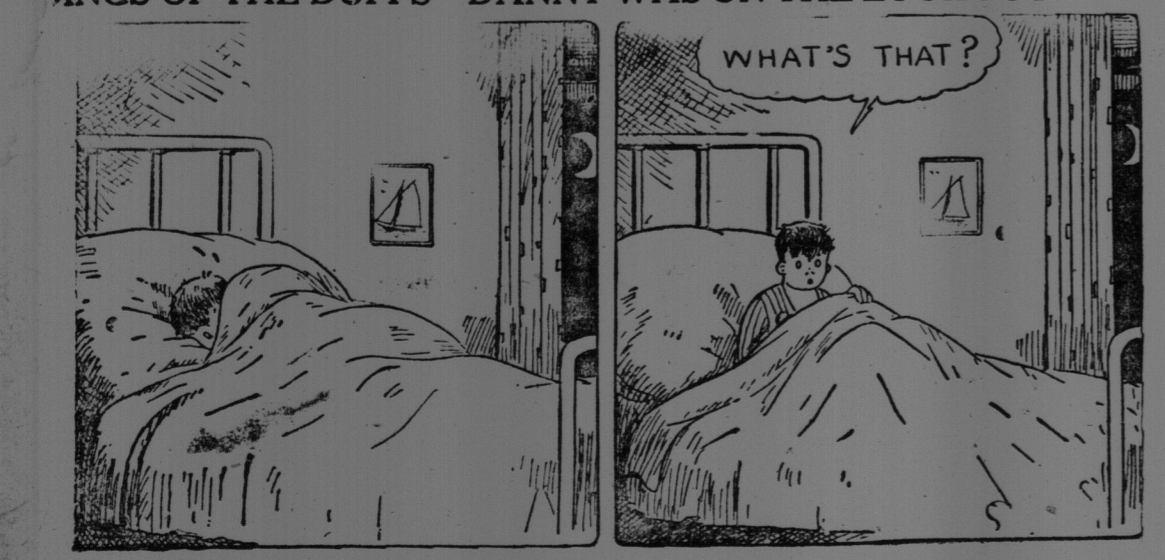

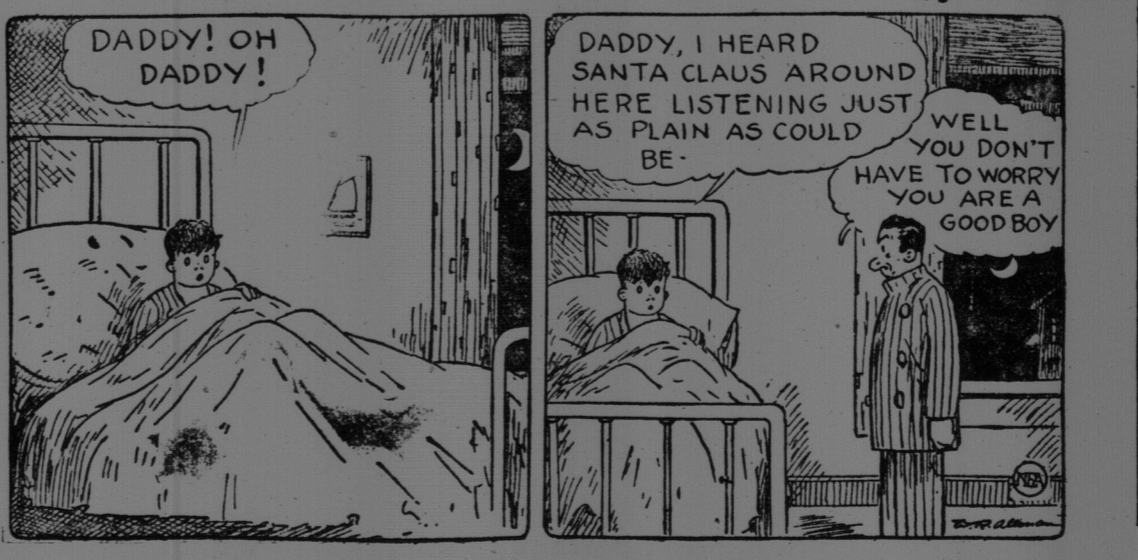

Charlie Gorman, Back From Boston With McGowan, is Confident.

"If I don't beat the American skaters at the Olympics next month I'll row back from France," was a statement made by Charlie Gorman today upon his arrival from Boston. Charlie was accompanied by his trainer Everett McGowan, who will work out with him until his departure for France on January 11. McGowan says that Jew-traw is the fastest of the United States skaters going to the Olympics and that in every race in the Boston Arena Gorman beat him. The manager of the Arena after witnessing the races in Boston last Saturday told McGowan that Gorman is faster than any one of them.

Speaking of the report that Gorman would compete in the pursuit races, which has evoked criticism, Mr. McGowan said he had no intention of entering him, but appreciated the fact that the coupling of his name with the events meant good advertising for his charge.

Charles Owens, one of the members of the Gorman committee, was at the station when the train arrived and the first thing he did was to assure Mr. McGowan that the committee had absolute confidence in him.

Gorman says he is in fine condition and is skating faster than ever before. He feels that his trip to Boston has done him the world of good and he speaks highly of McGowan as a trainer.

TAKEN TO HOSPITAL. Percy G. James, who was a victim of gas from a motor boat engine on Saturday and was removed to the General Public Hospital, was reported to be improving rapidly.

CHRISTMAS BUSINESS GOOD. A good Christmas trade is reported by the merchants generally and in some instances better than last year. Most of them report that the buying this year is of moderate priced goods.

BURIED TODAY. The funeral of the infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Dorey was held this afternoon from her parents' residence, Duke street. Service was conducted by Rev. Canon Armstrong, and interment was in Fernhill.

A DANDELION OF DEC. 23. St. John is bound to hold the record for out of season blooms, and this morning there was sent in to The Times a dandelion in full bloom which was picked in Lancaster avenue on December 23.

INDULGE IN P. T. One of the sights at the immigration shed yesterday was a number of German immigrants going through their physical exercises. It is understood this was a demonstration on the boat enroute to St. John.

ENGAGEMENT ANNOUNCED. Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Finley, 54 Erie street, announce the engagement of their daughter, Margaret Pearl, to John Howard Jewett of Regina, Sask., the wedding to take place at an early date.

IS HOME FROM WEST. George Willigar, who has been living in the west for the last fifteen years, arrived in the city yesterday and will spend the holidays with his family at George Willigar, and sister, Mrs. O. Gibbs, Orange street. Mr. Willigar's home is in Neville, Sask.

SEVEN ARE FINED. A too early celebration of the festive season was evidently responsible for seven men appearing in the police court this morning charged with drunkenness. Five had been arrested late Saturday afternoon and evening and two yesterday. All seven were fined \$8 and in default of payment will have to serve two months in jail.

CARLETON LIGHTING. That the citizens of the West Side who had their services installed, these numbering between 33 and 40, would have hydro for Christmas Day, was stated this morning at the office of the City Power Commission. The wires for these lights were laid by the city and all that remains to be done is to tie the lines together at the foot of Rockland Road.

CHASES ASSAILANT. Max Seresky, 576 Main street, had an experience on Saturday evening which he is not anxious to repeat. While descending the sidewalk in front of his store three young men came along and one of them hit Mr. Seresky in the face and the three of them ran away. He gave chase but was unable to catch the offender. The police were notified but were not able to locate the assailant of Mr. Seresky.

CRYING "BABY" SCARES PORTER. A pullman porter got an awful shock on Saturday morning when a bundle which he was carrying was heard to cry "mama" and when his mother saw the second time he was one scared porter. The owner of the parcel however denied him when she explained that it was only a doll for a little girl in St. John.

TO SING IN SQUARE. There will be singing on four nights this week around the community Christmas tree, which has been placed in King Square, under the auspices of the High School. All music tonight the High School girls will sing carols; Wednesday evening the choir of St. David's and Queen Square churches will sing; Friday evening the choir of Stone and St. James' churches, and on Saturday night the Portland Methodist choir and others. The singing will start at 7 o'clock each evening except Friday, when it will begin at 7.30.

BUSY PLACES. The post office and the local offices of the express companies were busy places today and will be until late tonight. Despite the extra help put on at the post office it has been found almost impossible to cope with the flood of matter coming in but a strenuous effort is being made to have every parcel and letter delivered in time to be opened on Christmas Day. The express companies have extra teams at work but even at that they are finding it hard work to keep up with deliveries and with what comes in on today's trains they will be kept on the jump.

CARS CAME TOGETHER. It was slippery going this morning for the motor traffic and in at least one instance there was a collision of automobiles. Numbers 4665 and 1413 were the cars that hit. One was traveling on Charlotte street, another along Queen to the Charlotte street corner. A sedan was parked nearby. As the Queen street car swung around, the driver saw the danger of hitting the sedan and at the same time the risk of a crash with the other. Then the slippery roadway did its work. The moving cars came together. Strange to say each sustained the same damage as the other, a bent mud guard and a hub cap knocked off. No one really was in fault.

DEATH OF CHILD. Friends of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Dorey, 87 Duke street, will sympathize with them in the death of their little baby, Myrtle M., aged 7 months, 7 days, which occurred on December 21. The little one was taken ill about a week ago and was taken to the General Public Hospital where a critical operation was performed. Everything was done to save the child's life, but she passed away just a week later. Besides her parents she leaves one brother and two sisters, all at home. The funeral took place this afternoon.

REPORT GIVEN ON CATHOLIC ORPHANS

One Hundred and Ninety-five Boys and Girls and 57 Infants Under Care.

In the Cathedral yesterday a statement of the number of children under care in the Catholic orphanages of the city and of the money contributed during the year for their support was read. It showed 112 boys, 86 girls and 57 infants in the institutions on Jan. 1, 1923 and at present 103 boys, 90 girls and 57 infants. The contributions totaled \$2,206.75. The principal items were:— Christmas collections—Cathedral \$1,554.45; St. Peter's, \$276.69; St. John Baptist, \$308.29; Church of the Assumption, \$150; St. Rose's, \$132.50; Holy Trinity, \$236; St. Patrick Day collection, Cathedral, \$334.65; St. John the Baptist, \$25.84; Holy Trinity, \$115.28; Entertainments, Church of Assumption, \$150; St. Rose's \$116.25; St. Peter's, \$220.05; Y. M. C. I. \$79.18; picnic, Cathedral, \$2,165.41; St. Peter's and Holy Trinity, \$1,532.45; Cathedral poor boxes, \$402.91; bequest from James McDade, \$230; donation from International Skating Meet dinner \$25.

ASKING 50 CENTS NOW FOR TURKEY

Fortunate indeed were the house-holders who grasped opportunity by the forelock and laid in their Christmas turkey on Saturday at prices ranging from 35 to 40 cents a pound. For this morning, while there was a fairly good supply of festive birds to the city market, the price remained firm at 50 cents a pound, and dealers expressed the opinion that there would be no falling off of this price. The sale of turkeys on Saturday was said by some to have established a record in local market history and the tremendous supply which was on hand when the market opened was pretty well depleted on Saturday night. The supply this morning was small compared to that of the week-end, but it is expected that the demand will be well supplied. Prices of other poultry remained about the same as on Saturday—ducks and geese, around 35 cents; chickens, 30 to 35 cents, and fowl, about 25 cents.

IS OF DIOCESE OF ARCHBISHOP CASEY

Father Wagner Arrives on Minnedosa After Visit to France.

"May you have a Merry Christmas" was the kindly greeting accorded a representative of The Times when he introduced himself to Rev. Father James Wagner, a well-known missionary of Western Canada, who arrived on the Canadian Pacific steamship Minnedosa. He said that he had been in France on a visit to relatives and was returning to British Columbia, where he is attached to the diocese of Archbishop Casey, who was formerly Bishop of the St. John Diocese.

Father Wagner has been in the missionary field for 24 years, and his work has largely been among Indians and white men in the region around Penticton and Okanagan Valley. He said that the members of his mission band cover northwestern territory as far as Mackenzie River and in the early days had penetrated the north as far as Alaska. As he hurried off to attend to his baggage he expressed a hope that the good people of St. John would have a very Merry Christmas and a Happy and Prosperous New Year. He also wished to be remembered to the priests in this diocese, and joined in congratulations to Very Rev. Dean Collins and Very Rev. Monsignor Walsh on their anniversaries.

BOARD OF TRADE NOTES

A representative of one of Baltimore's prominent business firms has asked the Board of Trade for information respecting St. John and such localities in the province as have attractive histories. The Calgary Board of Trade writes that some of the crop yields in Alberta this year are phenomenal and the average all over that province is very high. The wheat crop, it is stated, will exceed 175,000,000 bushels.
