

Brenan said that he thought her collar bones or shoulder blades had been broken as well as her face being injured.





"DEAD" MAN WIRES HE IS "ALIVE AND KICKING"

Six Servants Had Identified Body as That of London President.

London, April 5.—(By Mail).—Every one in Bologne is bewildered by the extraordinary identity mystery that has followed the discovery of an Englishman's body in Bologne harbor, reports the Bologne correspondent of "The London Daily Express."

It was announced that the body was that of Herbert Gilbody, of Upper Horsey-rise, London. Six servants at hotels were Mr. Gilbody had stayed here saw the body and "identified" it as that of Mr. Gilbody.

"I am personally acquainted with Mr. Gilbody. I was advised of the discovery, viewed the body and found a remarkable facial and physical likeness," says the correspondent. "Shop marks on the clothing—London and Lancashire—confirmed my impression. I had no doubt at the time that the body was Mr. Gilbody's."







First, "Is the recreation centre just for
games?" second, "Are parties the chief
thing down there?" third, "Does the
Y. W. reach the class of girls you want
to reach?"

The recreation 'centre is not an entertainment bureau. It is not primarily, a place of amusement. It assuredly is not for any particular "class." What an extraordinary word to use in connection with the Young Women's Christian Association!—for the associations and the connection with the connection of the second connection of the conn

Christian Association!—for the association recognizes neither race, sect nor creed; its work lies among all types of girls in the community; and we want them all.

The erroneous idea of our work suggested by the first two questions arises from a widespread misconception of the true significance of the word "recreation." Recreation does not mean amusement; it does not mean "just games;" but it does mean all those activities that we do from choice, which lead to health and happiness. It is play that transforms and develops and actually makes over!

that transforms and develops and actually makes over!

Our Y. W. test for recration is simply this: Do the things that our girls do in their leisure hours make them better able to carry on the next day's duties? Do the activities in which they indulge at the recreation centre renew them in body, mind and spirit until they fairly radiate health and good cheer? Proper recreation is a thing of the spirit and it has the power to transform, to make over, to re-create a girl into another and altogether better, person. Countless times I have seen it done.

Moreover, what is recreation for one girl or one group of girls may be the very last thing that should be indulged in by another group. Hence Y. W. C. A. workers study their girls and, after thorough knowledge of conditions which surround them, they draw up a which surround them, they draw up a programme calculated to meet that group's particular need. Youth demands some outlet for its exuberance of spirits, and the Y. W. C. A. encourages' all wholesome fun, not only among our girls but between them and their men friends as well.

their men friends as well.

Now, just a word as to the origin of recreation centres as an important part in Y., W. C. A. work. In face of the world-wide social unrest and the danger of lowered moral standards resulting from the disintegration of society following the great war, the Y. W. C. A. felt impelled to make a special effort to reach eyery group of girls in the community if the standard of young Canadian womanhood were to be kept up. Hence it established, recreation centres (under careful supervision) as counter-attractions to the lower forms of certain commercialized amusement resorts.

These recreation centres bring within reach of the underpriviliged girl—as well as her more fortunate sister—good cheer, friends and healthful activities.


