Under No Circumstances Will Fight The Mexican People

MERELY A MATTER WITH HUERTA

Wilson Makes Statement in Position Following Refusal of Mexican Dictator to Salute Flag---Both Houses of Congress to Meet This Afternoon

(Canadian Press.) Washington, April 20-President Wilson told the Washington correspondents today not to get the impression that the United States was going to have war with Mexico. He pointed out that under o circumstances would the United States fight the Mexican people; that it was their friend.

Mr. Wilson said he was going to congress, to tell of a special situation. He declared the issue was only one between the United States and a man who calls himself president of Mexico but whom the United States had never recognized as entitled to that right.

The president said the intention of the United States was to help the people of Mexico and that he had gotten a feeling of uneasiness when he found the wspapers filled with enthusiasm for

Mr. Wilson declared he did not want war, and that he did not consider such reprisals as are planned acts of war, but measures short of war sustained by the Graytown precedent, for one.

He said that in reality he was going

to congress on an occasion for which, strictly speaking, it was not necessary to obtain authority, but that it was his desire to have the full co-operation and thought and purpose of congress. A new field of application in the use of eil fuel has been introduced by the government at Fort Baker, Cal. Just as it is customary to distribute water and gas throughout a town for commercial and domestic purposes, the fuel oil is here piped through the streets and delivered to residences and other buildings under a presure of 80 pounds, where it is need by the pressors and doil burners.

The oil is delivered by tank steamer and is pumped into a distributing reservoir of 10,000 gal. capacity at an elevation of 200 ft., and from here it is distributed through 4-in. wrought-steel pipes the limit to which it is desirable to pump from the steamers. The reservoir is constructed in red rock, lined with 5 in. of concrete on the sides with wire fabric as reinforcing; the interior was sprayed with cement gum and is roofed over. From this storage reservoir the oil is pumped into a distributing reservoir of 10,000 gal. capacity at an elevation of 200 ft., and from here it is distributed throughout the entire reservation, except the branches to houses, which are 2 in. Care had to be taken to have the pipe lines tight and provide for expansion and contraction by inserting U-bends bedded in sand every 800 ft. Gate valves on any part can be shut off without interfering with the rest.
