GLAD TO DISCUSS
IRISH MATTERS

Sinn Fein Attitude on British
Reply.

Dublin, Sept. 8.—Signs of confidence and good spirits were again apparent among the Sinn Fein leaders at the Mansion House here today. They have received knowledge of the contents of Premier Lloyd George's reply to Eamonn De Valera, which will be made public here this evening at the same time that the note is given out by the British. So far as could be gathered, the Irish leaders were not disturbed or surprised by the premier's communication.

Invitation to Conference at
Inverness, Only Condition
That Ireland Remain in
Empire—London Press
Comment.

London, Sept. 8.—Reports that the message sent to the republican leaders by the meeting of the British cabinet at Inverness yesterday was an invitation to a conference to be held on Sept. 20, on condition that Ireland should remain within the empire, were printed by several newspapers here today. Those newspapers which comment editorially upon these reports express satisfaction that the door to peace has been left open.



ANNAPOLIS ROYAL SUFFERS BY FIRE

One-third of Town Burned, With Loss—Water Supply Inadequate—Dynamite Used to Prevent Fire Spreading.

The entire business section of Annapolis Royal and a large portion of the residential district was destroyed yesterday afternoon by a fire which is thought to have started in a barn in the rear of the Queen hotel. The fire, which started at 4.15 o'clock, soon spread to the hotel itself, and soon the east side of George street was in flames. No water could be obtained from the reservoir on account of the dry weather, and salt water had to be hauled from the harbor. A dense fog wet the trees, and in this way the flames were in many instances greatly checked. Dynamite was used in some instances to destroy buildings in order to prevent the further spread of the flames, but the supply available last night was very limited. At ten o'clock last night it was reported that the fire was under control after having wiped out approximately one-third of the town. The loss is estimated at \$200,000 to \$250,000.

1,500,000 ITALIANS TO MOVE TO MEXICO


A Huge Colonization Scheme Backed by Subsidiary Morgan Interests.

Vancouver, Sept. 8.—The Magdalena Bay Improvement Company, backed by subsidiary Morgan interests to the extent of many millions of dollars, has, after twenty years' labor, finally secured control of 5,000,000 acres in Lower California, embracing a stretch of Mexican territory 300 miles long by eighteen miles wide. L. A. Walker, for many years superintendent of a Vancouver milling and grain company, has been appointed assistant general sales manager of the concern.

Arrangements have already been made by the Italian government for the migration of 1,500,000 Italians to the new colony, where they will engage chiefly in agriculture. 

URGE PAVING OF MARSH ROAD

Delegation Heard Today at City Hall.

The Question of an Incinerator—Commissioner Bullock Brings in a New Regulation Relative to Top Wharfage.

A delegation appeared before the common council in committee this morning to urge immediate action with regard to the paving of the Marsh road. Their request was promised every consideration. Commissioner Jones was authorized to renew the ten-inch main in Prince William street from King to Princess. Provision was made for further work at the Newman Brook bridge, the amount involved not to exceed \$600. Commissioner Bullock submitted some proposed changes in the city by-laws with reference to charges for top wharfage and extra charges for storage.

T. P. Regan, president of the New Brunswick Automobile Association, was the spokesman for the delegation and said that it was present to urge immediate action with reference to paving the Marsh road. The delegation, he said, was representative of residents from the city, from the vicinity of the Marsh bridge, and from points out of the city. Representatives from the Rothsey road, the delegation, from the McAvity plant, situated on the Marsh road, were also present. He thought this an opportune time to go on with the work.

The mayor said the water system out there had to be taken into consideration. Water connection had been made from City road and other points, and these, he thought, should be settled now.

Mr. Regan asked if there was any objection to taking up the work at once. The mayor said a large amount of money had been spent in road construction, but it was desirable that the work be undertaken. The city was anxious to do it, as it would provide employment.

Commissioner Frink said this work was proposed last spring. The contractor in Douglas avenue had bought a modern asphalt plant and this, with the one the city had, made two, but there was enough work now being done to keep both busy until the snow came. He suggested that as there would be very little excavation it would not afford very great opportunity for manual labor. He thought only about forty or fifty men would be employed. Only one side, he thought, could possibly be done this fall. The price of asphalt had fallen from \$44 a ton to \$33. He would bring in a recommendation regarding the work. Mr. Regan said one contractor had told him he could do it this fall.

Commissioner Frink said the type of road to be built had not yet been determined. There were bituminous concrete and asphalt, but it was not yet determined what it would be.

The mayor said if the work were not done it would be a question of immediate finances. The council had been hammered because it spent too much money.

Commissioner Frink said he had looked at the bond list this morning and it totalled more than three-quarters of a million dollars.

Prince William Street Pipe.

Commissioner Jones moved that he be authorized to renew the ten-inch main in Prince William street between Prince and King, a distance of 700 feet, the work to be done by day's work and paid for out of the independent balance on the bond issue. The ten-inch pipe was seventy-three years old, and was leaking badly. He told the committee that electrolysis was doing a great deal of damage to the pipes. His motion was carried.

Regarding protection to the concrete arch at the Newman Brook bridge, he read a letter from the city engineer in connection with the payment to Linton & Saab for the work, estimated to cost \$600. As it appeared that this matter was not cared for in the resolution authorizing the work, he moved that the controller be authorized to pay an amount not exceeding \$600 to Linton & Saab on certification of the city engineer, for the placing of a sand cushion on the arch, to be paid for out of the bond issue for the work. The motion carried.

Tearing Up Streets.

Mr. Jones said he wanted to draw the attention of the council to a criticism after levelled at the department of water and sewerage because the pipes became corroded because of electrolysis and the street be torn up. He recommended that the city electrician be requested to present a report in the matter at an early date.

With reference to Newman Brook he said considerable difficulty had been experienced in finding a suitable place as a dumping ground for house refuse and like material. He thought the operations at Newman Brook would provide for this deficiency. The Landsdowne and Dufferin avenue sewers now emptied into the brook tributary to Newman Brook through septic tanks and these were now used to capacity. He thought a trunk sewer would remedy a bad condition of affairs. He moved that the city engineer be requested to submit plans and an estimate of cost of the further extension of the Newman Brook sewer to provide for a proper system of drainage of properties east and south of the new culvert. The motion was carried.

Commissioner Frink expressed the opinion that to allow dumping in the vicinity of Newman Brook would immediately cause a great outcry as it had in the past. An incinerator would have to come sooner or later. The matter of location was a highly vexing question but he thought the incinerator should be installed somewhere.

Top Wharfage.

Mr. Bullock said he would have to submit a resolution concerning charges for top wharfage and also one regarding the charges for top wharfage after the allotted time had expired. A ten day period would be allowed in which to remove merchandise. He brought in a draft of a by-law which on motion was ordered submitted to the council. The draft provided for the repeal of section 2 of an act passed in 1912 to regulate the use of public wharves and warehouses owned or controlled by the city.

LOCAL NEWS

GAME POSTPONED.
It was announced today that the proposed game between St. Peter's and Perth, which was scheduled to be played Saturday afternoon has been indefinitely postponed.

BUSY ON TRAINS.
It was announced at C. P. R. headquarters this morning that suburban traffic this summer was exceptionally heavy and that during the month of August it was the heaviest in many years.

WERE ACQUITTED.
Before Judge Armstrong in the County Court under Speedy Trials this morning James and Fred Moore were acquitted of a charge of theft of a motor car from Philip McGuire. C. H. Ferguson conducted the prosecution, and W. M. Ryan the defence.

AUTO DESTROYED.
Considerable attention is being attracted by the wreck of a large automobile lying near Douglas hill at Trendwell's Lake on the Loch Lomond road. The car was burned on Tuesday night, and so far no effort has been made to remove the wreck. A singular feature is that while the body and chassis of the car are completely burned the tires apparently are not damaged.

A GOOD RECORD.
The quarterly returns for the Canadian Signal Corps, which were received at the local headquarters recently, show that the branch of this corps belonging to military district No. 7 rank second in the dominion with regard to enlistments in proportion to those authorized and also ranks highest in the proportion of certificates issued. The local corps also ranks highest in the number of officers appointed to the unit.

NOVELTY SHOWERS.
Miss Molly O'Leary was pleasantly surprised last evening when friends invaded her home, 44 Murray street, and tendered her a novelty Shower. Miss O'Leary, who is to be the principal in a nuptial event to take place in the near future, was the recipient of many beautiful gifts. During the evening games and music were enjoyed and refreshments served.

There was a very happy gathering of friends in honor of Miss Muriel M. McElay at the home of her parents, North End, last evening, when she was tendered a novelty shower. Some thirty or thirty-five formed the party. Miss McElay, who is soon to be married, received many nice gifts. Dainty refreshments were served.

BURIED TODAY.
The funeral of Charles E. Swanton was held this afternoon. After a short private service at his late residence, the body was taken to St. Mary's church where service was conducted. Rev. Mr. McKinnon officiated at both services. Interment was in Fernhill. Members of the Knights of Pythias, Masonic fraternity, Coal Handlers' Union, Longshoremen's Union, and firemen, in all of which societies Mr. Swanton was a valued member, attended the funeral. The floral offerings were numerous and beautiful.

The body of Samuel E. Holmes was taken to Apohaqui early this morning, accompanied by Jesse E. Higgins. The burial took place at Killarney this afternoon.

The funeral of Robert Dean was held this afternoon from the residence of his daughter, 88 Ludlow street, to the Lorneville cemetery. Rev. J. Heaney conducted the service.

TAX REVISION IN UNITED STATES

Washington, Sept. 8.—The subject of tax revision was up for discussion today between Secretary of the Treasury Mellon and the senate finance committee.

The committee had before it suggestions made to the house ways and means committee by the treasury secretary, revised estimates presented after the White House tax conference last month and the tax bill as passed by the house.

After hearing the secretary, the senate committee will begin its task of rewriting the house bill.

In lieu of this he proposed to insert a provision that no goods or merchandise should remain on any wharf or warehouse for a longer period than ten days, after which time upon notice by the commissioner of harbors, ferries and public lands to the owner of the merchandise to remove the goods, and this not being done, the goods might be removed from the wharf or warehouse at the risk and expense of the owner. If the cost of removal and storage for thirty days or longer should not be paid the commissioner might cause the goods to be sold at auction upon one week's notice in a St. John paper. Out of the proceeds of the sale of the goods the cost of removal, storage and sale should be paid and the balance if any paid to the owner. There was a provision that the harbor master might in his discretion, with the consent of the commissioner, allow the goods to remain for a period of ten days subject to the following charges: for the first four days an amount equal to the wharfage paid on the goods; for each of the second four days double the amount of wharfage paid; for each day thereafter five times the amount of wharfage. If and consignment claimed that he could not remove his goods because of customs regulations he must furnish to the harbor master a certificate from the collector of customs setting forth the cause of the delay. In that case the goods to remain for a further period not exceeding ten days. The agent of every vessel discharging in this port, the cargo of which was subject to wharfage to wharfage dues, would, within twenty-four hours after the final discharge of the vessel have to supply to the harbor master a certificate of discharge and after four days a list of the goods not removed and a description of them.

The mayor asked Commissioner Jones to have the city property in Hickey road patrolled.




