

We have taken last year's returns — Red Bay 120, and Flower's Cove 66, which added to totals in columns C. and D. make 2107 and 2049, instead of 1921 and 1863. - (2) Questions are to be prepared in sections (excepting Greek); two questions in each section of equal value, only one of which shall be answered, thus giving the probationer a choice of questions,
 - (3) That each examiner mark the time required by his paper.
- (4) Five copies of the questions shall be prepared by each examiner (one copy for each district) and sent to the Rev. Jabez Hill, by the 31st of December, 1898.
- (5) All subjects omitted by probationers, must be taken up before ordination.
- (6) All papers when examined shall be returned to the Secretary, Rev. Jabez Hill.
- (7) That a report of marks received be given to each probationer or candidate, signed by the Secretary of Committee, which shall be regarded as a certificate of his standing.
- (8) That two copies of the marks given by the examiner, shall be prepared and sent, one to the chairman of each district, and the other to the Secretary of Examining Board.
- (9) That the Secretary arrange centres wherever practicable for the examination of Candidates and Probationers; such examinations to commence on the first Monday in the month of May.

SPIRITUAL STATE REPORT.

Carefully reviewing the work of God, we rejoice to note that, as the past success has attended our labours on numbers of our Circuits and and Missions, yet we profoundly regret that there is a large falling off in our membership, which should cause great humiliation and personal heart-searching.

We therefore recommend more systematic pastoral visitation and the advisability of securing as far as possible, the most efficient and godly class leaders, that the benefits of class meeting and the privileges of membership be kept continually before our people, also that the distinctive doctrines which as Methodists we profess to believe, be especially emphasized, particularly that of the witness of the Spirit and Christian Perfection.

We recommend that the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper be administered at regular periods in all our churches, to which all members shall not only be invited, but the duty of obeying the Lord's command urged upon them.

We also recommend that Sabbath School and Epworth League work be carried forward vigorously, thus training our young people for active Christian Service, within Methodist lines, and as an example for the young people, the more intelligent members of our church be especially encouraged to attend and take part in our social services. We would also urge upon our people the necessity of family devotion, and the privileges of

joining the Home Department of our Sabbath Schools.

In order to carry out these recommendations we would endeavour, as workers together with God, to live under the shadow of the cross, and seek to obtain the continual baptisms of the Holy Ghost.

SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT.

Your Committee beg to report that they have gone over the reports of the Sunday School of the Conference. 197 Schools have been in operation during the year being a decrease of 4. The total of officers and teachers is 1582 and a grand total of scholars of 13230, an increase of 345.

The holding of quarterly review services in the churches have resulted in good wherever it has been adopted and we recommend wherever possi-

ble that this service be held.

We regret that there is a considerable decrease in the number of Book. Room periodicals taken by our Schools. We would urge upon our people the desirability of having all our Schools supplied from our own Publishing House, as we believe no better literature can be procured anywhere for the same price.

We call attention to the marvellous success of the Home Department of the Sunday School where it has been organized and would recommend the formation of a branch in connection with all our Schools where it is possible. Supplies for this work can be procured from our Book Rooms.

- I—This Committee recommends that every Minister in charge of a Circuit or Mission be requested to preach Temperance Sermons, and that the third Sunday in December be observed as Temperance Sunday, due notice be given to our people of the same.
- 2—We are glad to learn that many of the Magistrates of our land have faithfully enforced the provisions and penalties of the "Local Option Act," and hope that the day is not far distant when all the officials of this Colony shall perform their duty in this respect.
- 3—We strongly recommend that lessons on the injurious effects of Alcohol and Tobacco be given in our day schools, and request our school-Boards to give special attention to this matter.
- 4—Believing that the use of Tobacco is injurious to the youth of our Country, we strongly recommend that an effort be made to secure the introduction of a bill prohibiting the SALE OR USE of Tobacco in any form

We are not among you as lords over God's heritage but as those who have heard the voice from heaven saying "take heed unto yourselves, and to all the flock, over which the Holy Ghost hath made you overseers to feed the church of God which He hath purchased with His own Blood." Feeling ourselves sobered and encouraged by this mighty commission we meet you with words of cheer and blessing. We give thanks to God and the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ praying always for you." We live if ye stand fast in the Lord

Many of you have been sorely tried during the past year, you have received the mark of your Father's love, "whom the Lord loveth He Chasteneth and scourgeth every son whom He receiveth." He hath caused you to pass under the rod." Some of your homes have been stript of all their poetry and sunshine.

We have mingled our tears and cries with those families some of whom fell victims to the almost unparallelled accident the past spring, when forty-eight of our brave seamen perished whilst seeking their bread. Those troubles are too deep for human aid to reach. We commit you to Him, of whom it is said "in all their afflictions He was afflicted, and the angel of His presence saved them, and carried them all the days of old." Our God of love is unchanged. That promise is current gold to day. Claim it as your heritage. But let this accident be heard as God's trumpet blast saying, "be ye also ready for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of man cometh."

Your pastors have not been without encouragement in their effort to win souls for Christ during the past year, but they have not seen those general refreshing showers they have looked for. Our church membership stands as follows: on trial—total membership, 1060. When you come to the preaching of the Word, do you expect God to convince of sin, and save souls there and then under the Word? It used to be so. It was under the Word at Penticost the three thousand were saved. It was while Peter preached to Cornelius and to his company that "the Holy Ghost fell upon them that heard the Word." It was under the Word that the early Methodists had most of their conversions. It was under the preaching of the Word by the late Charles Spurgeon that souls were saved until it was said there was not a seat in that great building but some one had been saved in it. In those days both pastors and people expected it, and got it. Is it so to-day? Is there not too much waiting for an aftermeeting? When you come to Divine Service, come direct from your closet praying for God to save under the Word.

Let your life be one of prayer. It is said of Cornelius, a Roman soldier that "he prayed to God always." St. Paul says, "pray without ceasing." Christ "spake a parable to this end that man ought always to pray and not faint." Guard jealously the spirit of prayer lest there be a restraint. A restraining of prayer means weakness of the soul, it opens the door to temptation, it produces spiritual drowsiness when the locks of modern Sampsons are cut off. Form a habit of daily private prayer at set times—your soul can't prosper without it as it should. Satan keeps his

The

eye on the closet door, and if he sees it seldom opens, or when it is opened the visitor is so quickly out again that he has not had time to do business with heaven, or to press his cause at the mercy seat, then over the door he writes victory for the prince of darkness, and defeat for the prince of peace. The Bible is a history of victories, because it is the history of prayer. We see victories as Abel kneels by his sacrafice; as Abraham pleads for Sodom; as Jacob triumphs on the banks of the Jabbok; as Moses saves a nation from perishing; as Elijah brings fire and water from The New Testament is none the less a history of victories through prayer. You see it at Pentecost, you see it as Peter walks out of prison as the doors fly open. The history of the Christian Church is the same. You see it in the great revival under Luther as he prays five hours a day; and the revival of a hundred and fifty years since Wesley lived. What an impetus this ought to be to the Methodist Church to-day! A great ground swell, to bear our battleships forward to further victories. We urge you to unite with us in mighty prayer for a great revival the coming year.

To make it a permanent and solid one, we give you a few directions. Live at peace with one another, and as far as possible with all men. Let no grudge rankle in your breast, for such will eat as doth a canker, you can't enjoy perfect peace with it. "Confess your faults one to another," rather than talk about others. "If any man among you seem to be religious and bridleth not his tongue, but deceiveth his own heart, this man's religion is vain." Manifest interest in each others welfare. Bear ye one another's burdens and so fulfil the law of Christ." Do good unto all men especially unto them who are of the household of faith." Too often those of the household of faith are passed by, by the members of the church, and the "good" is done aliens, and enemies of Christ. You must do

good to them, but God's children have the first claims.

Don't leave all the visiting of the sick and aged to the Ministers, and Epworth League workers. A kindly visit by a Member of the church will be a benediction that will linger long after the visitor has left. "Pure religion and undefiled, before God and the Father is this, to visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction and to keep himself unspotted from the world." One of Mr. Wesley's earliest arrangements in his societies was visiting the sick and needy by the members or officers.

Pe strictly upright in your business relations and engagements with each other. It is no use you praying for a man, or talking religion to him

after he has seen in you a shady transaction.

Be strict in paying your debts or if yon can't do it, tell your creditor so, to prevent him labouring under a wrong impression. Be honest. You can't be dishonest and go to heaven. Render to Caesar the things that are Caesar's. But at the same time don't fail to render to God the things that are God's. Make it a point of conscience to support the church to which you belong, according to your means. Every one is called by God to do this. Christ commended the widow who cast in her two mites. The way to put it into God's palm is to give it to his church and the poor, or what else belongs to God.

The noble band of Class leaders we acknowledge as fellow labourers in the great work of soul saving, and building up the Church of Christ.

We look to you to be chief instruments in keeping the flock of Christ in the fold by looking after the sheep and lambs. Keep the rule, to see each member once a week if possible. Let not one slip through your fingers for want of looking after, and following up. It was by indefatigable diligence in this direction that a young man was kept in society, when he was disposed to backslide; who became one of the brightest stars, and a mighty soul winner in the British Conference, the late Rev. Peter Mac-Kenzie. A soul kept, is better than a soul won. Your office is one of the most important in Methodism. A great success, or a great failure, will be the sum total of each class leader. Immortal souls are committed to your trust. Feed them with food convenient, milk for babes, and strong meat for men. Feed men with only milk, and they will be weaklings. Feed babes with strong meat and they will die.

Don't lel them slip into a set of common place phrases, which express no experience of the soul; ascertain their state, if it be by pointed questions. Don't let them rest without the witness of the Spirit, if the Spirit of God does not tell them they are Christians, there is no other way they can know

Members of the church: -- be in your places at the class-meeting every week if possible. Stop away one week and it will be harder to go the Your soul can't be in health without Christian fellowship. It was one of the marks of the early Christians "they continued steadfastly in the

Apostles' doctrines and fellowship."

To be strong Christians it is necessary to cultivate the intellectual side of your piety. God has given man a head as well as a heart. The mind must be instructed as well as the soul warmed. Well meant zeal without intelligence may do much harm. Above all things study your Bible daily. Next to that, study Methodist history, its polity, its doctrines, its biographies, there is nothing that will inflame your soul with the purest fire There is an inspiration to be got here you can't get anywhere else outside the Bible. The more you study your own church the more you will love it, the better you will support it, and the more firm, settled, peaceful and useful will your religious life be. We believe God never raised up a better Church than the Methodist. To this end be sure to take one or more Methodist papers. We have the "Christian Guardian" the "Wesleyan," and the "Monthly Greeting" belonging to our own Conference ably edited by our own Ministers. One or more of these should be in every Methodist family.

Let parents see that good reading matter be provided for their children suitable to their capacity. Every home, where children are, should be supplied with our Sabbath School papers, and excellent Magazines so

splendidly edited by our own Dr. Withrow.

Let our educational institution have your hearty support. We rejoice in the advancement of education led on by our Superintendent of Education Dr. Milligan, and our excellent College staff headed by Professor Holloway.

Let the annual appeal for our College, which for successful work done shows itself the first in the Island, meet with a hearty response. It is yours and by helping it, you help yourselves.

Be true to the Temperance cause. Let every family be a little temperance society. Rest not until the temperance sentiment be so strong that no Government will dare to cast the Temperance Bill into the waste paper basket. The horrid brand of intemperance must be wiped out.

Endeavour to make your homes little sanctuaries where God is daily reverently worshipped, His Commandments kept, His Sabbaths observed.

Stand by your Sunday School, it needs no apology. Its usefulness has been tried for more than one hundred years, its fruit vindicates the necessity of its existence. It is too late in the day to cast a slur on this God honoured institution.

You Epworth League workers;—go on in the name of the Lord. The missing link seems to have been found, to connect our young people more closely to Methodism. We rejoice in the great work you are doing on so many circuits.

Rally round the week night services. Let it be seen that you are more than a Sabbath Day Christian. The moral Jericho needs to be compassed more than once a week. Leave your homes and business, for God's house lest you be found pitching your tents toward Sodom.

Where the Methodist Catechism is not taught in the Sabbath School, insist that it be learned at home; it will, we believe, tend to make your children better Methodists, and give them loftier ideas of God and the Bible.

Be sure you are clear in your acceptance with God. Don't rest in the fact that you were once converted. Don't be satisfied so sing "happy day that fixed my choice on Thee my Saviour and my God." If you can't go further than that Satan himself can out-strip you, for he can say he was once an angel in heaven, you must bring your religious experience down to the present moment, and be able to say "My God I am thine, what a comfort divine, what a blessing to know that my Jesus is mine." "Hereby we know that we dwell in Him, and He in us, because He hath given us of His Spirit." We often find members of our church who have no religious experience, the fine gold has become dim, the fire has burntitself out, and cold ashes only remain. In such members, the church carries a dead weight, such make the Almighty sick, "so because thou art luke-warm, and neither cold nor hot I will spue thee out of My mouth." If such be the condition of any one of you, don't spend one day more without repenting, and doing your first works.

Watch against the Spirit of the age, which is love of power, wanting to rule rather than be ruled; levity and frivolity, which even worm their way into sacred things, making religion a kind of a fantasia with its changing airs suit the Spirit of the world. So contrary to the teaching of the word, "the end of all things is at hand, be ye therefore sober, and watch unto prayer." The thirst to make money, making haste to be rich, living beyond the means, for sake of appearances, which is the sure road to ruin,

Earnestly strive to enjoy the blessing of perfect love. The great bulwark of the Church at the time of the Reformation was justification by Another mighty stronghold was added, when the Wesleys began preaching entire sanctification by the Spirit; a doctrine which had been but partially developed. One is the foundation, the other the top stone of God's temple on earth. We urge you to live in the upper story of this temple, you will get more sunshine, breathe a purer atmosphere, from the hills of heaven; fewer clouds to dim your spiritual vision you will have a more passionate love for souls redeemed by Blood divine, a stronger faith to pluck them as brands from the burning; and bring more glory to your Father in heaven. You must press after this or lose your Justification. If you have lost the blessing seek it again. Wesley says of them who profess ed to obtain it, "hardly one in thirty retained it," but the twenty-nine must come again. He urged young converts to seek it directly after being justified. It is the cream of the sincere milk of the Word.

Seek the full baptism of the Holy Ghost. This is not a prize for a select few. The company at the upper room was representative. Report of the Executive Board of Governors for the year ending June 30th, 1898.

The College year now about to close completes the Quadrennial term of the present Board of Governors. The record of the past four years has been one of steady advance in educational work. This is quite apparent from the results of C. of H. E. examinations tabulated as follows and publised in the Collegian.

This year the numbers sitting for exams., were associate 9, Senior .53. Junior 78, London Matric. 5. The results will not be known until September, but Mr. Holloway says, "whatever they are they will have been obtained by work done in a normal way, in the usual school hours and without undue pressure upon our pupils." Drill has now become a daily practice and the value of this attention to physical development of the pupils both male and female was very evident in the interesting exhibition which closed the College exercises for the present year.

Much credit is due to the Principal Mr. Holloway, to Miss Allison and the whole staff for their untiring interest in their work, and for the

brilliant success of the College examinations of last year.

The Home is in a very satisfactory condition under the careful management of Rev. M. Fenwick assisted by Mrs. Fenwick.

He reports as resident during the year 51 Boarders viz. 1 Lady Teacher,

17 Pupil Teachers, 9 Ministers children, and 24 other Boarders.

The health of the Home was excellent, until Easter when it was invaded by the prevailing epidemic of measles, 15 cases occured causing much extra work and anxiety, but thanks to a kind Providence and the fully amou of thi Insur

The current account is not yet finalized but the income for the year amounts to about \$6500 and the Expenditure to \$5400 balance \$1100. of this sum \$400 goes for furnishing and \$500 to the Treasurer for interest Insurance, etc.

of this amount \$469.96 has been applied to the reduction of debt and \$100 to interest leaving a nett balance of \$209.27.

This result is very satisfactory especially when we remember that the receipts for hire of Hall are much less than they were the two preceding years.

In this connection honorable mention should be made of the efforts of the Ladies College Aid Society. During the past year they have raised the handsome sum of \$879 in addition to a balance on hand from last year of \$267, of these amounts \$40 have been paid to Drill Instructor, \$500 voted to interest account and \$500 to pay for alterations in the College Hall by the addition of lavatories and improved kitchen appliances, under plans furnished by Mr. Ayre and supervised by himself and Mr. Bishop. The ladies are under obligation to Mrs. J. J. Rogerson for the presentation to their society, for publication, of an edition of her poems entitled "Victorian Triumph." This work has been highly spoken of and the gift is much appreciated by the Society. When all the volumes have been sold it will add quite a little to their funds.

We can now submit the Treasurer's financial statement of our whole indebtedness to 30th, June.

or \$2913.03 less than the amount reported last year. This indebtedness will we anticipate be further reduced by \$500 voted by the Ladies College Society, and \$500 from the surplus earnings of the Home.

The growing importance of the College, as an educational institution, to the interests of Methodism in Newfoundland must be apparent to every member of this Board and in relinquishing the trust we have held for four years, we do so in the hope and faith that the record of the College under the regime of the incoming Board during the coming quadrennium, will be one of increasing success and efficiency.
