Who was one of the earliest pioneers of Methodism, traversing under the most inauspicious circumstances, scarcely imaginable at this day, nearly the whole length and breadth of Canada. Being then youthful, vigorous, and willing, as well as able, he spared no labour either of body or mind, to make the sound of the Gospel, simultaneous with that of the woodman's axe; nor was he too proud to partake in the humblest cottage, the woodman's fare. This veteran of the cross of Christ, believing that he was called of God to preach the Gospel, offered himself as a candidate for the Ministry to the U. States M. E. Church—by whom he was accepted, and under whose jurisdiction he labored creditably and successfully till the year 1829. Deeply imbaed with love to God, and love to immortal souls, James Jackson well sustained the character of a Christian Missionary—for he " counted not his life dear unto himself." Truly

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philantrophic and zealous, he came to plant the standard of the cross, and preach the doctrines of Methodism in this land, regardless of pecuniary consequences. He endured hardness as a good soldierpenetrating trackless forests,-fording bridgeless waters-seeking out families, submerged in dense woods-isolated from the living To these, he preached the unsearchable riches of Christ, in their own houses, for want of Chapels. The converted portions of these families, are now filling up the ranks of Christian Churches. A great company will praise God to all eternity, that they ever heard his voice, among whom are many of the best friends of our cause. One event in our departed brother's career, was his union in 1829 with the Canadian Wesleyan Methodist Church, with whom he labored to establish the principle of mutual rights in religious churches. In their struggles he participated until the union of the Canadian Wesleyan Church, with the Methodist New Connexion in 1840. In connexion with this united Church he labored till increasing infirmities obliged him to retire on the Supernumerary List. For a short period after this, he lived in retirement, till the Great Head of the Church, called him to his rest in Heaven. He fell asleep in Jesus on the 6th of July, 1851, at his residence in the Township of Middleton, Norfolk, C. W.

As an apology for the brevity of the foregoing notice, it is designed to furnish our anxious friends with a suitable biography, as soon as the requisite documents can be obtained.

Brother Henry Coates, was a native of the west of England, from which place he emigrated to Canada while in the bloom of life, being then a Local Preacher, in the Wesleyan Methodist Church. He first became acquainted with our body, and united with us, when Brethren J. Bell, and J. Simpson, travelled upon the Lansdowne and Rideau Circuit, viz. in 1841; the same year he was taken out to travel on that Circuit as a supply. He afterwards located until the year 1846, at which time he was again employed to labor on the Trafalgar Circuit, to supply the place of Bro. E. Baily, have had been forced to desist from travelling in consequence of ill health. At the ensuing Conference he was received as an Itinerant Minister on trial, and was by that Conference sent to labor on the Owen Sound Mission. During that year his labors were of the most arduous character; but having no other object in view but the glory of God, the salvation of souls, and the extension of the kingdom of Christ, by the assistance of Divine Grace, he met every difficulty and endured every privation with christian fortitude and christian resignation, having an eye to the recompense of reward. The year following he travelled again on Trafalgar Circuit, and the year afterwards he was appointed to London North. The last sphere of Bro. Coates' labor

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was the Howard Mission; a short time after his appointment to that Mission he became the victim of a disease, which resulted in congestion of the brain, and that in the termination of his temporal existence, which event took place on the 30th August, 1851; when his happy spirit fled to the regions of the blest, there in company with the redeemed to sing the praises of God forever.

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I. ON GENERAL MATTERS.

- Res. 1. That the Rev. J. H. Robinson preside over the deliberations of this Conference.
 - 2. That the Rev. J. C. Watts be our Secretary.
- 3. That the Rev. H. Wilkinson be our Recording Secretary.
- 4. That the Rev. N. C. Gowan be our Conference Re-
- 5. That the Prince Edward and South Bay Circuits be reunited.
 - 6. That the Ekfrid and St. Thomas Circuits be reunited.
- 7. That the Fitzroy and Goulburn Circuits be divided, and that all the appointments north of the twelfth line of Goulburn compose the Fitzroy Circuit, and the remaining appointments of the present Circuit, compose and be called the Marlborough Circuit.
- 8. That instead of the column in the Minutes headed "Members of Families," the "Average number of Congregations," be inserted.
- 6. That Bro. Breakenridge's probation be extended another year on account of his absence from Conference.
- 10. That Bro. B. P. Brown's probation be extended another year for the same reason.

- 11. That in the event of any Local Elders desiring to attend this Conference, it shall be their duty to notify in writing the January quarterly meeting of the Circuit, on which they reside, of such intention, and the quarterly meeting, if they see fit, shall elect from among themselves a suitable layman to accompany him; and both local elder and layman shall be furnished with certificates in the same way as the regular itinerant ministry.
- 12. That the Rev. J. Wilkinson and T. T. Howard prepare a memoir of our deceased Brother, James Jackson, for insertion in the "Christian Sentinel."
- 18. DISTRICT MEETINGS, Their Constitution and func-

These meetings shall be composed of all the travelling Preachers in the District, and of lay representatives appointed by the Quarterly Meetings. Whenever it is practicable the lay-representative of a Circuit at the Conference shall be its representative to the District Meeting, and should more than one Circuit Preacher go to a District Meeting from a Circuit, such Circuit shall be entitled to the right of sending a corresponding number of lay members to the District Meeting. All our travelling Ministers shall be required to attend these meetings.

A chairman shall be appointed by the conference to each District, who shall be responsible for the proper conduct of these meetings; but should the General Superintendent of Misssions be present at any District Meeting he shall preside on the occasion.

Ordinarily, there shall be two District Meetings in each year, the first to be held on the 2nd Wednesday in October, the last, to be held on the 2nd Wednesday in May. All other District Meetings during the year shall be deemed special.

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A special District Meeting for the transaction of urgent business, may be appointed at any period of the year, by the Annual Committee of the Connexion, or by the request of the Chairman of the District, and any two Ministers within the District—and of which at least ten days notice shall be given to every Superintendent in the District. The consent of the Annual Committee shall, in all cases be requisite to the validity of a special District Meeting; and no other business shall be transacted but that specified in the notice calling such

The function of ordinary District Meetings shall be to maintain the discipline of the Connexion in the Districts, both as regards Ministers and Members. be competent to arrange for Missionary, or special services in To this end, they shall the District, with a view to promote the work of God among our people. They shall receive, and adjudicate upon appeals made to them by the Quarterly Meetings of the Circuits .-They shall take cognisance of the personal and official conduct of all Ministers, and enqure into the conduct, studies, and general qualifications of all probationers, in the District, and report thereon to the Annual Conference. And should any Circuit deem it necessary to suspend a Preacher from his duties, the District Meeting on the appeal, either of the Preacher or the Circuit, shall examine the case, and give its advice to the parties, and to the Annual Conference.

The May District Meetings shall take special care to have all the statistics, finances, and Connexional business of the District properly arranged; so as to facilitate as far as possible the business of the Annual Conference.

14. That this Conference, feeling deeply the injustice done to a large majority of the inhabitants of Canada so long as the act concerning the Clergy Reserves and Rectories remains unrepealed, desires to reiterate and adopt as its unchanging views, the petition drawn up in 1850; and now directs that

copies of the same be written out and signed by our President and Secretary, and be transmitted in the usual way to the Executive, and to both Houses of the ensuing Legislature.

15. That all letters addressed to the President as the Gen.

eral Superintendent of Missions, be prepaid.

16. That the attention of our Ministers be requested to more strenuous exertions than ever, on behalf of Sabbath Schools, and that the returns of these institutions be made in the month of November.

- 17. That this Conference having received a communication from the Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance, according to instructions, given at their late session in London; in which communication we find a request, that all Ministers do give two lectures in favor of the Maine Liquor Law, in June or July next, we have great pleasure in recommending the above suggestion to all our Ministers, trusting they will comply with it as far as practicable.
- 18. That the next Conference be held in Toronto, commencing the first Wednesday in June, 1853.
- 19. That the Rev. W. McClure, preach the ordination sermon on that occasion.

II. ON FINANCE.

20. That by the resolution inserted in the Conference records for 1851, regarding the increase of the salary of our Ministers, this Conference understands, and hereby declares, that the scale for division of monies raised for the supply of our Ministers, is three to one—that is three quarters of the amount raised (commencing with the year,) be the married Preachers' allotment, and the other quarter be the single Preachers' share.

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21. That in view of the reduced and low state of the Paternal Fund, it is desirable that in addition to the annual collection, that a general subscription be taken up annually, throughout the entire Connexion; and all subscriptions of 1s. 3d. and upwards shall be published in detail in the Minutes of Conference; and the Conference earnestly urges all our people to exert themselves to the utmost to supply the resources necessary to support this most important Connexional

22. That from this session of Conference in future for all time to come, in case of the death of the wife of any of our Ministers, he being ordained, in full connexion, and then travelling a Circuit, or Mission, that notwithstanding such decease, such Minister shall be entitled to receive the whole amount of his salary for that year, from the Circuit, upon which he labors, the same as if his wife were yet living.

23. That the true spirit and meaning of the clause of discipline, referring to the payment of Representatives to Conference is: that both the Minister and the Layman, should be paid their expenses to Conference, and back to the Circuit from which they were sent.

24. To prevent confusion or mistake, it is hereby resolved that the General Superintendent send the share of the Grant to each Preacher stationed on a Circuit, as well as to the Superintendents of the Circuits.

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That the Rev. W. McClure, T. Goldsmith, J. Bell, with J. Cummings, and W. Webb, be the stationing Committee his impartial and chicient services in ed.

26. That the President with brethren McClure, T. T.

Howard, R. H. Brett, J. Bell, and M. Aikman, be a committee to superintend the printing of a new edition of our Discipline, embodying all the Connexional legislation subsequent to the last edition.

- 27. That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to T. Lottridge, Esq., for his valuable services as Treasurer of the Connexion, and that he be re-appointed to that office.
- 28. That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to R. H. Brett, Esq., for his valuable services as Financial Secretary, and that he be re-appointed to that office.
- 29. That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. T. T. Howard, for his valuable services as Missionary Secretary, and that he be re-appointed to that office.
- 30. That the following brethren, be the Annual Committee: namely, the President, with Rev. W. McClure, T. Goldsmith, and Messrs. Brett, and Aikman.

That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Missionary Committee of the past year; and that the following brethren be appointed the Missionary Committee the ensuing year: namely, Rev. J. H. Robinson, W. McClure, T. Goldsmith, T. T. Howard, James Bell, H. Wilkinson, Messre, Lottridge, Capt. Gregory, L. Adams, M. Aikman, J. Good, R. H. Brett, and W. Webb.

That Bro. J. Wilkinson write the address to our Connexion for the next Conference.

That Bro. McClure write the address to the English Connexion next Conference.

That the thanks of the Conference be presented to our President for his impartial and efficient services in the chair.

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That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Secretary for his very efficient services.

ADDRESS

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TO THE

CONNEXION.

BELOVED BRETHREN,—

By the good providence of God, we have been permitted to assemble together in our Annual Conference, as the Ministers and messengers of our Churches; and again the pleasing, yet important duty devolves upon us of addressing to you our fraternal greetings and counsels. Charged with the sacred and responsible task of representing your wishes, watching over your spiritual interests-and devising means to advance the principles and institutions which are dear to our hearts as they are to yours, we have felt the need of Divine assistance and guidance, rightly and usefully to fulfil our mission, so that our deliberations might tend to the glory of God, the salvation of souls, and the consolidation and prosperity of our community. We rejoice to testify that the great Head of the Church has been present with us, specially in our public religious services, and to a gracious and unusual degree, in our Conferential intercourse. 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presence of the Lord. The spirit of power has descended upon our hearts; and with grateful and exulting emotions we have been compelled to exclaim, " Master it is good for us to be here." These visitations from on high we regard as tokens of the divine approval, and as manifest indications of the saving character of our doctrines and ordinances, and of the divine call of those who have spoken to us the word of life.

In our Conference deliberations we have been favored with unusual harmony of feeling and opinion; and though much important business has been transacted—and many difficulties have been confronted, the spirit manifested has been that of men "whose hearts the Lord has touched," and who have but one aim—the glory of God, and the salvation of souls. It rejoices our hearts to perceive the growing intelligence, aptitude, and usefulness of our Ministers-and the order and dispatch with which young and old seem prepared to carry out our excellent connexional discipline. The years of toil and trial which the pioneers of our community had to spend in raising our standards—surveying our field of action, and planting our artillery were not employed in vain. The campaign is not finished but the ground is made sure—the bastions are strengthened—the army, notwithstanding the ravages of death, or the cowardice of occasional desertions, is greatly increased. Passing from these occasions for mutual congratulation, and thankfulness to God, permit us to invite your serious and prayerful attention to several points of vital importance to your own souls, and the strength and prosperity of the Con-

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And, first, we may not omit the word of exhortation as to the state of your own souls in grace, and the means indicated by the Head of the Church for your growth in piety, usefulness, and fitness for heaven. We trust that the cultivation of the gift of God within you, is the object of your most anxious and Grace is a treasure of which many foes diligent attention. would rob us. Grace is a trust which the endowments of an Archangel were not too high to guard and to employ. Grace is the salt wherewith the earth is to be salted—the light wherewith it is to be illuminated—and a charm which a renovated world shall exhibit in the sight of angels and of men. What manner of men, then, ought we to be in all holy conversation and Godliness? How watchful, prayerful, and devoted to God, ought we to be. How constantly should the claims and obligations of our holy profession be present to our minds and hearts; and how richly should we be baptized with the Holy Ghost that we may meet them.
