Resolved, that the Revds. John Francis, McKeen, Hobbs and Sheils be delegates from this Association to the Convention at Liverpool, and Brother Hall from the Domestic Missionary Board; Eastern New Brunswick Association, Brother Francis; Central Nova Scotia Association, Rev. John Shaw; Western New Brunswick, Rev. Wm. Hobbs; Western Nova Scotia, Rev. C. I. Burnett.

Resolved, that 500 copies of the Minutes be printed, and also 500 copies of Articles, and that the necessary amount to defray the expenses be paid out of the funds of the Domestic Missionary Board.

Reports on Articles and French Mission were omitted by the Delegate, Rev. Wm. Burton.

Resolved, that the Missionary Board remain the same as last year, with the addition of Brother Wilson, of Truro.

Resolved, that the thanks of this Association are hereby presented to the inhabitants of Guysborough for the unsurpassed kindness and hospitality shewn to us during this Association, and also to the Minister and Trustees of the Wesleyan Chapel, for the use of their chapel on the Lord's-day.

We therefore earnestly urge upon parents, and all who wish well to the cause of God and the salvation of their fellow beings, to do their utmost in establishing and sustaining Sabbath Schools by their presence, prayers, and contributions in providing and sustaining suitable libraries and papers—and would recommend the "Youth's Penny Gazette," and "Child's Paper," as best adapted to the above mentioned purpose.

We would also strongly recommend the establishment of Bible classes wherever practicable.

We would further recommend that yearly statistics from every Sabbath School, as full and accurate as possible, be sent with the letters to the Association.

Ferguson, affects the continuance of the paper, we would urgently appeal to its friends and patrons, to put forth during the coming year especially, increased efforts for enlarging the list of subscribers and promoting its interests in every way. We record our decided conviction that it cannot, and must not be discontinued, and that the only practical method of sustaining and continuing it, is by securing an able editorship, an energetic agency, and a more liberal patronage.

Your Committee regard the system of Colportage as well suited to supply the extensive destitution which prevails within the bounds of this Association. The publications of the English and American Tract Societies, together with the issues of the American S. School Union, the N. England S. S. Union, and the Am. Baptist Publication Society, are worthy of wide circulation. To the volumes of the latter Society we would call especial attention. We recommend the employment of at least one efficient Colporteur and the raising of funds for the purpose. This may be done in connexion with the "Nova Scotia Tract and Colporteur Society."

REPORT ON THE CHRISTIAN MESSENGER.

The Committee on the Christian Messenger call the attention of the Association to the fact that this valuable periodical is now in the nineteenth year of its existence. The first number was issued in January, 1837,—since that time it has contributed its weekly quota of information and instruction, in so doing has aided the enlightenment of the people and promoted the success of religious and benevolent enterprise.

Established for the benefit of the Baptist churches of these provinces, the Christian Messenger has thus far accomplished its mission. It is a welcome guest in our families, whose visits are highly prized, and whose communications are received with pleasure and satisfaction. The suspension or cessation of those visits would be regarded as a calamity deeply to be deplored.

In consequence of the lamented death of brother Ferguson, one of the proprietors and editors, it will become necessary, as your committee are informed, to make important changes at the close of the present year. The property must pass into other hands, and brother Nutting, the surviving proprietor and editor will be unable to assume the entire editorial management under the arrangements which will then be formed.

It is obviously of great importance to the interests of the denomination that those arrangements should be acceptable to the whole body, it is essential to the usefulness and success of the *Christian Messenger* that it should be managed by those in whom confidence can be safely placed.

But no one can be expected to undertake the risk of publication, and to incur the additional expenditure which certain contemplated improvements will render necessary,—unless there be a reasonable hope of remuneration, that

remuneration can only be secured by an enlarged subscription list, and the enlargement cannot be accomplished without such strenuous and persevering effort as will prove that the *Christian Messenger* enjoys the patronage of the denomi-

nation at large.

Your Committee therefore in view of the advantages accruing from the *Christian Messenger*, and regarding its continuance as essentially identified with our denominational welfare recommend the appointment by this Association of an Advisory Committee to co-operate with brother Nutting in carrying into effect at the close of the year such alterations as may then be needful.

The Committee recommended further the following Reso-

lution be passed:

Resolved, That the Ministers and Messengers of the Eastern Baptist Association now assembled in annual session, hereby pledge themselves to exert their individual efforts to promote an increased circulation of the Christian Messenger in their respective localities.

Your Committee would urge most affectionately, but earnestly upon all our wealthy churches and friends, to increased efforts to replenish the funds of the society, and aid in spreading more extensively the glorious gospel of the grace of God, the ordained means of the conversion of the world to Christ. Your committee would strongly recommend the importance of the mission to Pictou, and also suggest the desirableness of taking the Gaelic Mission to Cape Breton, under the control of the

In presenting the fourth annual Report, the Board feels that there is much cause for gratitude to God, and for in-

creased exertions in this department of labour.

Some of our Missionaries have been made to rejoice in seeing the fruit of their labours. And if in some cases the same results have not been seen, yet it is a source of consolation to know, that " to the poor the gospel has been preached."

The Mission to North Sydney has proved a great blessing, and many precious souls have been hopefully converted to God. Brother Sheils who succeed Bro. Shaw to this place, has responded to the invitation of the church, and has become its pastor.

Brother Cogswell laboured about three months, between

Canso and Guysborough, and baptized two persons.

Brother Hall has laboured about seven months in Pictou during the past year, and has been encouraged in his labors

-he has baptized three.

The Mission along the southern shore it was hoped would have been filled during the whole year. The Board however failed in obtaining the labors of the person first appointed to the field, who it was hoped would have taken the Mission.

According to the arrangement of the Board in such cases, the Secretary endeavoured to find a substitute, and after some time engaged Brother Whidden. Along these destitute shores Brother W. laboured, till near the meeting of the Association. Statements relative to the places visited, not being received in time for this report, particulars can not be reported.

Brother Burnett fulfilled the mission assigned him on P. E. Island; his journal shows that his time was fully occu-

CIRCULAR LETTER.

DEAR BRETHREN,-

We purpose to address you this year on a subject of vital importance to our denomination. It is united prayer for the increase of

gospel ministers.

This is Christ's own instruction. "Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth laborers into his harvest. Ministers are the gift of Christ, and he bestows them in answer to prayer. The experience of the church on this subject is clear and settled, whenever there has prevailed a spirit of prayer for an increase of Ministers, God has heard, and abundantly answered.

There are at present scores and hundreds of young men of talent, connected with our churches, whose purpose is to obtain an education. Why should not the churches set their hearts upon the consecration of these youths to the Ministry? It is not too much to ask of God; nor is it beyond the circle of his promise. They are all needed not one of them can be spared.—Such is the condition of this country and of the world, that unless there be speedily a great addition to the number of our ministers, error and irreligion will become more bold, and will draw down the fierce indignation of the Almighty. It is our settled conviction that the raising up of young men for the ministry should form a prominent topic of remark in prayer, at our monthly Whilst the number of missionaries both at home and abroad is much smaller than the demand, and the work is greatly retarded for the want of more laborers, the voice of Providence calls upon us when we meet, to pray that the kingdom of God may come. very fervently to supplicate for an adequate increase of ministers.

Parents must consecrate their children to the work of the ministry by solemn prayer. Hannah of old consecrated her infant Samuel to the ministry. The mother of christian Frederic Swartz, on her dying bed, informed her husband and her pastor, that she had dedicated her son to the Lord, and obtained a promise from them, that her infant son should be trained in remembrance for this sacred desti-

nation. Swartz became the missionary apostle to India, and died about fourscore years old; having been instrumental in the conversion of thousands of souls. The devoted mother of Samuel J. Mills, solemnly dedicated her son to the ministry, her heart was lifted up in prayer to God for this object, and the very hymns she sang over his cradle as she rocked him to sleep, were prayers for this object;—and what nation shall not rejoice that Samuel J. Mills was born and had such a mother? A pious widow on feading the life of Harriet Newell, was filled with grief that she had no wealth to give to the Lord—she resolved to give her children—she solemnly dedicated them all to the Lord—she lived to have one son and two daughters missionaries in Pagan lands, and one son a minister in America. Such facts show that God does regard the consecration which christian parents make of their children to his service. Let this be the burden of their prayers, let this shape their instruction and education.

Young men must consecrate themselves to the work of the ministry. At no period in the history of the church of Christ in this province, has there been so large a proportion of members who are young men, and at no time have the calls for more ministers been so urgent and imperative Settlements are multiplying with unparalled rapidity, and great destitution prevails within the limits of this Eastern Association—atmost wholly a missionary field. Almost the whole of the Heathen and Pagan world have thrown open the doors of access, and are in readiness for missionary labor. The churches have signified, by increased benevolence, their willingness to sustain all who are willing to go forth to preach to the destitute. Whilst the heralds of the cross are few, and the wants of the world so great, it is truly painful to notice that so many young men of piety enter secular employments. What a large amount of intellect is now employed in the daily operations of commerce and merchandize, agriculture and the arts, which if educated and devoted to the service of God, in the gospel, would bless many nations with light and salvation. The harvest is great but the laborers are few. Millions of our fellow men for whom Christ died are perishing for lack of knowledge. Pious young men possess the gospel and can preach it to them. Their hearts at times ourn with love for souls, and the spirit says, "Go preach the preaching I bid you." What can be plainer? What more solemn or more urgent? The destiny of multitudes of immortal souls may hang upon this design. Who can tell the loss that would have been sustained by the church, had David Brainard, or Henry Martyn decided not to enter the ministry? And who can
