



All his life he was a writer for the press and reviews, but here he had periodicals of his own, and took the lead in the establishment of others. He wrote the whole of the two series of the Bystander. He was the principal supporter of the Week. He was a regular weekly contributor to the Weekly Sun of Toronto, down to a few months ago. He wrote and paid for the last journal which was founded to establish continental union, and from the day he made his home in Toronto, he became Canadian in interest and sentiment, such as he conceived a native Canadian ought to be. For though he favored Continental Union or Annexation from 1871 until his death, he did so in what he believed to be Canadian interests.


