POSTMASTER GIVES UP \$7500 STOLEN MONEY

William O'Neil Leaves New Waterford, C. B., With Registered Package And Leaves It At Truro.

By Canadian Press. Halifax, Jan. 13.—William O'Neil, post master at New Waterford, Cape Breton, a new mining town 20 odd miles from Sydney, is missing, and with him has disappeared \$7,500 mailed by the Bank of Nova Scotia branch at that place, to the branch at Sydney in a registered package. The package of money was given to Wednesday and was due to arrive in Sydney the same evening.

A remarkable thing is that O'Neil sent an advance note to the Sydney post office that the package was on its way, thus lessening his chances of escape in case he intended to make off with the money.

PEA OF GUILTY BY MANAGER OF FARMERS' BANK

Travers Consents To Become Scapegoat For Promoters Who Wrecked Bank—Appropriated Money.

Toronto, Jan. 13.—Wm. R. Travers, former general manager of the wrecked Farmers' Bank, pleaded guilty today to three separate charges, and was remanded until Monday next for sentence without bail. The charges were, making false returns to the government, theft of \$40,000 from the bank, and the making of a false document. The latter, which was a new charge, was based upon Travers' action in altering a minute of the board directors meeting so as to increase the amount which he was authorized to advance to the Keeley Mine.

Although the Bank's directors authorized no advances to the Keeley Mines, limited, Travers continued to advance money until he had lent \$621,000 of the bank's cash to the company, of which he was manager. Of this sum, Travers converted \$35,000 to his own personal use, the company receiving no benefit from it.

Nelson, the ship's master.

POOR SERVICE.

Winnipeg, Man., Jan. 13.—The Board of Control has served ultimatum on the street railway that unless service on certain routes improved by Monday, the clause in the company's charter enforcing a fine of ten dollars a day for each unsatisfactory route would be invoked.

KING'S UNCLE AS VICEROY

Royal Duke Will Arrive Next Autumn And Has Already Made Staff Appointments—Notice Of Acceptance.

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 13.—Advices received here today are to the effect that the coming to Canada of the Duke of Connaught, who is a brother of the late King Edward, will arrive in Canada towards the end of September or the beginning of October. The Duke's military secretary will be Major Henry Cecil Lowther, V.C., D.S.O., of the Scots Guards. He was for some time military attaché at Paris. He also accompanied His Highness the Duke of Connaught to South Africa, when he went there recently to open the first parliament of United South Africa, the latest Dominion within the British Empire. He is a son of Mr. Lowther, speaker of the imperial parliament.

Brantford, Ont., Jan. 13.—Arten Brazoian, a Brantford Armenian, who is a naturalized citizen of Canada, has just returned from Turkey, where he went to bring back his wife. On arriving he was not only refused permission to take his wife from Turkey, but was forbidden even to see her. He has taken the matter up here and representations are being made to Ottawa as to why a British subject with proper passports should be treated in this manner in Turkey.

MAJORITY OF GOVERNMENT CUT TO NINE

Unfair Distribution Of Public Works Expenditure Subject For Discussion In House—Quebec Favored.

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 13.—By the narrow vote of 43 to 34, or a majority of 9, the government today voted down a motion for a reduction of the vote of \$17,000 for the post office at Marieville, Quebec. The members of the opposition claimed that there was a matter of principle involved, and denounced the wholesale granting of a large public building in such a small place in the province of Quebec, while there were many important places throughout Canada which required such buildings and could not get them.

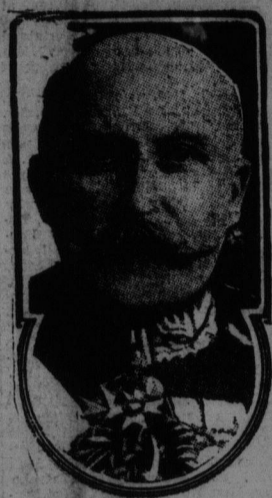

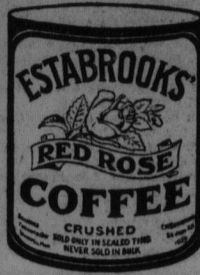

HAL-FAX WINS FROM MONCTON Victorias Defeated 7-5 in Fastest Game Ever in Provinces - Played Before 5,000 People—Scott a Star

Halifax, Jan. 13.—In the greatest hockey match ever witnessed in the maritime provinces the Halifax professionals tonight defeated the Moncton Victorias by a score of 7 to 5 in the second game of the professional series, and the first to be played in Halifax. There was some doubt as to how the professional game would take here, and many predicted that the game would be a frost, but nearly five thousand people crowded the arena tonight and witnessed the struggle.

It was sharp 8:30 o'clock when Referee MacNamara, of Montreal, called the men together and gave them the usual warning, and they faced off sharp on time. In the first half the local players seemed to have much the better of the play, scoring three goals in succession, while the visitors only found the net once; the half ended 3 to 1 in favor of the local team.

With the beginning of the second half the Victorias started in to rush matters, and Scott, by brilliant play, made a dead end on the Halifax team's goal and the struggle waxed warm, the Moncton team scoring four goals in quick succession. The Crosses also found the net four times in the second half, and the game ended 7 to 5 in favor of Halifax.

Scott was the star player for the home team, and one of the best men ever seen in Halifax. Frank Condon played the best game of any man on the ice, and it was his brilliant work that won the game for Halifax.

Truro, Jan. 12.—The Colts, of Truro, and Ramblers, of Amherst, crossed hockey sticks here tonight and the Amherst boys were victorious by a score of 6 to 4. Jack Twaddle and "Peanut" Simpson were back in harness again and although not showing the class of former years, they held the purple and white team together.

The game was late in starting, owing to a couple of the Ramblers arriving in town late, but at 10 after nine Percy McDonald got the boys under way. Play went into the Ramblers' territory and 20 seconds later a whistle Yull shot the first goal for the home boys.

Play went from end to end, but the Amherst failed to beat McMillan out. Black and Simpson combined for Amherst's first tally, the latter doing the trick. The puck was in Truro territory for some time until Blair's honor relieved the strain. "Blair" Simpson scored the second goal for his team in 17 minutes.

DEFENDANTS ON STAND IN NEW YEAR RIOTING TRIAL Continued from page 1. Mr. Mullin argued first that a common purpose had not been established. The onus was on the Crown to show that this crowd had some evil purpose or common design in attacking the street cars and destroying the property of peaceable citizens.

His honor—That is a question of fact. Mr. Mullin cited Halsbury's Laws of England, Vol. 9. Mr. Wilson—Without making any argument, I move that Hamilton be discharged by your honor.

His honor—Hamilton was found on Sheffield street following the crowd. I leave the matter to the jury and in each individual case will instruct them. Record Baxter argued contra: "I submit that the Atkinson case is a nisi prius decision and it does not appear from the narrative of the case that the defendant was present at the riot. In view of the late decisions, I think that there is ample evidence in allowing the case to go to the jury."

The recorder distinguished an unlawful assembly from a riot. In the former mere presence does not make one guilty of rioting, in the former mere presence was a presumption of guilt.

In the present case, presence is the essential element, it is the assembly, and it is for the jury to say if the defendants participated in that unlawful assembly.

Referring to Way, the Recorder said that the Crown admitted that he did assist the street car men, but subsequently was found traversing a residential part of the city with, or in the wake of, the unlawful assembly.

The Recorder contended that the Atkinson case was inapplicable and the Covey case referred to aiding and abetting not to an unlawful assembly.

Common Purpose. Referring to the element of common purpose, Mr. Baxter argued that where an assembly was in its inception lawful and becomes unlawful, the crown does not have to show a common purpose. He said that it was sufficient these men must be judged by their acts, namely the breaking of windows, destruction of other property and the invasion of Sheffield St. by the mob.
