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For BORDEN & BRITISH CONNECTION

PROCEEDINGS OF NOMINATION DAY

Audiences Throng to Hear Nomination Day Speeches.

Evidence of Complete Conservative Victory is Manifest in the Constituencies of Maritime Provinces where Meetings Held Yesterday.

Nomination day proceedings in most of the constituencies of the province were marked by great enthusiasm. In St. John the proceedings were merely formal, but in many counties the candidates followed the time honored custom of debating the issues of the election before mass meetings of the electors. At practically all the joint meetings the Conservative candidates had the better of their opponents, and in some cases the audiences did not wait to hear the Liberal candidates finish their orations. Generally speaking the reception given the Conservative candidates and the applause which greeted their onslaughts upon the reciprocity pact was in marked contrast to the attitude assumed by the electors to the reciprocity candidates.

In the speeches of the Conservative standard bearers there was a note of assurance, a ring of victory, which inspired their followers, while in the addresses of the Liberal candidates there was an apologetic note which revealed their consciousness that they have entered upon a losing fight, and which thoroughly disheartened their supporters. Never have the Conservatives gone into a fight with greater confidence, and never have the Liberals, distracted by internal quarrels, made a sorer showing on nomination day.

RANKS OF THE LIBERALS ARE THINNING NOW

Many Desertions in Province of Quebec — Five Montreal Seats Are Expected to Turn Over.

Montreal, Sept. 14.—According to reports from all over the country of the nominations there was only one election by acclamation, Mr. William Gorman in Welland. German is a Liberal, but is opposed to reciprocity. In a great majority of ridings the contest is a two-man affair and the issue is clean cut for or against reciprocity. In this city there were no surprises. In St. Lawrence division and in St. Mary's division there are three men in the field, but in each case the third man is not regarded as having any chance.

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One of the most interesting meetings of the day was held at Gagetown. Although the valiant colonial went to the meeting with a considerable force, well fortified with Dutch courage, his opponent, Luther Smith, who was ably supported by Premier Hazen, carried off the honors of the day. At Sussex Mr. Fowler met the excitable Dr. McAllister on the hustings, and easily achieved a veritable triumph. At Woodstock, Frank Smith set at rest any hopes of election entertained by Mr. Carvell, and at Grand Falls, Mr. Cormier greatly augmented the favorable impression he has already made. Sheriff Legere shirked a debate with Mr. Robidoux, who captured the crowd and held a fine meeting on his own account, while the

sheriff retired to his fortress and held forth to about 75 of his heelers. In St. John the proceedings were rather dull. At 12 o'clock the returning officer, A. O. Skinner, with his clerk, Roland H. C. Skinner, arrived at the court house. It was expected that the whole business would be finished in about ten minutes, but it was just half an hour before the first party representative strolled in, Charles F. Sanford, official agent for Hon. Wm. Pugsley and James Lowell, and filed both their nomination papers, depositing four one hundred dollar bills, three

Canadian Bank of Commerce and one Merchants' Bank of Canada note. Shortly after this E. B. Armstrong, C. B. Logan and P. E. Knowles, the latter official agent for the Conservative candidates, appeared on the scene. Mr. Logan filed the nomination papers of Dr. Daniel, while those of the city candidate were filed by Mr. Armstrong. Mr. Knowles deposited \$400 in \$4 Dominion Bank notes and received his receipt. H. A. Powell, K. C., and John Waterhouse Daniel, M. D., the Conservative candidates, were nominated by:

LAURIER SEEKS ASSISTANCE OF U. S. SENATOR

Thomas Gore of Oklahoma to Aid Liberals in Reciprocity Campaign—Comes on Request of Premier.

Montreal, Sept. 14.—An Associated Press despatch from Oklahoma city says: William Randolph Hearst, with his pro-reciprocity journals, is not the only American entering into Canadian politics. Senator Thomas Gore, of Oklahoma has been requested by Premier Laurier to assist him in the Canadian campaign for reciprocity. Senator Gore left Lawton today for Canada and will remain until the close of the campaign, making speeches to the people that are to vote on the question. He supported reciprocity in the senate and his attitude there, it is said, prompted Premier Laurier to call on him for assistance in the campaign now going on.

Denies Report.
Quebec, Que., Sept. 14.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier tonight denied the report sent out from Oklahoma to the effect that Senator Thomas Gore, who fought for reciprocity in the United States senate, was coming to Canada at the invitation of the Premier to aid him in his pro-reciprocity campaign. The Premier said that he had heard no definite news to the effect that the American senator would deliver speeches on this side of the line, and that in any event it would not be at the express invitation of the Liberal party nor would he be financed by the Liberal campaign fund.

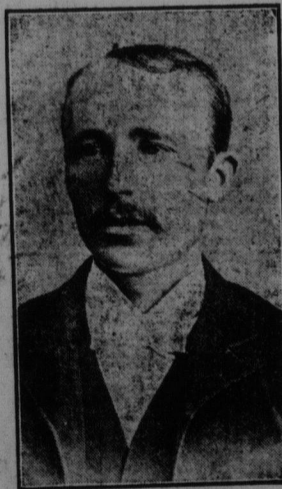
Representative of Swift & Co., Sees Less for N. B. Farmers.

Dressed Hogs Can be Imported from United States at Lower Price and Farmers Stand to Lose Difference -- F. E. Williams Co. Cut Figure

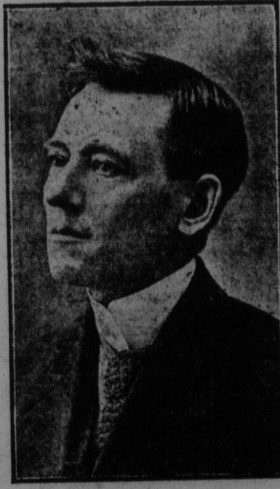
William P. Liston, superintendent of manufacturing in the pork packing department of Swift and Co., the big American concern, who is now in St. John on a vacation trip, stated yesterday to The Standard: "If reciprocity carries, your packers in New Brunswick can import from us dressed hogs in any quantity at a saving represented exactly by the amount of the present duty. The natural result of this will be that your farmers will lose by just this amount on every pound of pork they raise. Your packers can make good profits at this reduced price, and will be able to carry on business without the necessity of large investments of capital in killing plants, or in equipment for taking care of the by-products."

Won't Contract Ahead.
F. E. Williams and Company, Ltd., Slipp and Flewelling and Messrs. Dunn the three principal packers in St. John, will not contract ahead for any hogs from New Brunswick farmers, because they know, and state to be a fact, that if reciprocity carries, the meat industry of Canada will be in the hands of the American meat trust and they will be able to buy dressed hogs cheaper in the United States, than they are now able to buy from New Brunswick farmers.
