

It is true that Mr. Hazen, discussing the question of the mail service, 'said that he proposed in future in the signing of any contract for the delivery of mail that St. John should be given consideration, and there would be a division of services between the two ports.' Just what this may mean nobody can tell. St. John has not asked for any arbitrary division of the mail service, but has asked that the steamship companies be left free to choose, and that the Intercolonial Railway should not be thrown into the balance by Mr. Borden against St. John."

The Allan liner Numidian, Capt. McKillop, arrived at Boston on Monday night with 67 cabin and 990 steerage passengers from Glasgow. Capt. The bergs at times hemmed in the Numidian so closely that a stone might have been tossed from her decks on to some of them.



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
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
