Brilliant Success For Army of France

Capture Entire Plateau in Neighborhood of Cerny and Craonne and Hills Dominating the Valley of the Ailette.

NEARLY SIX THOUSAND HUNS TAKEN PRISONERS

French Advance Against Powerful Opposition Along Road from Soi sons to Laon, Over an Extent of Nearly Four Miles.

Paris, May 5—(11.45 p. m.)—A brilliant success for the French arms is recorded in the official communication issued by the war office tonight. An important French advance has been made against powerful opposition along the road from Soissons to Laon, over an extent of nearly four miles. French troops have captured all the plateau in the neighborhood of Cerny and Craonne, and the hills dominating the valleys of the Allette river. The number of prisoners captured today was 4,300, in addition to the 1,000 taken yesterday. The text of the statement follows:

"Our operations continue to develop today in conjunction with these of the British armies in the region northeast of Soissons, and the Chemin-Des-Dames. Notwithstanding the desperate resistance of the Germans who have thrown, without number, into the struggle eight contingents, our troops gained a very brilliant suchess.

ES CONFER

ON WAR ISSUE

Practical Tests on Atlantic Coast Appear to have Been Successful.

New York, May 5—W. L. Saunders, chairman of the naval consulting board, announced here today that the board had forwarded to Washington plans for dealing with the submarine problem which, it was believed, had solved the problem successfully.

Mr. Saunders who has been chairman of the naval consulting board about two months, supplemented his announcement by saying that while the submarine problem cannot be considered in reality to have been solved until the U-boats have been destroyed, nevertheless numerous experiments had been made along the Atlantic coast with highly encouraging results, and which led the board to feel confident that a successful solution had been reached.

"It looks as though the submarine problem has been solved," Mr. Saunders said, "not only in theory, but on the strength of practical tests on the Atlantic coast."

Mr. Saunders added that 500 inventions for U-boat suppression had been submitted for consideration of the board, and experiments with many of them justified, he believed, the assertion that a plan had been found by which the submarine peril could be eliminated.

CANADIAN SOLDIERS HAVE CAPTURED MORE THAN 5,000 PRISONERS SINCE VIMY



Sub-section 2, britis section also provides that "such fine may be levied by warrant of distress under the hand and seal of a magistrate or the person convicted may be condemned, in addition to any other imprisonment on the same conviction, to be committed to the common gaol or other place of imprisonment for a further term not exceeding six months unless such fine is sooner paid."

The magistrate fined the accused hym sevential that the power to impose imprisonment as a penalty for non-payment of a fine could only be exercised in cases where the defendant had been sentenced in the first instance to both fine and improsonment, or to imprisonment only. He was of opinion that otherwise no effect would be given to the words "in addition to any other imprisonment." He accordingly ordered the issue of a writ of habeas corpus under which the defendant was released later in the day.

The case is important, as there is very little authority in the reported cases upon this subject. The opinions of the text writers are in accordance with His Honor's judgment, which he based upon the doubtful meaning of the section, in which case he felt the construction most favorable to the liberty of the subject should be adopted. 


