The bark Sarah A. Dunham—Captain Henry Dunham, of the bark Sarah A. Dunham, of Yarmouth, N. S., from Liverpool, Oct. 31st, for Tybee, in ballast, makes the following report:

On Saturday, Oct. 31, at 12 midnight, the half ebb, weather heavy, wind N. E., fresh; barque when in Dulas Bay not having sufficient room to wear round, drifted on the rocks. We then backed our topsails, and went astern half a length, but the sea and swell increasing, we were driven further on the rocks.

We then got all our efforts into the boats, and at 4 a. m. we landed on the Dulus Rocks, not thinking it safe to remain in the ship. At 8 a. m. on the 1st of November, we all went on board again, and telegraphed to Liverpool, asking for the assistance of a tugboat. In the meantime the tugboat came alongside and took our hawser, thereby getting on board the tugboat. As the tide rose the vessel gradually came off the rocks, making a great quantity of water. We then went to the beach, and grounded on the beach. The reason of my getting into Dulas Bay was owing to the weather being thick and altering my course from W. S. W. to S. W., judging I was round the Skerries, and was making for Holyhead. Service was rendered by the tugboat Sea King, of Beaufort, N. B.

The Government Steamer Lady Hood arrived at North Sydney on the 27th ult. and sailed again on the 28th ult. for the coast of Nova Scotia.

The steamer Anson, of the Mitchell Line, Boston, under command of Captain J. B. for this port, put into Halifax on the 28th ult. in distress. The captain reports that during the night of Monday, the 27th, the steering wheel broke and the bridge was carried away, and other damage sustained. One of the seamen named Thomas Gale, a native of Bridgport, G. B., was washed overboard and drowned. The steamer will undergo repairs before proceeding.

The Desford.—This unfortunate ship which has for the second time been compelled to return to the Island owing to sickness of the crew, is again in trouble, crew number two refusing duty owing to the vessel making too much water. This handsomely modelled and thoroughly built ship was launched from the yard of Mr. J. B. Stewart, Glasgow, N. B., on the 21st of October, having been built for parties in Windsor, N. S., was rigged and loaded at this port for Liverpool, sailed for destination on the 23rd November, and while seeking shelter from the gale of that date in Blis Harbor, touched ground, causing her to make water, in consequence of which her crew refused to proceed, compelling Captain Aylward to put back to the Island, where she arrived on the morning of the 28th. A survey being held by the Port Warden's men, finding the vessel only making an inch of water an hour, recommended that she proceed, but the crew, under the Dominion law, demanding to see her bottom, had to be discharged and another at an advance of \$10 (\$85 for the run) shipped. She sailed again the same evening, and having got as far as Grand Manan was met by a heavy gale from the S. W., which prevented them from getting out of the Bay. The Captain thinking it best for the safety of the vessel, and all concerned, squared away for Paradise Island, reaching there for the second time on Sunday morning, the crew refusing to proceed in her. This morning the Port Warden was again requested to make a survey, and went out to her at the Island at 10 o'clock.

The Dark Tided Ware, Halcyon master, from London, while approaching Sydney harbor on the night of the 21st ult., the weather being so dark that the light could not be seen, grounded on the South Bar. On the 22nd the tug Unicorn went to her assistance, but could not tow her off. Messrs. Nesbet & Co., shipwrights, went to her assistance, and by means of mechanical appliances succeeded in floating her in a few hours. It is reported that she has not sustained any serious injuries. The T. W. is owned by Francis Telfer, Esq., of this city.

The ship T. G. Currier, McIce, master, which sailed for Liverpool to-morrow, is one of the handsomest and most substantially finished vessels that ever sailed from this port. Pitch pine and oak are the principal materials used in her

construction. Her cabins are fully equal to those of any vessel built at any port in the Maritime Provinces. She has cost her owners, Messrs. Currier & Co., of this city, in the vicinity of \$90,000. Her owners very naturally feel a considerable amount of pride in the craft.

Charters.—Advices to Messrs. Scamell Bros. report the schooner Charles E. Scamell in port at Bahia on the 25th October, chartered for Baltimore, sugar in bags at 75 per ton, 100 per cent.
