OF

THE LONDON CONFERENCE

OF

F

THE METHODIST CHURCH,

Held in the Town of Chatham, Ontario, commencing on Wednesday, the Third Day of June, 1885.

THE Conference convened in the Park Street Church, at 9 o'clock a.m. The President, Rev. E. B. RYCKMAN, D.D., presiding.

The 572nd Hymn was sung, after which the Rev. W. S. PASCOE read the 48th Psalm and the 3rd Chapter of the Epistle to the Ephesians. Then the Revs. J. H. ROBINSON and T. WEBSTER, D.D., led in prayer.

The roll was called, and 105 ministers and 29 laymen answered to their names.

The Conference then balloted for President, and on the first ballot the Rev. G. R. Sanderson, D.D., was elected.

Upon ballot the Rev. R. C. Parsons was elected Secretary.

The Rev. Wm. McDonagh was appointed Assistant Secretary, and the Rev. G. W. Henderson, Journal Secretary.

OF THE

LONDON CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

TO THE

CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

BELOVED BRETHREN.

After a year which has been rich in varied blessing, we again greet you in the name of the Lord. We have cause for great gratitude to the "Father of mercies" that so general an outpouring of His Spirit has been experienced, and that He has so evidently set His seal upon earnest and faithful labour in the conversion of many hundreds of souls, and in the edifying of multitudes of our members who have been seeking "if that they may apprehend that for which they are also apprehended in Christ Jesus." God has, indeed, been in the midst of His people, and we would remind you that it should always be a matter of solicitude to be in such vital union with Him that His presence shall always be discerned by the prevalence of His converting and sanctifying power.

The successes of the past should be regarded as presaging the yet greater things which God will accomplish through our Church, if she shall remain faithful to Him and His truth. Ours is no small responsibility. Set to cultivate a large field in this great Dominion, our endeavours as a Church must be to take and keep a wider field than it. Not only must we enlarge our borders in the home-land, but in other lands also, if our efforts are to equal our opportunities. "The world for Christ" must be our motto, and to win it for Him our settled resolve and aim.

Power to effect so great a work, as we reminded you in our last Address, "does not lie in numbers, nor in any merely external circumstance." The Church is but as a dead body unless she is vitalized by the indwelling Spirit of God. Personal godliness is the great desideratum, without which all is vain; and without vital spiritual union with God, godliness is impossible. We are called to be "partakers of the divine nature," and are privileged to

be "filled with the fulness of God." The Christ-like spirit will always develop a Christ-like life. Such a life is to be yours and burs. Seek ye then "the mind that was in Christ Jesus." Then there will be vigour in our Church life, in all our methods God will be honoured, and we shall be "a holy people unto the Lord." Let your religion be an all-pervasive power that shall be felt in every relation of life, and in the performance of your daily duties. Enforce the conviction upon all with whom you come into contact that you are the Lord's, and that your highest aim is His glory. This you must do, by your transparent purity of conduct and character, by your Christ-like benevolence and unselfishness, by the richness of your religious experience, by the visibility of your walk with God,—in a word, by your holy consistency of deportment and your fidelity in duty. Live in the full and clear light of the divine favour, to your own surpassing enjoyment and the benefit of the many whom you will necessarily influence.

Be "men of one book" in the best sense. Hide the word in your hearts. Consult "the oracles of God" constantly, and cause them to be read in your families. Seize their grand truths with a strong grasp, and they will make you strong. Let there be no Methodist family unconsecrated because there is no family altar in it, or one unblessed because the Christian law is not lovingly enforced and obeyed by its members. The foundation of a man's education is laid in the home of his childhood. Train up your children for God, therefore.

You may do much in the way of training your children religiously by a judicious selection of the literature you put into their hands. It should be suitable to their condition and progress in knowledge. Let none of the vile productions with which are evil press has corrupted so many of the youth of our day be permitted within your homes. The Christian home should not be unlike the heavenly one in the purity and love that should abide in it. In both God must dwell and reign.

Larger use should be made of the excellent periodicals, and other books which are issued from our denominational publishing house. In the Christian Guardian we have a weekly paper that is worthy of the Methodist Church, and it should have a place in every Methodist family. The Methodist Magazine is a valuable periodical. We recommend these periodicals to you in the belief that they will supply a felt need, and will prove a great blessing in your homes.

Never let your places in the house of God be unnecessarily vacant. Not only on the Sabbath day and on great occasions, but at the week-day services, occupy your places punctually, regularly, devoutly. Especially attend the social means of grace. It is

always a sad thing when Methodists can neglect the prayer or class-meeting for the enjoyment of some passing pleasure, or because of some business that might as well be done at another time as at the hour of worship and communion. Methodism owes much of her success to the use she has made of these social means of grace, and their effectiveness is by no means exhausted.

We greatly rejoice in the recent triumphs of the temperance cause, and hail them as the dawn of a better day for the land we live in. It is a matter of great gratification, also, that our ministers and people have borne so good a share in the struggles which have resulted in the adoption of the Scott Act in so many counties and cities. We trust that the attempts made by interested persons to emasculate the Scott Act by parliamentary action will intensify the temperance feeling of the people, and that you, beloved, will use every proper means to destroy the pernicious liquor-traffic, which has been so ruinous to the bodies and souls of men.

Equally earnest should you be in resisting all attempts that may be made to secularize the Lord's Day. You are aware that for very specious reasons such attempts are being made. The quiet of our Canadian Sabbaths has long been proverbial, and it will be an infortune of the gravest character, if, by any supineness on the part of the Christian people of our land, the non-observance of the holy day shall be permitted.

The educational institutions of Methodism need and deserve your constant, intelligent, and financial support. What the future of Victoria University shall be, the Methodists of to-day must determine. She, in common with our other colleges and schools, has done, and is doing a great and good work. Whether she shall confederate with other universities, as is proposed, or not, we must as a Church see to it that her efficiency shall be sustained and augmented by all the help which it is in the power of the Methodism of Canada to supply.

The cause of Missions has claims upon us which we must not ignore. Increased contributions will be necessary if the Methodist Church is to do her full part in the great work of evangelizing the world. Millions of redeemed and perishing souls "sit in darkness and the shadow of death," and is it for us to sit with folded arms while they perish? God forbid!

Great as has been the prosperity of our Sunday-schools, for which we are devoutly thankful, their power for good would be much greater if the members of the Church generally would show a more personal and practical interest in their operations. We strongly urge that our catechisms be used in every school. In these days of daring scepticism, no work is more important than

THE REV. LEWIS WARNER CREWS, B.A.

How mysterious are the ways of Providence! To many of us this thought came with the sad intelligence that our brother Crews had passed away. Why should the Master remove from his vineyard a labourer so young, so efficient, so full of promise? Why so soon say to his servant, "Come up higher?" We know not now, but we shall know hereafter.

God is His own interpreter,
And He will make it plain."

Bro. Crews was born in the village of Kincardine on the 6th of March, 1852. He was the eldest son of the Rev. Thomas Crews, and brother of Revs. A. C. Crews and Heber W. Crews, B.A., all of whom are honoured members of the ministry of the Methodist Church.

In early life he saw exemplified in his parents the power of Jesus to save and to keep. In the 16th year of his age, under the ministry of the Rev. J. S. Ross, M.A., he was converted to God, and at once became a member of the Church which ever after he so much loved.

In the year 1875 he entered the ministry, and after four years of probation, was received into full connexion and ordained. His ministerial career was brief but successful. The following Circuits'shared in his "labours more abundant": Oakville, St. Catharines 2nd, and London (Pall Mall St.) On each station he soon won the affection and confidence of his people. His labour was owned and blessed by the Great Head of the Church. Believers were led into the rest of faith, and sinners were converted from the error of their ways.

To this work he was called of God. He took not this honour unto himself. From College he writes his beloved mother: "God has blessed me here, so that whatever doubts I may have had, they are all gone, and I am now ready to go to any field to which the Conference may send me, even if it were Japan."

In the second year of his ministry in London, he was married to Miss Kate. Sifton, across whose pathway, in less than one year, the shadows of young widowhood fell.

As a student, his record begins with early boyhood. As years advanced, his thirst for knowledge increased. With eager pleasure he explored, one after another, the fields of thought. Though young, he was already numbered among our men of culture. He laid deep and firm the foundations for usefulness and honour.

He was a son of affection and faithfulness, a husband of thoughtful devotion. As a friend he was true and helpful; as a Christian, constant and consistent. His pastoral work was characterized by genial intercourse, by fidelity to his Master and his people; his preaching, by independent thought and accurate exposition; in spirit and sentiment he was evangelical in expression, felicitous and forcible.

His illness was not long. In early autumn he felt much fatigue. Soon symptoms of typhoid appeared; the fatal disease quickly developed, and though loving hearts and the best of medical skill ministered unto him, he fell asleep in Jesus on the 19th of September, in the 33rd year of his age, and the tenth of his ministry.

For the summons he was ready. When first taken ill, his father asked him how he felt in regard to the future. His reply was: "It would be a bad time to settle that matter now. That was settled long ago. It is all right, father."

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

The following reports of Committees were adopted by the Conference:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee on Temperance are impressed with a deep-feeling of gratitude to Almighty God for the progress made in the cause during the past year. We have to congratulate the Conference on the part borne in the recent campaign by the ministers and laymen of the Methodist Church. The support given the movement for the dissemination of temperance principles by our Church has always been of a character to do her honour, and never more so than in the recent struggle for the adoption of the "Canada Temperance Act" of 1878.

We rejoice to know that our brethren have stood shoulder to shoulder in combatting the giant enemy of mankind—strong drink. It is meet, indeed, that those who have entered the service of the Master, and girded on the sword of the Spirit, should be found battling against this power of darkness, which aims not only at the destruction of the bodies, but also at the souls of its victims—"For no drunkard shall ever enter the kingdom of heaven."

Yet, while we desire to express our gratitude for the past, and congratulate ourselves on the success of our labours, we would call to remembrance the fact that there has never been a time in the history of temperance reform when there was greater need for earnest, prayerful work and watchfulness. While prohibitory legislation is so largely occupying the attention of the community, it is of importance that the moral suasion side of this great reform shall not be overlooked. The "Canada Temperance Act" must be enforced. No law is self-active, nor can be truly successful where not sustained by a strong moral sentiment. Hence we would urge upon our ministers and laymen the necessity of persistent effort for this end. Let pulpit and platform utter no uncertain sound. Let the success of the present be but a stepping-stone to greater, grander victories in the future. Let the moral sentiments of the people be still more thoroughly aroused, until every home shall be a school for temperance, and every father an instructor in its principles.

order to accomplish its desired end.

Your Committee are pleased to hear of the measure of success which has hitherto attended the introduction of the abstinence pledge in our Sabbath-schools, and would express the hope that still greater attention will be given this matter in the future, as its importance cannot easily be over-estimated. It is with deep regret we are compelled to deprecate the action of the Honourable body the Senate of the Dominion of Canada, whereby they would so amend the "Canada Temperance Act" of 1878 as to allow wine, beer and cider to be sold in counties where said Act has become law, and otherwise interfering with the design of said Act, thereby rendering it worse than useless—having a name to live, while dead to its original purposes and principles, and thus under the name of temperance re-opening the flood-gates of drunkenness and ruin. We cannot look upon the action of the Honourable body otherwise than as an outrage on the rights and privileges of vast multitudes of our people who by overwhelming majorities have adopted the Act with all its prohibitory clauses. Your Committee would earnestly recommend this Conference to memorialize the House of Commons, praying that such amendment of the Senate shall not be sanctioned, and that legislation on the question shall be confined to such enactments as shall render the law more stringent in its provisions and more successful in its enforcement. We would not forget to express our hearty sympathy with the noble work being done by the Women's Christian Temperance Union, and pray that God may speed both them and us and all kindred workers until that time shall come-

COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

The Committee met at the call of the convener. A. L. Russell, B.D., was appointed Chairman, and J. W. Freeman, B.D., Secretary.

The following report was adopted:

Your Committee are pleased to report very gratifying results in

all departments of Church work for the past year.

The Connexional Funds, as a whole, have been well sustained—the report of the Committee on Statistics showing an advance of \$4,614 over the total raised for this purpose by the four uniting bodies the previous year.

The work of the Church in Sabbath-schools has brought forth

abundant fruit.

For some years past the reported conversions in our schools have not averaged more than one or two per school. This year we report an average of nine per school.

We find that while there are 2,063 members of the Church under 16 years of age, there are 3,930 of the scholars of our Sab-

bath-schools meeting in class.

In view of this fact, for which we are devoutly thankful, your Committee cannot but think that any further discussion of the propriety of the class-meeting as a test of membership is unwise, since anything that would loosen its hold upon our people would be prejudicial to the best interests of the Church.

At the beginning of the year many were fearful that in the division of circuits and the consolidation of the work in our new relations, in which elements, hitherto foreign to each other, were brought together, the pressure on Christian patience and charity would be greater than might be borne. We are pleased to say that such fear was not justified by the result.

That which, however, we regard as the occasion of the profoundest gratitude to God is His seal of our apostleship and Hisapproval of the co-operation of His people in the conversion of

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE CONSTITUTION OF THE LONDON CONFERENCE MISSIONARY AUXILIARY.

1. This Society shall be known as the London Conference Aux-

iliary of the Missionary Society of the Methodist Church. 2. The President of the Conference shall be President of the Auxiliary; the Superintendents of Districts, Treasurers for their respective Districts; and the Superintendents of Circuits, Treasurers for their Circuits. There shall also be a Conference Treasurer, to be annually appointed by the Conference.

3. The Committee of the Auxiliary shall consist of the Superintendents of Districts, and one layman from each District, elected by the lay representatives present at the May District Meeting.

4. That the Committee meet at the call of the President for the transaction of necessary business; and that the laymen of the said Committee, at their Annual Meeting, elect one layman to the General Board of Missions.

5. Each Circuit and Mission in the London Conference shall be considered a branch of this Auxiliary, of which the Circuit Superintendent shall be Treasurer; and, where deemed expedient, a local Missionary Committee, with a Secretary, may be appointed.

6. Anniversaries shall be held on all Circuits and Missions a early in the year as convenient; and all subscriptions be collecte not later than the 1st of March in each year, and be paid over the Circuit Treasurer, who shall remit, without delay, all money so received, save only what may be necessary to meet local expense to the District Treasurer, who shall immediately forward the sam to the Conference Treasurer.

7. The Superintendent of each Circuit and Mission shall prepare, not later than the first day of the Annual District Meeting, list of all subscribers of two dollars and upwards, with the aggregate of all collections and sums under two dollars, also of expense paid, and present the said lists, at the District Meeting, to the District Superintendent, who will forward them to the Conference Treasurer, who, in turn, will forward them to the General Treasurer of the Missionary Society.

8. The Anniversary of the Auxiliary shall be held during the session of the Annual Conference.

REPORT OF THE CHILDREN'S FUND COMMITTEE.

In accordance with directions given last Conference, the Secretary-Treasurer obtained from the Financial Secretaries and Super intendents of Circuits the required statistics on which to base the assessment to Circuits, and the amount to be paid per claimant.

The returns made showed that within the bounds of the Conference there were 18,079 ratable members, and 248 claimants. The rate of 30 cents per member having been decided upon by the Conference, the Treasurer found himself able to pay \$21 per child

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Increase of Permanent Capital, from July 31, 1882, to Nov. 20, 1883...

Your Committee recognize that this subject requires a harmonious and connected treatment, not local but world-wide; but as the proper observance of the Sabbath is an important factor in our physical, civil and religious well-being, and chiefly depends on the laws of the State, on ministers and Churches, on Christian homes and individuals, we beg to report,—

That we deprecate the encroachments of business on the sanctity of the Sabbath, as by the running of trains, the working of the oil and salt wells, and the sale of newspapers, and deem it desirable that the laws be so amended as to make the employer as amenable as the employee.

That we observe much evil arising from excursions, social visiting, and general pleasure-seeking on the Lord's Day, and as such desceration is evidently detrimental to intelligence, liberty, morals and religion, we recommend the preaching of a sermon on Sabbath observance at some time during the year in every appointment, believing, as quaint George Herbert puts it, that when kept unto the Lord—

"The Sundays of man's life,
Threaded together on Time's string,
Make bracelets to adorn the wife
Of the eternal, glorious King."

REPORT OF THE SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE

We beg, first of all, to call attention to several pleasing and gratifying features of the work, as indicated by the accompanying schedule. (1) We are grateful to be able to state that during the year 2,014 scholars have been converted, and that 3,930 are reported as meeting in class. (2) There are good reasons to believe that a number of new schools have been opened. (3) There are signs of increasing patronage being given to the publications of our own denomination, though there is room and cause for much greater

improvement in that particular.

We beg also to offer the following suggestions: (1) That every possible effort be made for the introduction and use of the Catechism and the Total Abstinence Pledge. (2) Believing that our own connexional Sunday-school papers, in point of literary and artistic merit, are equal, if not superior, to those of any other publishing house, we recommend their adoption in all our schools. (3) That as it seems impossible in most cases to hold regular teachers meetings, it would be well for the lessons to be brought under review either in the prayer-meeting or the pulpit. (4) As some schools have failed to make the necessary collection in favour of the "Aid and Extension Fund," we respectfully advise each Superintendent of a Circuit to see that such a failure never occurs again. (5) We recommend the appointment of the Rev. J. V. Smith as Connexional Treasurer of the Sunday-school Fund.
