Swede turnip growers are urged his spring to endeavour to secure and transplant a few sound roots to produce seed for themselves and their neighbors. Owing to the abnormal conditions now prevailing there will likely be very little swede seed for planting in the spring of 1918 unless our Canadian swede turnip growers make provision for their own supplies by growing the seed themselves. Canadian supplies of swede and most other field root and garden seers formerly came from Europe but this source is now practically cut off. The prospects for home grown saed have been reduced by the present

price of swede turnips for food purposes, as it would now take nearly two hundred dollars worth of full grown swede turnips to transport an acre for seed purposes. This factor has had the unfortunate effect of reducing the area.

ROHIBITION went into force in Ontario, September 16th, 1916. "Since Prohibition has been enforced, Toronto has become a different place from the point of view of the police," declared Lieut.-Col. H. J. Grasett, C.M.G., Chief Constable of Ontario's largest city. "The stations are almost empty, the streets are quiet.'

"The number of arrests for drunkenness during the past six weeks has decreased to a marked degree as compared with the record for the same period in 1915. From September 15th to October 15th they were:

Under License, 1915 - 1,059 arrests Under Prohibition. 1916, 214 arrests"

Such was the immediate effect of Prohibition in the largest city in the world to be under such a wide measure of temperance law. It is always the large centres which find the greatest difficulty in enforcing Prohibition.

Evidence of satisfaction with this era of Prohibition is being given constantly by men who were never known to be temperance advocates," said Col. Grasett.

The "Chief" stated that information had been received by himself and his men to show that the retail store-keepers were benefiting in many parts of the city as the indirect result of Prohibition. On account of the effect of Prohibition, the City of Toronto considers it unnecessary to replace the men enlisted for the war. The force is now decreased by 100 men.

The annual cost of maintaining the police force in 1916 was mated at \$18,000 less than that for 1915.

In February, 1917, the Chief of Police issued his annual report for 1916. Arrests for drunkenness for the three months ending December 31st were, compared with the same period in 1915:

In 1915 (Under License) - 3,347 arrests In 1916 (Under Prohibition) 1,022 arrests





TO THE WOMEN

And it is a suggestion also.

From the day war broke out the women of New Brunswick have borne their full share of sacrifices and have been at once a source of pride and an inspiration to the men of the Province.

With the call for recruits, the women of New Brunswick did not hold back their husbands and sons. Some thousands of New Branswickers donned the khaki, embraced their wives, mothers and sisters, and marched away to the training camps. Scarcely a home in the Province was left that did not give up one loved one.

Those who were privileged to witness the departure of our boys will never forget the wives and mothers who came to see their khaki-clad men and say good-bye. Then the Red Cross sent out its call. And nowhere was the response greater than from the wo-men of New Brunswick. Every hamlet, village, town and city formed a branch. Thousands of women taught themselves knitting; other thousands spent long hours at the sewing machines; still others packed the big cases and shipped them away.

New Brunswick is proud of the work her women have done for the Red Cross, proud of the hundreds of thousands of pieces of goods they have worked long and every day to make. That is the sort of service that makes a country great. That is universal service,

And then there is the work of the Daughters of the Empire, the Purple Cross in the saving of unded horses. What a noble and inspiring work is all this. How proud are New Brunswickers of their grandmothers, their mothers, their wives and

Women of New Brunswick-you who have given your sons for the land, patriotism demands something more of you. With the signing of peace, there is going to be the greatest War for trade, the world has ever seen. Only the countries with the greatest reserves; only the countries that bend every effort to prepare for that trade struggle, will be able to maintain their prosperity. New Brunswick must get ready.

As the buyers for the home it is the duty of our women to spend their money in their own towns. We must have money to build up factories, to develop our natural resources, to make us still more prosperous. Women of New Brunswick is it not self evident that if we send our money out of the country we shall not have the money to build a greater prosperity?

Without the least exaggeration it can be stated that the custom of buying goods in Upper Canada has had a most serious effect on our Province. The appeal is here made to the women of New Brunswick to recognize their country's peril, and the need of their Province, Our money must be kept at home. We must buy our needs from our local merchants not especially because they are our neighbors but because it is only thus we can, at once, get the goods and keep the money too.
