Chicago Minister Undertakes to Reform the City of Chicago.

Chicago, June 17 (United News) When the Rev. John H. Williamson was offered the berth of moral censor of Chicago, he leaped at the job with cries of thanksgiving.

Here was a chance to guard the souls of 3,000,000 and earn \$10,000 a year, instead of shepherding a small flock for a small salary.

Road of Reform Thorny.

But Dr. Williamson sat in his big office, today, shrouded in gloom. Chicago doesn't want to be saved.

Citizens will not volunteer to tell the police about their sinful neighbors who make home brew stay out late at night and indulge otherwise sinfully.

And to cap the climax, in spite of his best efforts, aldermen arose in the City Council Thursday to exorcise him as "four-flusher" and "a woman hater," who sold himself for 10,000 pieces of silver.

Dr. Williamson was discouraged.

He has been trying to clean up Chicago and lead its people to better and more useful lives.

Won't "Preach" on Neighbors.

He has been tireless in journeying from one church to another to tell congregations and men's clubs and Christian Endeavorers of his efforts, urging them to help him out in the great work.

But now even some of the churches, for some reason or other, refuse to listen to the Rev. Dr. Williamson's pleas and worldly politicians have been charged openly that his "sermons" were political propaganda for Mayor Thompson.

Recently the Rev. Dr. Williamson had a great number of affidavits blank printed. He distributed these among the citizenry, and explained that all they had to do was to relate therein the story of their neighbor's peccadilloes, whatever it might be, if it did not square with the law, and take the affidavit to the nearest police station.

"Monster Meeting" a Flivver.

If the Rev. Dr. Williamson's admonitions had been followed Chicago might well be on the road to salvation by this time. But the citizens did not respond. No one seemed to care.

Failing this, with the criticism of the ungodly increasing daily, the Rev. Dr. Williamson arranged for a "monster mass meeting," at which the "Christian citizenry" of Chicago was to declare itself and arm to make organized war on vice. There were seats waiting for thousands and arrangements were made to take care of the overflow.

But when the Rev. John H. Williamson arrived he found less than 50 of the "Christian citizenry" he banked on in the hall. Most of them were gray-

haired and agreed with the censor that this certain was a terrible state of affairs, and doubted the absent thousands were tarry dancing or swimming or gawking know what. The meeting was adjourned.

Failed to Appear Before Committee.

Thursday the police committee of the City Council met to find out what Dr. Williamson was accomplishing for his \$10,000 a year. The Rev. Dr. Williamson was invited to appear and tell the committee. Several aldermen said they wanted to tell him about all the moonshining and vice in their respective wards.

But the moral censor refused to appear and refused to give any reason for his refusal. This angered several members of the committee and the session became a hot pan party in which the Rev. Dr. Williamson was called unpleasant names.

The committee voted to ask the Council, as of whole whether it should force the Rev. Dr. Williamson to appear.

TO CONTINUE PATRIOTIC FUND

Provision Made in Resolution Which Minister of Finance Will Introduce.

Ottawa, June 20.—Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance, has given notice that he will move consideration in committee of the whole, of a resolution to provide for continuance of the Canadian patriotic fund.

The resolution provides "that whenever the government-in-council is satisfied that the resources of the Canadian patriotic fund are inadequate to the continued performance of the relief work that has been carried on by that organization and that the result of the cessation of any part of such work would throw upon the public authorities additional burdens for the relief of distress, the governor in council may, by order in council, authorize the payment from the consolidated revenue fund, to the Canadian patriotic fund of such sums as may be required from time to time to enable the said Canadian patriotic fund to continue its work, such sums not to exceed \$500,000.

THE TALE-TWISTERS.

As most of his admirers know, Rudyard Kipling, in his inimitable stories of India, wrote of the "Tale Twisters" a mere or less nationally famous regiment of that country. Recognizing our vast literary inferiority to the renowned Britisher above mentioned, we humbly essay to make a few remarks about a certain regiment in this country--or rather it's vast army. Namely the army of tale-twisters. You will notice that the pronunciation is identical, but that the spelling and definition of the words are entirely different. Just as "tail-twisting" makes one think of stubborn shorthorns being forced to board a transport, so tale-twisting makes us think of thoughtless and indiscriminate gossiping, the precipitous spreading of rumors--regardless of their source or significance--and the imprudent carrying of tales.

DALHOUSIE Dalhousie 27.—Immense catches of salmon have characterized the fishing of the past week. Thousands of pounds are being shipped to the States via Montreal.

A sub-division of the Catholic Women's League of Canada was organized in Dalhousie the other Sunday when Mrs. Donald Fraser and Mrs. E. McLean, of Bathurst, accompanied by Mrs. B. C. Mullins, Mrs. W. P. Cassidy, of Chatham, visited Dalhousie and addressed a well attended meeting of Roman Catholic women.

Start spraying when the plants are from six to eight inches high. Repeat at intervals of ten days to two weeks until the plants die of old age or frost. Apply from 50 to 120 gallons per acre per application. Cost every part of the plant thoroughly with Bordeaux and keep it coated. Make the first spray 4-4-40 Bordeaux, the second 3-5-40 and the third and the later sprays 5-5-40.

To test Bordeaux, use limus paper. By combining the poison with Bordeaux, a less costly type of poison can be used with safety and the grower can control the fungus diseases as well as kill the insects with the same application and with the same expenditure of labor.

DIES OF DOG BITE

YEAR AFTER BITTEN Rhode Island Man One of a Quartette Attacked at the Same Time. Pascoag, R. I., June 23.—Robert Pollard, forty years old, of this town, died of hydrophobia nearly a year after he was bitten by a dog which died of rabies.

With four other men, Pollard was bitten by a dog in July of last year. The five took the Pasteur treatment. The other four felt no ill effects of their experience, but two months ago Pollard complained of illness. He submitted to treatments but his case proved baffling to his physician and finally another doctor was called into consultation.

Recently Pollard became much worse and this week he was seized with violent spasms which convinced him of the year-old infection. He died in agony.

KEEPS SON IMPRISONED

FIVE MONTHS IN CELLAR Syracuse, N. Y., June 23.—Herbert P. Vernier, assistant production manager of the Brown Line Gear Company of this city, was sentenced to serve five months in the Onondaga County Penitentiary after he had pleaded guilty to his wife, to a charge that they kept their five-year-old son Kenneth imprisoned for treatment in an old cigar box in the coal cellar of their home, No. 102 Marlborough road, Eastwood, a suburb.

The boy, half starved, indescribably filthy with cellar dirt and wearing only a thin cotton shirt, was rescued from his prison two months ago by the Child's Society.

At the same time County Judge William L. Barum sentenced Mrs. Vernier to serve ten days hard labour in the same institution.

DIDN'T DISCOVER GOLD

BUT THEY FOUND WHISKEY New York, June 23.—The sudden rush of a crowd down Main street, Flushing, in the direction of Broadway followed by workmen excavating on the site of the old Flushing hotel. When several hundred persons had gathered the excavation they learned that no gold had been found, but something considered by many just as good as gold, if not better, had been unearthed.

A workman, in shoveling debris out of a corner of the old cellar, had uncovered a dozen bottles containing good whiskey, of a brand popular in pre-prohibition days. This news increased the crowd, but the whiskey soon mysteriously disappeared. It was reported that some of the workmen quit early. The whiskey evidently was part of the stock of the old hotel.

ORANGEMEN FLEDGE

SUPPORT TO ULSTER KINGSTON, Ont., June 23.—Early this morning the Grand Orange Lodge of British America concluded its annual session. A resolution was adopted pledging their moral and financial support to Ulster, in proof of which a sum of \$5,000 is to be contributed from the treasury to the Ulster Defence Fund; in addition a collection was taken up for the safe fund and the sum of \$1,427 realized.

AUSTRIAN STRIKERS

VIENNA, June 27.—The striking railroad telegraph postal and telephone employees decided at midnight to resume work unconditionally in expectation that the government shortly would propose a remedy of the conditions against which they protest. The Vienna street car workers, however, declined a strike last night and refused to join in the settlement.

TRY THIS TRICK

Recently we received from the Old Country a weekly paper and in it we found the following paragraph about a little trick which you might like to try yourself, and then on your friends. We give it for what it is worth. Stand about eighteen inches from a wall, facing the direction parallel with the wall, with your arms hanging relaxed. Stiffen the arm next the wall and move it away from the body until the back of the hand comes into contact with the wall. Then stand firm, and press the back of the hand against the wall as hard as possible for fifteen seconds. Relax the arm, step away from the wall and this is the source of the scientist's what will happen. The observer's astonishment, the arm will slowly rise without his making any voluntary effort until it reaches an approx horizontal position; it will remain there for a few seconds and then fall back. While the phenomenon is taking place, the observer has the sensation that his arm is raised by an invisible force which is quite independent of volition.

SELLING OF DOPE IS PROFITABLE

Police Say Arrested Peddlers Has Made More Than \$400 Toronto, June 23.—That the illicit drug selling business is a most profitable enterprise in the city of Toronto was proved, following the arrest of George Stone, on a charge of keeping drugs for sale. Pursuit of a bank book carried by Stone showed that he had deposited \$378 in a local bank since his coming to the city from Montreal on June 9. In addition to this, he had some \$60, in bills and silver, cash, the police say, received by him for cocaine and morphine sold in a day. Eight checks of cocaine and morphine were found in his possession. He was arrested by Detective Water.


