THE TALE-TWISTERS.

As most of his admirers know, Rudyard Kipling, in his inimitable stories of India, wrote of the "Tale Twisters" a more or less nationally famous regiment of that country. Recognizing our vast literary inferiority to the renowned Britisher above mentioned, we humbly essay to make a few remarks about a certain regiment in this country--or rather it's vast army. Namely the army of tale-twisters. You will notice that the pronunciation is identical, but that the spelling and definition of the words are entirely different. Just as "tail-twisting" makes one think of stubborn shorthorns being forced to board a transport, so tale-twisting makes us think of thoughtless and indiscriminate gossiping, the pernicious spreading of rumors--and the imprudent carrying of tales.

Even yet, to many people, the word gossip is inseparably linked with women. This is unfair. For in this garrulous age of tale-twisting, man has succumbed to the epidemic of gossiping and now the male gossipier in his glass house can ill afford to throw stones at his lady-friend tale-twister across the way. 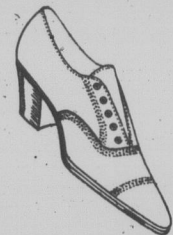

DIES OF DOG BITE

YEAR AFTER BITTEN

Rhode Island Man One of a Quartette Attacked at the Same Time.

Pasadena, R. I., June 23.—Robert Pollard, forty years old, of this town, died of hydrophobia nearly a year after he was bitten by a dog which died of rabies.

With four other men, Pollard was bitten by a dog in July of last year. The five took the Pasteur treatment. The other four felt no ill effects of their experience, but two months ago Pollard complained of illness. He submitted to treatment, but his case proved baffling to his physician and finally another doctor was called into consultation.

Recently Pollard became much worse and this week he was seized with violent spasms which convinced him of the year-old infection. He died in agony.

KEEPS SON IMPRISONED

FIVE MONTHS IN CELLAR

Syracuse, N. Y., June 23.—Herbert P. Verrier, assistant production manager of the Brown Line Gear Company of this city, was sentenced to serve five months in the Onondaga County Penitentiary after he had pleaded guilty to his wife, to a charge that they kept their five-year-old son Kenneth imprisoned for months in an old dry goods box in the coal cellar of their home, No. 102 Marlborough road, East wood, a suburb.

The boy, half starved, indescribably filthy with cellar dirt and wearing only a thin cotton shirt, was rescued from his prison two months ago by the Children's Society.

At the same time County Judge William L. Barum sentenced Mrs. Verrier to serve ten days hard labour in the same institution.

DIDN'T DISCOVER GOLD.

BUT THEY FOUND WHISKEY

New York, June 23.—The sudden rush of a crowd down Main street, Flushing, in the direction of Broadway followed by workmen excavating on the site of the old Flushing hotel. When several hundred persons had surrounded the excavation they learned that no gold had been found, but something considered by many just as good as gold, if not better, had been unearthed.

A workman, in shoveling debris out of a corner of the old cellar, had uncovered a dozen bottles containing good whiskey, of a brand popular in pre-prohibition days. This news increased the crowd, but the whiskey soon mysteriously disappeared. It was reported that some of the workmen quit early. The whiskey evidently was part of the stock of the old hotel.

ORANGEMEN FLEDGE

SUPPORT TO ULSTER

KINGSTON, Ont., June 23.—Early this morning, the Grand Orange Lodge of British America concluded its annual session. A resolution was adopted pledging their moral and financial support to Ulster, in proof of which a sum of \$5,000 is to be contributed from the treasury to the Ulster Defence Fund; in return a collection was taken up for the safe fund and the sum of \$1,427 realized.

AUSTRIAN STRIKERS

RETURN TO WORK

VIENNA, June 27.—The striking railroad telegraph postal and telephone employees decided at midnight to resume work unconditionally in expectation that the government shortly would propose a remedy of the conditions against which they protest.

The Vienna street car workers, however, declined a strike last night and refused to join in the settlement.

TRY THIS TRICK.

Recently we received from the Old Country a weekly paper and in it we found the following paragraph about a little trick which you might like to try yourself, and then show your friends. We give it for what it is worth.

Stand about eighteen inches from a wall, facing the direction parallel with the wall, with your arms hanging relaxed. Stiffen the arm next the wall and move it away from the body until the back of the hand comes into contact with the wall. Then stand firm, and press the back of the hand against the wall as hard as possible, for fifteen seconds. Relax the arm, step away from the wall and this is the trick of the scientists. Is what will happen?

To the observer's astonishment, the arm will slowly rise without his making any voluntary effort until it reaches an approx horizontal position; it will remain there for a few seconds and then fall back. While the phenomenon is taking place, the observer has the sensation that his arm is raised by an expansive force which is quite independent of volition.

SELLING OF DOPE IS PROFITABLE

Police Say Arrested Peddlers Have Made More Than \$400

Toronto, June 23.—That the illicit drug selling business is a most profitable enterprise in the city of Toronto was proved, following the arrest of George Stone, on a charge of keeping drugs for sale. In addition to this, he had some \$60, in bills and silver, cash, the police say, received by him for cocaine and morphine sold in a day. 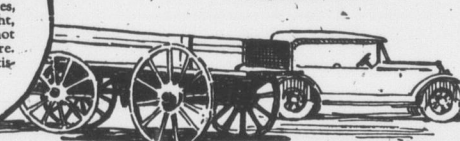

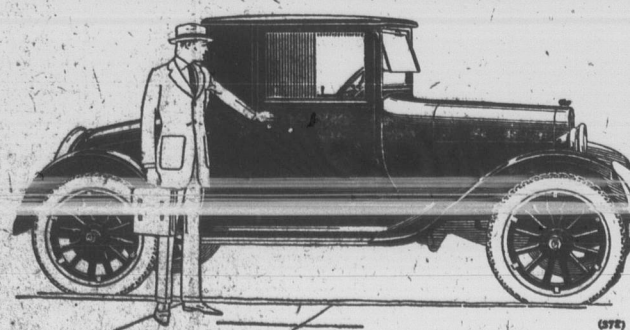

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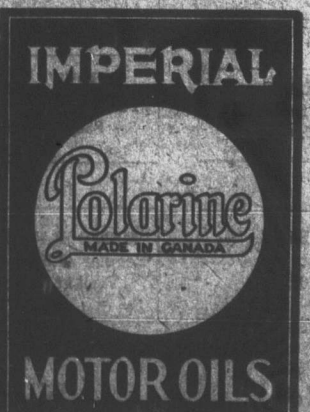
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
