FARM AND HOUSEHOLD.
—Iowa farmers are offered seven cents a pound for their butter, provided it is of extra quality.
—A combination sale of Hereford cattle was held at Chicago, June 24, resulting in an average of \$245.32 for 31 animals.
—Ten Scotch estates were offered for sale, a couple of weeks ago, but not one changed hands, and for four there was not a single bid.
—Strawberries, on which Paris-green had been blown from a neighboring potato field, have occasioned several cases of serious illness in and near Easton, Pa., within a week past.
—The number of sheep slaughtered for mutton annually, in the United States alone, is roughly estimated at 12,000,000, and from these the bulk of what is known as “pulled” wool comes.
—The first car load of new wheat received in St. Louis this year arrived on Saturday, June 20th, from Waco, Texas, and was sold on call for \$1.06. It was dirty and inspected No. 3.

—The American Consul General at Montreal has reported to the Department of State that the disease known as glanders has assumed alarming proportions among the horses of that city.
—While 50 head of cattle were huddled under a maple tree during a thunder storm Sunday, near the house of William Wiley, a mile from Springville, Erie County, N. Y., they were struck by lightning, and 19 of them were killed.
—An Albany (N. Y.) telegram says: Sixty thousand quarts of strawberries came into this market within a radius of ten miles of the city to-day. This is the largest receipt ever known in one day. The sales were at from 5 to 6 cents a quart.
—A farmer of Peacock, N. J., while ploughing recently, lost his watch out of his pocket and “turned it under.” He did not miss it until night, and next morning he commenced ploughing the ground over again, and soon ploughed it up. The watch had been under the ground eighteen hours, and was still running.

—The Maine Farmer says the chief reason for the low prices of butter and cheese this season is the falling off in export. Thus, for the week ending June 20, only 7152 pounds of butter, and 16,000 lbs. of cheese were exported, compared with last year the exports were 78,796 lbs. butter, 321,761 lbs. of cheese.
—A New Zealand Colonist named John Chambers has just invented a new system of refrigerating meat for preservation on long voyages, by the use of ammonia. It is claimed that the new method requires only about one half the amount of coal consumed in the old. The apparatus is designed for use on the large ocean steamers engaged in the most carrying trade.
—Rats and mice were long the scourge of Hawaiian farmers, but they have been successfully dealt with by the introduction of the mongoose. Thirty six pairs of this animal were imported from Jamaica two years ago into the district of Hilo, with the result of instantly clearing 4,000 acres of cane of their nuisance. One planter estimates his saving from this cause last year at \$50,000.

—A counterfeit cheese is on the market. It is known to the trade as “Chicago Flats.” The public know nothing of what it is made, only that it is sold for two cents a pound is proof that there is no milk in it. This “cheese” is shipped to cheese manufacturing centers, and is there stamped as genuine cheese, when it is sold to grocers at a low price, and by them is retailed as genuine cheese.
—The latest theory concerning Bright's disease is that affections of the kidneys that are due to the introduction of ice water and other chilled beverages. Thirty or forty years ago, a physician asserts, when people asked their thirst with fresh water from well or pump, kidney disease was virtually unknown. Now, however, the general use of ice in every household and saloon and the multiplication of soda fountains cause thousands of persons to abruptly shock their heated internal organs with freezing draughts, and kidney troubles are prevalent.

—A correspondent of the Chicago Inter-Ocean gives a recipe for the complete “cure” of sheep-killing dogs. “Nothing provokes,” says the correspondent referred to, “a man so much as to kill his dog. Whoever a sheep, of mine is killed in the pasture, I consider for the sake of peace that would have done the deed. I leave my dead sheep where I found it and place a lot of strychnine in it in order to catch the wolves when they return. By some accident I find a large number of my neighbors dogs upon the grass. My neighbors lose their dogs, and regret that their good, honest dogs should be eating poisoned meat placed in my pasture for wolves. This treatment has made a wonderful reform in dogs in my neighborhood.
—There are 60,000 trees in the streets of Washington.

Canada at the Antwerp Exhibition.
That a keen interest in Canada and her productions has been awakened among the Belgians is patent to any intelligent observer who may chance to find himself near the entrance of our Court in the Exhibition. The Englishman passes by with a smile of recognition, as much as to say “There is my little cousin Canada; I will see her again presently, when I shall have coquetted with Italy and flirted with France.” But the stolid Belgian pauses in front of the trophy of the Pacific Railway. He gazes with wondering eyes and open mouth at the mammoth potatoes. He notes admiringly the different kinds of wheat, and oats, and then affectionately regards the giant beets.

With these foretastes of material joys he presently enters the Canadian court, where eyes and mouth are more widely distended, for here he sees gold.
Gold, gold, sprang by the young man to the verge of the churchyard mound; and this, the most precious of metals, here shown encrusting in its native quartz, can be had for the mere asking! Yes, he, the Fleming, famed throughout the world for his enterprise in reclaiming a moory and sandy soil—finds in these well arranged cases the promise of a new field for his energies: a new field which shall give him a full reward for the employment of the qualities which made his forefathers rich among the nations. And further on, as he stands amazed before the rich household furniture, he sees that his forefathers were famous for their cabinet work. He sees here a bond of sympathetic union, and his eyes, lazily observant, twinkle slightly as he pictures his children settled in Canada and earning a competency in the development of a grand farming tract. Perhaps at this moment he is approached by the ever watchful Assistant Commissioner, or by the honorable gentleman who is the Delegate of the Canadian Press and speaks in his native tongue, he is told that to him Canada is not a land of unsympathetic strangers, but a country peopled by those who speak his own language, who love the customs in which he has been reared, and who obey that ancient and sacred religion which to his heart is dear. He seeks further information and this is readily afforded. Then quitting the huge glass-house with a quicker step than that with which he entered it, he wends his way northward to the Manitoba Farm.

After a careful inspection of these new wonders, he winds his way homeward to reflect on the new and happy land thus presented to his view, to contrast the Canada of today with that once a barbarous country which Voltaire stigmatized as being nothing more than “quelques arpents de neige,” made over to a hostile country by France as the ridiculously low price of a much wasted peace. Whatever Canada may have been in the past, she is now a powerful and powerful nation of the earth.

Another proof of the growing interest evinced in Canada and her doings is afforded nightly at the Antwerp Theatre Royal. Here is being performed the celebrated German ballet “Eusebio.” The piece consists of fifteen tableaux, illustrating fifteen phases of the World's progress. The ninth scene shows the Genius of Light illuminating the depths of a primeval forest. As the gloom rolls away before the all-powerful influence, a train is seen to be passing swiftly across the back of the stage; the programme informs us that this is the Canadian Pacific Railway, which thus is recognized as one of the new and potent civilizing elements. Surely this is a telling proof of the interest now awakened in Belgium's Commercial Metropolis.

Dr. Van Ermengem, of Valencia, answering questions, said:—“The epidemic now raging is the true Asiatic cholera, imported from Alicante last year; but I think it is now dying out and that the worst is over. I condemn the land quarantine utterly, but think that the quarantine, properly observed, is a sure guarantee against cholera, and much so that America need not have the cholera unless she chooses.” Dr. Farrer takes a more pessimistic view. “We have not seen the worst yet,” said he. “In places where it first broke out the cholera is diminutive, but will spread all over Spain, and from Spain all over Europe. This year it may reach only France and Belgium, perhaps Germany, but it will go even further. Koch may try to keep the epidemic out of Germany, but events will show that his precautions are powerless.”

GENERAL NEWS.
—The King of Siam has some 3,000 wives.
—There are few towns in England, under 20,000 inhabitants, which have a daily paper.
—Peaches are selling in Texas for 15 cents a bushel, but the price alone are worth 70 cents a bushel for almond meats.
—James Russell Lowell has just presented to the library of Harvard College a collection of books, numbering 688 volumes, picked up by him in the past eight years abroad.
—Gold dust has been found in Nevada in the sediment from sheep washings. Prospectors are hunting for the spot where the sheep had been rolling.
—The Patagonians are the tallest race in the world, the mean stature of adults of both sexes being 5 feet 10 inches. Men 6 feet and 3 inches in height are common among them.
—Prince Henry, of Battenberg, on the day of his marriage to the Princess Beatrice, will be invested by his royal mother-in-law with the insignia of a Knight of the Garter.

—First-class railway carriages are not in favor in Germany. One of the best lines reports a yearly average of only three first-class tickets sold for every thousand passengers.
—According to a Tennessee law, a man who is to be hanged can invite three friends to the execution. The liberal spirit on the part of Tennessee has benefited a large portion of the community.
—On June tenth last year, the best cattle were selling at the Chicago stock yards at \$6.75 to \$7.00, or fully \$1.25 per 100 lbs. higher than now. The difference in the price of hogs is equally marked, amounting to \$1.25 to 1.50.

—June 10 was the only day in the calendar of Whitaker's Almanac to which no “Important event” was assigned, and Mr. Gladstone thoughtfully sent his resignation to the Queen on that day, so that the blank might be filled.
—A Chicago hotel keeper had a man arrested for stealing a cake of soap. The man pleaded, in extenuation of his offence, that he wanted it for his collector of curiosities, it being the first cake of soap he had ever discovered in a Chicago hotel.

—Impermeable floors are now regarded as indispensable features in houses constructed on hygienic principles. They must be so treated that they cannot absorb moisture; rough places must be made smooth, and such cracks or depressions as give rise to the smallest accumulation of dust are not permissible.
—In his trip across Africa, Lieutenant Cameron met a local chief, Kasongo by name, who was followed by a large number of men, many of them mutilated simply at the caprice of their master. One of them had lost hands, nose, ears, and lips in consequence of Kasongo's fits of temper, and yet seemed to worship the ground the tyrant stood on.

—Signs are taxed five cents per letter every year in Cuba, and the ingenious Cuban does not put up a sign if he can help it, or else puts it on it an emblem, as a boot, a trunk or a cigar. If words must be employed, it is not an uncommon practice to dash a dab of paint across the lettering, producing a legal obliteration, yet leaving an inscription that can still be deciphered.
—The Maine bird catchers, who drive a thriving trade in native song birds, use a cage divided into four compartments. In one is a captive which, when taken into a field, utters a call to his wild brethren, one of whom is very likely, in flying about the cage, to enter one of the open doors, and set free a spring that shuts the door. The favorite bird is the red linnet or “redford,” which is hardy, easily contented, and a sweet singer; it mates with the canary, and an excellent cross breed is the result.
—Mr. Lowell, says the London Telegraph, goes back to the United States with the well-earned reputation of having been the best American Minister that ever represented his native country in England, or indeed in any other part of Europe, with perhaps the exception of Benjamin Franklin. The United States, it is contended, have always been served with the highest ability and efficiency by their representatives at the English court, but the salary now given to Ministers might not always secure the services of men of this exceptional class.

—“I am left alone,” writes the ex-Empress Eugenie to Monsignor Goddard, who was long her chaplain at Chislehurst, “the sole remnant of a shipwreck which proves how fragile and vain are the grandeur of this world.”
