THE SOLICITOR GENERAL.

The Scandals.

A WEEK OF CRIME AND WRONG DOING.

THE MONCTON SENSATION—A FRISKY PARSON—THE CURRIE-CRISP CASE—A BRIDGETOWN SENSATION—SUE THREES SUICIDE.

Never in the history of the Maritime provinces has the public sense been so thoroughly shocked by scandal and crime as it has been during the past two weeks. Persons in high life who were considered beyond the region of reproach have been placed on trial in the defence of charges of the gravest nature and the worst feature of it all is that the greatest guilt appears to rest upon those whose profession placed them in the position of moral custodians and teachers.

MORE EVIDENCE ON MABEL HALLETT-STEVENS CASE.

THE VERDICT.

The coroner's inquest on the death of Mabel Glendora Hallett-Stevens which occurred on January 4th was continued at Moncton on Wednesday. Mrs. Rose Landry, a French washwoman was examined and sworn in by the coroner.

Mrs. Stevens said there would be no washing done as Mabel was dead. She had washed Mabel's clothing. They were soiled only as worn linen is usually. She had once seen Mrs. Stevens strike at Mabel with a broom stick but could not say whether she struck Mabel or not. Mrs. S. had told her she had to punish Mabel for stealing and then lying about it. Mabel's maid had taken her to her room. She had once taken Mabel's meals to her in her room and Mabel told her she was not sick but had been whipped.

Agnes Shaw a servant was on the stand for four hours. She said Mabel had been unwell some time previous to her death but had not complained. The evening before her death she had been given castor oil and later she (witness) heard Mrs. Stevens go to Mabel's room and heard Mabel vomiting. THE STEVENS-NASE LETTERS.

On Friday last Mr. Leonard Nase made application for a writ to hold Rev. Dr. G. Stevens to answer a charge of libel against St. John's Church. The affidavit disclosed many facts which the public were unacquainted and some of the paragraphs of the charge were so startling that they should not be published. 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Dr. J. E. Church, who had been present at the post mortem, noticed that the tissues of the heart appeared flabby with external accumulation of fat. There was a large fibrous clot on the right side of the heart sufficient to produce death. There was very little blood in the heart or arteries. He could not say whether the cause of death with the heart of the kind described. Death would be improbable without a shock of some kind. A sudden fright or severe pain would produce the same result as physical shock. Ordinary pain would not. Judging from experience and theories laid down the best medical works, the medical man would be justified in swearing that the marks on the body of the deceased were ante mortem, except those on the face and wrists. He could not swear that the other marks were not ante mortem, but was of the opinion they were post mortem changes from decomposition. Severe pain, resembling inflammation might be caused by the passage of a gall stone.

Robert Hallett, father of the deceased child, testified to Mrs. Stevens calling on him at the Royal Hotel the night before Mabel's death about the spoon. He had promised to see Mabel, as he was satisfied she would tell the truth. He had sometimes called to see Mabel at Mrs. Stevens' house and frequently met and spoke to her. She never complained of him in any way. When Dr. Ross told him the child was dead, and that heart failure was the cause of death. He remarked: "That covers up a good many deaths." He had also asked Dr. Ross in consequence of rumors he heard that if death could have been caused by a severe blow or fright, and the doctor said it was possible.

On Monday afternoon the investigation was concluded. W. F. Best, analyst of St. John's, was on the stand and testified as to the chemical analysis of the contents of the stomach. No poison nor any substance prejudicial to human life was found in the stomach. The jury retired and after a deliberation of an hour and twenty-five minutes brought in the following verdict: "We find that Mabel Glendora Hallett-Stevens came to her death on the 4th day of November, 1892, as a result of ill treatment from Jane Stevens, the wife of H. T. Stevens."
