Washington, D. C., Feb. 8.—Great
Britain will not undertake a race with
the United States for sea power, Sir
Philip Gibbs, British war correspondent, declared today before the House
Naval Committee. Great Britain lassi't




Concubinage shall be prohibited. A single standard shall be maintained for men and women.
