The President yesterday sent to the House of Representatives the official correspondence between the Government of the United States and the Government of Great Britain touching the seal fisheries of the Behring Sea. Secretary Blaine contends that these seal fisheries had been controlled and their precedents, customs and rights established and enjoyed either by Russia or the United States for nearly a century down to 1866, when certain Canadian vessels asserted their rights to enter, and by their ruthless course to destroy the fisheries. He denies that the dispute is a three timellimit affair and claims that all friendly nations will concede to the United States the same rights and privileges on the lands and in the waters of Russia. On the part of Great Britain the documents include a number of protests against seizures of vessels, and a reply to Secretary Blaine by Lord Salisbury, who says that his Government is ready to consider a remedy if the United States has been injured by the pursuit of fur seals by British vessels on the sea, but any it would be unable on that ground to depart from a principle on which free commerce on the high seas depends.

Loss of an American Schoon

Reid Says "Protection

Themas Hastings, a middle-aged man, who has been confined in jail here since July 12 on a charge of drunkenness and disorderly conduct, and also for assaulting Emma Scott, made a most determined attempt on his life early this morning by cutting his throat. The instrument used was an unusually small pocket-knife, with which the would-be suicide inflicted two ugly wounds in his throat, one of them cutting the coating on the jugular, but fortunately not severing the artery. The man's condition was not discovered until shortly after 7 o'clock, when one of the prisoners who was up early doing chores returned to the ward in which Hastings was confined, and noticing that he was still lying on the bed face downwards, became suspicious that all was not right and gave the alarm. When the jail officials found Hastings he was very weak from loss of blood, great quantities of which had soaked into the tick and hed-clothes. Jail Surgeon Smith was summoned and has the case in hand. The man's recovery is as yet uncertain.

CHICAGO, July 24.—Amid great cheering last night the ordinance asked by the directors of the World's Fair granting the lake front as a part of the site for the exhibition was adopted by the City Council. The ordinance pledges the city to pay for any piling or filling of the lake required to the extent of \$2,000,000, and after the Fair is ended provides for the return of the made ground to the city to be used as a public park. Not less than 150 acres of the lake front are to be utilized for fair purposes. According to informal plan as much as 300 acres may be utilized.

Paris, July 24.—A reporter here had an interview yesterday with Mr. Whitelaw Reid on the McKinley Bill. Mr. Reid is represented as making the following statements: "We must go back to the war of secession to find why it was necessary to create high protective tariffs in the United States. The result of the war was the creation of fictitious manufactures and the birth of a new and powerful political party upholding protection. Socialist politicians also called for high customs duties, which they agreed would alone allow increased wages. State socialism is then the sole reason for this exaggeration of the tariffs. This considerable increase in duties resulted in frauds to the prejudice of customs. Although a bill increasing the duties is now being debated for the second time in our Senate I do not think it will be passed. If it were it would only increase the difficulties of commerce. The struggle for life which is felt more every day has started throughout the world a protectionist current, but as far as I am concerned I consider protection opposed to civilization, I do not know whether high tariffs Loss \$104,000. RAIN TO ORDER.

Faling to help the farmer by adding to his taxes, the United States Congress is about to try a novel experiment intended to assist agriculturists in certain sections and under untoward conditions. Senator Farwell of Illinois has brought forward a project for the artificial manufacture of rain. He has conceived the idea of compelling the clouds to give relief. The Senator read somewhere that the heavy artillery work on a battle field is always followed by showers, but he is the first expert on record to make a practical application of this fact. He proposes to send up small balloons in any section that happens to need rain, and these balloons are to be supplied with 25 pound cartridges of ynamite. A long fuse is to be attached to the bomb and lighted when the order is given to go. The scheme contemplates an aerial volcano that will at once arouse the clouds to a sense of responsibility. Experiments will be made in Kanasa until such Cheyenne Wednesday by imposing ceremonies.

INSURANCE EDUCATION. The July number of the Canadian Overser contains the statistical report of the upreme Lodge of the A. O. U. W., from which it appears that there are 3,859 lodges in Canada and the United States, with a total membership of 231,923, being an increase in one year of 181 lodges and 15,298 members. 



Writing Advertisements.

"Do it well or not at all," is the motto of one of America's greatest publishers. It is a good motto to apply to advertising. Not every successful business man can write a good advertisement, but there is scarcely any part of business that is more important. The following suggestions on this subject are from the pen of Allston C. Ladd: "Write your advertisement without any thought of saving words—just as you would write a letter. Then go over it and mark out superfluous words and cut out statements which you then see will not interest the reader. Then mentally place yourself in the position of a customer, as though your interests were outside of the counter rather than behind it, and consider how the advertisement would appear to you. Look carefully to see whether you have not written in too technical a vein, as a result of knowing all about goods of which your customer has but a superficial knowledge. Analyze the matter thoroughly and see if you have really written for the reader anything more than that you deal in shoes. Have you offered him an attraction in price or novelty? If you have not, you had better try again; you have simply copied your competitor. If the advertisement seems satisfactory, it is a good plan to lay it aside for a day or two, for when you again take it up the wording may not seem so attractive. For you must not overlook the fact that you are to pay good money for that advertising, and that the expenditure of that money is entitled to [as careful (consideration as is the matter of elerk hire, rent, the accuracy of your freight bill, or any other detail of your business. The difference between efficient advertising and that which is not is the difference between giving money away and making a profit (on the amount spent for the advertisement) which even the pawn-broker does not get. Careless advertising is costly at any price."
