It will be remembered that Dr. Landerkin, the Reform candidate, was declared elected by a majority of 46 by the returning officer. This majority at the recount to-day was reduced to 3. The method adopted only failed of success owing to the gains made in the polling districts, the ballots of which had not been tampered with. The ballot boxes of polling districts Nos. 1, 10, 16, 18, 21, 35 and 37 had been opened, the envelopes containing the ballots cast for Dr. Landerkin carefully opened and 26 marked ballots abstracted, the parties substituting therefor 26 ballots with forged initials, marked for Blythe, the Tory candidate. The envelopes were then rescaled and placed back in the box, which was then ready for the recount. By this dodge Blythe would have had a majority of six, but, as stated before, this majority was wiped out and Dr. Landerkin will again take his seat as representing South Grey. The envelopes bore in their backs unmitakable evidence of having been tampered with. In justice to the returning officer, Mr. G. F. McCaul, and his deputies, it must be said their declarations in all the cases not correspond with the sworn statements of the deputy returning officer, makes it imperative that they at once place themselves right with the public. That a most gross fraud was perpetrated is beyond doubt, and vigorous steps are now being taken to ferret out the guilty parties and bring them to justice. The great bulk of the Conservative party in South Grey are honest men, who are not for one moment to be associated with such work as this, and it is simply an outrage that such a man as Mr. McCaul should be placed in such a painful position through the practices of a ruffianly gang, who, if they get their just deserts, will shortly be shouting loyalty and serving her Majesty in Kingston. Jud ing the interests of the Newfoundlanders. It was perfectly true that it re-enacted old powers, but simply with a view to securing peace and averting the terrible consequence which would result from a breach thereof. SUGAR DUTIES.

After 1st April next the duty on ugar entering the United States will be taken off, and already all sugar for delivery after that date is being sold in the States at a reduction. The almost prohibitive duty imposed on refined sugar by the Dominion Government will prevent Canadians sharing in the boon of cheaper sugar thus set in motion.

The Montreal Trade Bulletin, however, gives currency to the report that the Otta-way Government "intends to make some material modifications in the duty on raw sugar as mentioned by us about four weeks ago, the proposed change being, it is said, the admission of the raw product into the Dominion free of duty the same as into the United States on and after April 1. 

stuck in the mud. He weighed at that
time 240 pounds. Cyr got under the eart

yeverything on which he could get a
good hold. Cyr is new 27 years of age,
weighs 318 pounds and stands 5 feet 11½
inches in height. He expects to become
stronger for the next ten years. He has
yellow curly hair, which falls to his
shoulders. He comes naturally by his
marvelous strength. His mother was a
powerful woman, who considered the carrying of a barrel of flour up two flight of
stairs a mere trifle. She weighed 265
pounds. His father tipped the scales at
220 pounds, but was not gifted with any
remarkable weight-lifting ability. He has
several brothers who are only ordinary
men in the matter of strength.

THE DEADLY GRIPPE

Takes a Firm Hold in Pittsburg and Allegheny. Pa.

Privisura, Pa., March 25.—From a street joke the grippe has become a generally dangerous disease. The death rate this month will break the record by the alarming increase of 50 per cent. Closing at noon, 723 deaths have occurred in ritteburg and Allegheny in the 24 days of this month. The causes given are grip-influenza, nenumenia, typhold and diphtheria. In the two cities there were 51 funerals last Sunday, and there were not half enough hearses to go around. Respectable covered wagons are used, and carriages are daily at a premium. The influenza is daily growing more severe, and now numbers nearly 50,000 victims in the dity and sub-urbs. Physicians are overworked and some have as high as 40 to 60 cases of grippe alone. It is estimated over 1,000 people are suffering with the grippe in the bowns along the Fort Wayne road. At Bellevue and West Bellevue over 2,000 cases are reported, some of which are very serious. At Ellsworth and Haysville there are over 100 cases. There are also many cases in Sewfekley, and it is estimated 600 people are confined to their homes. Reports from other towns show retults some what similar.



SALUTING WITH THE NOSE.

SALUTING WITH THE NOSE.

Singular Practice of the Inhabitants of the Dark Continent.

The junction of noses is so general, and described as so forcible in Africa and Ocoanica, as to have given rise to a fearful theorythat it had oceasioned the flattening of the noses of the people, says the popular Science Monthly. But in the accounts of the dark continent and of the islanders of New Zealand, Rotuma, Tahiti, Tonga, and other groupe, the essential action does not seem to be that of either pressure orrubbing, but the motion and pressure are sometimes no greater than that of the muzzles of two dogs making or comenting acquaintance. The pressure and rub are secondary and emphatic. The juncture only means the compliment "You smell very good." It is illustrated in the Navigator group when the noses of friends are saluted with a long and hearty rub and the explanatory words: "Good! very good! I am happy now!" The Calmucks also go through a suggestive pantomine of greeting, in which they creep on their knees to each other and then join noses, as much as possible like the two dogs before mentioned. In the Navigator islands only equals mutually rub their noses. The inferior rubs his own nose on and smells the superior's hand. The respectful greeting of Fiji is to take and smell the hand of the superior without rubbing it. In the Gambia, when the men salute the women they put the woman's hand up to their noses and smells the superior without rubbing it. In the Friendly islands noses are joined, adding the ceremony of taking the hand of the person to whom civilities are paid and rubbing it with a degree of force upon the saluter's own nose and mouth. The Mariana islanders formerly smelled at the hands of those whom they wished to tender homage. Capt. Beachy describes of the Sandwich islanders: "The lips are drawn inward between the teeth, the nostrils are distended, and the lungs are widely inflated; the face is then pushed forward, the noses brought into contact, and the ceremony concludes with a hearty rub."




