General French "Considers Prospects of Im- VICTORIA SOCIETY pending Battle Satisfactory"---Speaks of French in High Terms of Praise.

(Canadian Press.)

London, August 27.—4:12 p.m.—Premier Asquith announced in the House of Commons today that Field Marshal Sir John French, commander of the British expeditionary force, had reported that he was yesterday engaged against superior Germn forces. The British troops fought splendidly, and General French considered the prospects in the impending battle satisfactory.

Premier Asquith added: "Ceneral French speaks in high terms of the quality and efficiency of the French regular troops and their officers."

On Premier Asquith's motion the House adopted an address to King George, praying His Majesty to convey to the King of Belgium an expression of the admiration of the Parliament of Belgium's heroic resistance to the German advance.

Premier Asquith and Andrew Bonar Law, the Unionist leader, each in turn paid high tributes to Belgian bravery and the House then adopted the motion with enthusiasm.

Moving in the Lords the same address of sympathy to be given that was adopted in the Commons, the Marquis of Crewe, lord privy seal, declared: "Acts have been committed on the Belgians contrary to all the laws and usages of war. Sooner or later the Germans will have to pay for their brutal methods to the utmost farthing."

In moving this address in the House of Commons, Premier Asquith said: "We do not repent our decision in engaging in this war. The issue was one which no great nation, without undying shame, could have declined.

"Never has the duty of preserving her national independence been more bravely acknowledged and never has it been more strenuously and heroically discharged than during the last week by the Belgian king and his people," said Premier Asquith. "They have faced without flinching and against almost incalculable odds the horrors of eruption, devastation, spoliation and outrage. They have won for themselves immortal glory, we are proud of their alliance, and in the name of the United Kingdom and of the whole Empire we assure them that they may count to the end on our whole-hearted

Ontario's Gift To Be 250,000 Bags of Flour

[Special to The Advertiser.]

TORONTO, August 26 .- Ontario's aid to the Imperial Government in the war crisis will be a quarter of a million bags of flour at a cost of \$700,000. This announcement was made at the conclusion of a protracted cabinet meeting this afternoon, after which Sir James Whitney dispatched the following telegram to Sir Robert Borden:

"Pursuant to our conversations on subject of imperial aid, I now advise you that the province of Ontario has completed arrangements to supply the Imperial Government with one quarter of a million bags of flour. Kindly advise British Government.

CATCH GERMANS BETWEEN THE ANVIL AND HAMMER

[Canadian Press.]

LONDON, August 27-1:50 a.m.-"The Allies in their present entrenched positions are as the anvil to the Moscovite hammer," declared the Daily Graphic's military correspondent. "It is good news that the concentration of the allies on entrenched lines within the French frontier is complete and that the positions thus held are little less than impregnable. The Germans will find that their next move against the Allies will be much more difficult than that which confronted them a week ago. General Joffre's troops will now be devoting all their energy to a stubborn defensive. They are the anvil. The Muscovite hammer is gathering all its immense forces for a crushing blow in Posnania. Hence it is most important that the Allies' forces should stand firm.

"The hammer is doing excellently, although the preliminary work is necessarily slow on account of the Russians lack of facilities for mobil-Nevertheless the progress made thus far by Russia has exceeded the most optimistic expectations, and the Germans are liable to pay dearly for their undervaluation of the Russian efforts.

"The outstanding feature is that the hammer is well poised for action. If the anvil only stands firm the enemy must be speedily crushed between them. Here is the situation of the three-sided Russian advance: At present East Prussia is in process of being cleared of German troops while in Posen another Russian army is moving almost unopposed, and will soon be within 150 miles of Berlin. Meanwhile in Galicia the Aus trian troops are not putting up an effective resistance.





THE British people have no apologies to offer for the aggressive loyalty that exists throughout the whole of the Empire. We know that our cause is inst. "Gentlemen, we are now in a state of necessity, and necessity knows no law! Our troops have occupied Luxemburg, and perhaps (as a matter of fact, the speaker knew that Belgium had been invaded that morning) are already on Belgian soil. Gentlemen, that is contrary to the dictates of interna-

tional law. "It is true that the French government has declared at Brussels that France is willing to respect the neutrality of Belgium as long as her opponent respects it. We knew, however, that France stood ready for the invasion. France would wait, but we could not wait. A French movement upon our flank upon the lower Rhine might have been disastrous. So we were compelled to override the just protest of the Luxemburg and the Belgian

governments." "The wrong-I speak openly-that we are committing, we will endeavor to make good as soon as our military goal has been reached.

"Anybody who is threatened, as we are threatened, and if fighting for his highest possessions can have only one thought-how he is to hack his way through?"

This speech will be perhaps even more historic than the famous speeches without precedent in all the documents of warfare in the last few centuries, and it is an ominous funeral oration for the German autocracy that has issued it.

"That is no gospel for the twentieth century: hacking one's way through the world is not the last word in ethics, and those blundering admissions convict the Kaiser and his government of an infamous crime for the basest and most selfish ends. The very words are their own eternal condemnation and are a proof of the bloodguiltiness which provoked the war. They run well with the offered bribes to Great Britain to sell Belgium and the French coloniesto tear up the treaties and betray her friends

"But the world will not tolerate these things today, and has said so with a mighty voice. It has no use for any government carried on in defiance of the moral law, and is prepared to exact terrible retribution on all who go wilfully to war."





SOME SWEET SACHETS MADE AT HOME

Dainty Woman May Perfume Own Powder to Suit.

Modern woman likes scents: but she does not like all scents. She is fastidious about their use, and likes to be original in her choice of them. So sometimes she makes her own. And usually she makes one careful choice and clings to that. For instance, she likes the scent of

roses. So she has fresh roses about her house, uses rose-scented toilet powder and face powder, puts rose-scented sachets in her clothes and rose perfume of a costly sort on her handker chiefs. Or she chooses some odd, Oriental odor and uses that in everything pertaining to her toilet. Scenting toilet powder is the easiest sort of home-made perfume making to do, and this is the way to do it:

Buy rice or talcum powder, unscent-

ed, of a good quality, and put it in a tin box that has a tight cover. Then

choose the scent you want to use, and

buy some of it, in a convenient form, in the powder. One way to scent powder is to put the petals of fresh flowers in a box of powder, leave them there for two or three days, and then sift them carefully out. If the scent is not strong enough, put another batch of flower

petals in the powder. This method can best be carried out in summer, when fresh flowers, full of sweet odor, can be got more easily than they can be got at a florist's. Violet petals are good to use, and so are rose petals. Clove pinks that are highly scented give a delightful odor and so do lemon verbenas and rose ger-

aniums. A way to scent toilet powder in an original manner in the winter is to prepare a little bag of spices. There can be a foundation of pot pourri, seasoned with any desired spices or a little bit of absorbent cotton can be dosed with perfumes and filled and covered with spices and then done up in a little gauze or net bag and buried in the pow der. Bits of sandal wood can be used in the same way.
