



#### A Costly Policy. Private donations to the Toronto

General Hospital have amounted to hundreds of thousands of dollars during the past year or two, a fact which suggests whether, in view of the amazing growth of hospital expenditure in this city, it may be advisable for the ratepayers of London some day to adopt a change of policy, perhaps by following Toronto's exam-The Toronto General Hospital is not a civic institution in the same sense as our own Victoria Hospital. The former receives public patients, upon the order of the city relief department, and the city pays for these at a specified rate, just as the county of Middlesex pays for county patients in Victoria Hospital. Otherwise, the Toronto General Hospital is managed much as a private hospital would be. The city of Toronto has no financial responsibility other than paying for the charity patients.

The city of London has spent nearly \$200,000 in building and equipment. and in addition to the interest charges on this outlay, the sum required annually from the ratepayers for hospital maintenance now represents about a mill on the dollar. This is the excess of expenditure over receipts. It is doubtful whether the number of public patients cared for at Victoria Hospital today is appreciably greater than five or six years ago, or even ten years'ago. The bulk of the extraordinary expenditure has been incurred for the accommodation of paying patients, but the revenue from this class by no means balances the outgo. Many of the private patients are non-residents, to whom the ratepayers of the city are really paying a bonus. These are not conditions which have been created by any set of hospital trustees, but they are the result of an over-generous civic policy, which is becoming so burdensome as to invite serious attention.




