Portsmouth, England, Nov. 5. - A mutinous outbreak on the part of five or six hundred sailors last night necessitated the immediate mobilization of the entire force in the naval barracks here in order to prevent the affair from developing into a serious mutiny The men had assembled in the gymnasium, when the senior officer, a man of short stature, wishing to administer a reprimand for breach of discipline, ordered the front ranks to kneel so that he could see the men in the rear. The order was resented, and some of the sailors who refused to obey were arrested. Their comrades, aggrieved, ran amuck, wrecked the canteen and other premises, started to break out of barracks, with the intention of wrecking the quarters of the obnoxious ofncer, and were only prevented from so doing by the fixed bayonets of an overwhelming force. A number of the men who attempted to break out of barracks also were arrested.

On the 2,600-foot level a section half a mile long by 600 feet wide is gone, and on the 3,200-foot level a section three quarters of a mile long by 400 feet wide is sealed, and the two districts comprise very valuable producing portions of the colliery.

> The company will keep the men at work night and day in the remaining portion of the mine, both in the raising of coal and the developing of new sections, and in course of a comparatively short time the colliery will likely be producing as much coal as ever.

THEY WORK IN **BLOCKS OF TEN**

Russian Maximilists Have Most Formidable Method of Organization.

St. Petersburg. Nov. 4. - Premie Stolypin's vigorous policy of divide and rule causes considerable confusion in the scattered ranks of the revolutionaries. His action in drawing a wide distinction between the Maximilist wing of the Socialist revolutonaries and the workmen. Socialist revolutionaries drives a wedge into the mass which favors an immediate revolution by physical force.

Among the eight persons hanged for the raid on the treasury van, were ne who, it is supposed, did not actually hit anybody, but their membership in the Maximilists, who conducted the raid, and their presence on the spot with revolvers, was decided to be sufficient ground for their immediate execution.

The seizures made at the apartments of the Terrorist Rosenberg show that the Maximilists, whose title may be regarded as being derived from the policy of inflicting the maximum wreckage upon the Government, are organized units of ten. Each ten has a chief who co-operates with ten other chiefs of ten.

The chief of these latter is thus centurian with one hundred disciplined followers, although he person ally knows their ten sectional chiefs This arrangement enables raids to be planned by three or four people in a back room where they are beyond suspicion by the police and the plots are actually carried out by perhaps forty of their followers.

Rosenberg was regarded as a cen turian of the Maximilist party, as the seizure of his horses, carriages and collection of uniforms, some of which were those worn by civil dignitaries when attending receptions, showed that he had ample material for conducting revolutionary robberies and assassinations on the highest scale.

In striking contrasts to the fate of the Maximilists, the Government has treated the leaders of the revolutionary workmen's council with the utmost moderation. The prosecutor announced that he did not ask for sentences involving any kind of convict labor. The result was that fifteen leaders were sent to reside within the boundaries of some province, accompanied by their families.

NIGHT SCHOOL FOR POLICE

The Education of Many of Old London Bobbies Is Very Defective.

London, Nov. 5.—The fact, as stated by Sir Edward Henry, the chief commissioner of police, to the royal police commission, on Tuesday, that "reports of police constable are often extremely illiterate, many constable finding it difficult to write reports, owing to their defective education," has long been known to the authorities. Special police classes are held in connection with many evening continuation schools, both in London and the suburbs, the chief object being to teach illiterate members of the force how the suburbs, the chief object being to teach illiterate members of the force how to write reports on such things as street accidents, burglaries, cases of suicide and

BUILDING METHODS

STEEL PILES AND ELECTRIC PILE DRIVER USED IN NEW YORK.

Steel piles and an electric pile driver make a combination of novelties sufficiently attractive to keep a line of people all the time looking over the railing in front of the excavation for the foundation of the new addition to the Hoffman House.

These piles are channel beams of a uniform length of about 30 feet: stacked up in the excavation, the piles waiting to be driven look like a pile of structural steel. For driving they are not sharpened or pointed in any way, as wooden piles are, but a beam is hoisted up between the leads or London, Nov. 5 .- The fact, as stated by guides of the pile driver, set precisely in its proper place and position, and then simply driven down through the vielding earth to the desired depth.

As these channel steel piles are not to be used as supporting piles, they are not driven in clusters. They are driven as sheet piling, though not in square inclosing an area six feet or more in diameter. They are faced alternately in and out, so that their classroom.

RACES EXCITING

Dawson Miners Put Up Some Big Wagers on Run to White Horse Rapids.

Dawson, Y. T., Nov. 4.-Washington Star says: River steamers, like locomotives, may look alike, but they are not, Plece for piece, bolt for bolt, the Victorian was like the Canadian, and the Columbian was precisely the same, yet the two last-named steamers would each use \$100 worth of wood more on the four days run from Dawson to White Horse Rapids Naturally there was a good deal of jealousy between the crews of the three boats Not only did the Victorian beat them in the fuel record, but she outran them all and carried the "broom," which meant to all the other boats that she was the pace-

But there was some racing, nevertheess. As we were coming down the river we met one of our sister boats hung high

From this stranded boat we learned that a rival company was on the river with a fly steamer that was claiming a record of three days and something to the rapids. There were three champions on the run

In less than an hour from the time we landed our crew had wagered all their earnings on the Victorian. The Dawson papers were full of defies, and notices of thousands of dollars deposited here and there to be covered by the opposition boat and won or lost in a time race to White Horse.

With a long good-bye we steamed away on a 450-mile run to the White Horse. Each hour from the moment we left she burned a cord of wood, that cost the company \$8.

Four days and four nights she pounded away, stopping only when it was necessary to take on wood or pick up the mail at the mounted police stations. Many craft were floating down the Yukonsteamboats, rafts of logs and scows laden with freight of all sorts.

After the second day it became evident to all on board that we were not going to burn the river dry by the speed of our steamer. The general superintendent was aboard, and he seemed more interested in arranging for the new mail service than in "brooms." We stopped to haul another steamer from a sandbar. At another place we pulled a number of trees up that were being washed out and were toppling over the river. We were four days reaching the foot of Labarge, with a good 50 miles to steam before we could see the tail of White Horse Rapids. Lake Labarge is a beautiful bit of water, 30 miles long. The hills along either shore, while not high or imposing, are very pretty, and some are high enough to hold patches of snow the year round. When we had grown weary watching the mountains slip by, and the whitecaps slipping across the lake, we fell asleep, to wake at White Horse. Time from Dawson, four and a half days.




