## LORD CECIL SHOWS THE CENTRAL POWERS PROVOKED THE WAR

Makes Clean Guilt on Teutonic Powers.

WOULD NOT ARBITRATE

Minister Makes Telling Reply to Charge That England Started War.

London, Aug. 25.—"I see they again are talking in Germany about how Eng-land started the war," remarked Lord Robert Cecil, minister of blockade, in Robert Cecil, minister of blockade, in an interview with the Associated Press. "It is an old song, but I think the time has come, particularly in the United States, when it is well to restate briefly the bald facts regarding the beginning of this great conflict.

"Frankly, I do not think anyone anywhere can honestly believe that England began the war. If any person had arisen in a public assemblage in this country two weeks before the war began and asserted that in a fortnight we would be plunged into the greatest international conflict that the world has ever seen, the speaker would have been regarded by everybody as a dangerous lunatic. Our people's thoughts were the furthest possible from war and our statesmen were overwhelmingly occupied with domestic affairs, particularly the Irish question, to the almost complete exclusion of international politics.

## PETS OF KAISER PETAIN'S CATCH IN VERDUN FIGHT

arge Number of Emperor's Favorite Brandenburg Troops Taken.

On the French Front, Aug. 25.—(By the Associated Press.)—Men from the German emperor's favorite units from Brandenburg were captured in the latest French attack at Verdun. The prisoners taken in the preceding days comprise 1.145 men and 30 officers of the 20th Regiment; 1.089 men and 2 officers of the 24th Regiment; 556 men and 17 officers from the 35th Regiment. The number of officers taken was surprisingly high, showing that the morale in the higher ranks also is diminishing. The attack began early in the morning eastward from Avocourt Wood to the west of L2 Fayet, but the enemy thought the assault would occupy a larger front as the artillery was busy on both sides. When Gen. Petain's Saint Morels division went over to storm Hill 304, the Germans were taken completely by surprise, and lost ground immediately. Before time was given them to recover, the position was won, although the Frenchmen had to wade through water waist high. The prisoners rounded up were calculated at 100, while the main body of Frenchmen dashed onward through Death Ravine and attained the objectives set for them after two hours. In some places the advance reached a depth of 2,000 yards.



That a former Londoner was captured fighting with the German forces at Vimy Ridge is the statement made by Gunner William Friend, 29th Battery, in a letter to his uncle, Thomas Cook of the Richmond Hotel. While employed at Queen's Hotel here, Friend often saw the man, whom he describes in the letter, but never learned his

He was with his battery when the batch of German pusoners swung past, and was decidedly startled when somebody called out, "Hello, Billy, how's the Queen's

He described the man minutely, but Mr. Cook was unable to identify him from the description. Several Germans who left the city soon after war broke out were known around the Queen's Hotel.

The brief official recital gives little idea of the struggle which attended the storming of the Austrian stronghold on the mountain top, but it doubtless will have an important bearing on the development of the Italian campaign. ## ALL ALLIED BUYING PLACED IN CONTROL OF U.S. COMMISION

Wilson Will See That Entente Are Charged Same Prices as United States.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 25.—All British, French and Russian Government purchases in the United States will be handled by an Allied purchasing commission, composed of three American officials. The agreement providing for the commission is the initial step in the president's policy of seeing to it that the Allies get their war supplies at the same prices charged the American Government.

## SUBMARINE ROUTED BY RESCUE VESSEL

Paris, Aug. 23-(Delayed).-A French steamer went to the assistance of the American steamship Campana, which was torpedoed and sunk by a submarine on August 6. The French vassel was attacked by both torpedo and gunfire, but replied energetically and, notwithstanding losses, compelled the submarine to abandon the fight.

On the arrival at an American port this week of 46 survivors of the tanker Campana it was reported that the submarine which sank the vessel and took prisoner her captain and five of the gun crew, was destroyed on the same day by a French patrol cruiser.

### ALLIES HAVE CAPTURED 167,780 PRISONERS IN THIS YEAR'S CAMPAIGN

LONDON, Aug. 24.—The British, French, Italian and Russians have captured 167,780 war prisoners since April 9, when the 1917 campaign opened, according to a statement issued by the British war department this evening. The text of the statement reads:

THE LOCAL MARKET

Live hogs showed the largest decline

of the price of spuds before the end of the month, as practically all home-grown potatoes are ready for the dining table or the market now.

A good offering of oats was shown on the market this morning, and values declined in consequence, a hundred-weight of oats selling at from \$1.75 to \$1.85.

String beans were offered in great abundance, but the demand was ex-ceptionally brisk, and the price in-creased to 7c and 10c per quart. Toceptionally brisk, and the price increased to 7c and 10c per quart. To-matoes were offered in plenty and the demand was good. They brought \$1.25 per basket throughout the morning, which is a slight decrease from previous prices. The tomato crop is not as good as was expected this year, and the present comparative cold weather will be a detriment to their growth and ripening. Should a slight frost set in the tomato crop would practically be ruined, as the greater part of it has not yet ripened sufficiently to be offered on the market.

The variety of fruit was not large, but offerings in certain lines were abundant. Thimble berries were for sale in great plenty and the price came down to 18c and 20c per box. The demand for thimbleberries was good, but the supply so far exceeded it that a surplus was left after the close of the market.

Butter was fairly plentiful, but the price went up notwithstanding, and a pound of butter sold for 48c to 50c retail, and 44c to 48c wholesale.

A good offering of poultry was in fair demand because of the sudden cool weather. Ducks sold at 90c to \$1.10 each, and spring chickens brought 90c to \$1.50 per pair.




