# Constantine Surrenders Batteries to the Allies; Furious Fight at Athens

Greek Monarch Agrees To Meet Entente Demands While the Reservists and Royalists Battle With Allied Forces and Venizelists at the Capital-Neutral Consuls Arrange an Armistice and Entente Troops Are Withdrawn - Many Civilians Reported Killed in Bloody Encounters.

Athens, Dec. 2, 8:20 a.m.-The King of Greece has agreed to give up the artillery demanded by Admiral du Fournet. The allied troops are withdrawing

London, Dec. 2 .- After a day of terror in Athens, in which Venizelists fought Royalists and Greek troops fired upon entente forces which had been landed, according to Vice-Admiral Du Fournet, to maintain order, a truce was arranged. King Constantine finally agreed to surrender the mountain guns demanded by the Allies and the latter are withdrawing their troops, with the exception of a small

### FURIOUS FIGHTING.

Disturbances began as soon as the Allied troops were landed. Greek troops fired on the entente forces, which occupied the Zappeion, while reservists and Venizelists exchanged shots in the streets. A pitched battle between the opposing Greek forces occurred in Stadium street. The casualties have not been ascertained, but it is known several civilians were killed.

### KING SURRENDERS.

### CANADA BIG FACTOR IN PREVENTING ANY AMERICAN EMBARGO

Would Immediately Cease Exports of Logs and Pulp.

LONDON, Dec. 1 .- Under the title 'A Pacifist Dream of the Food Embargo," the Spectator argues that an American embargo would have serious consequences. It would be opposed by the American farmers and livestock traders, says the newspaper, because it would depress prices, and also the business people would be reasonably frightened by the thought of retaliatory

embargoes.
"Suppose, and it is no mere empty supposition," says the Spectator, "that the Parliament at Ottawa declared if America put an embargo on exports of iddy food to the Allied countries, they would put one on her logs and pulp. Where would the newspaper of the United States get sufficient paper to meet

increasingly uneasy about the nation's expenditure. We are trying to continue the spending of £4,000,000,000 a year, when at most we have £3,000, 000,000 to do it with. That is why the chancellor of the exchequer has not only been driven to borrow from the United States on extremely generous terms nearly all of our marketable foreign investments in order to pawn them at borrow from hand-to-mouth from bankers there in order to keep exchange rom going to a dangerously adverse

The newspaper adds that the deficit can be made up from the accumulated wealth only to a limited extent, because it is not in the form in which it can eass immediately into circulation, and, nuch more, cannot be sold to neutrals, en the prosperous United States, beuse there is a near limit to the amount that can be spared. It is argued that the aggregate public and private expenditure must be limited to a sum increasingly near the annual production, and that £500,000,000 retrenchment can be effected by the better-paid workers and those with income bove the income tax minimum
