Unless Hungary replies satisfactorily within two days the Little Entente troops will enter Hungary, the dispatch said.

WILL UNVEIL PORTRAIT

Painting of Dr. H. A. McCallum To Be Hung in New Medical Building.

Arrangements have been made for an engineer's report to be made on the approaches to the site of the proposed new College of Arts for Western University ocated on the Kingsmill farm, near the northwest city limits. This was announced at a meeting of the Western University Board of Governors, held on Wednesday afternoon. The report will be submitted at an early date.

Typhoid fever is another disease that can be prevented by vaccination. It is a serious infectious disease that lasts from four to eight weeks or longer. There are often serious complications, such as ulcers, hemorrhages or perforaion of the bowel.

The supply should be tested several times a year, and if there is thought be any danger it should be treated in the following manner: Make a solution by dissolving 15 grains of pure, fresh chlorinated lime in a quart of water Put one teaspoonful of this solution into each quart of drinking water, letting it stand for 15 minutes before drinking.
