



HOTELMEN ASK PROVINCIAL AID

London Proprietors Offer Many Suggestions To Legislature Committee.

Will Take Moving Pictures of Port Stanley and Springbank.

Many suggestions for the better ment of hotel conditions, both in this city and the province, were received Wednesday afternoon by the parliamentary committee on hotel and tourist facilities, of the Provincial Legislature, now touring the province, from the hotel proprietors of London in a round table conference in the Tecumseh Hotel.

Some dozen hotel proprietors of the city met with the committee. Under consideration were suggestions of the cash bonusing of hotels, pool license monopolies, tax exemption, near beer monopolies, the sale of 4 per cent beer and others.

It was found that the proprietors were unanimous against the return of conditions as they were during the days of the open bar.

The suggestions the committee received in London, according to Chairman Edgar Watson, were similar to those of hotel proprietors elsewhere. Previous to prohibition he stated a majority of hotel proprietors depended solely on the bar for their revenue, losing on the guests they

It was the general opinion of the hotelmen that some provision should be made to assist the hotelkeeper, not so that he would have a greater net revenue, but that his surplus would enable him to make improvements on his establishment in order to accommodate the traveling public better.

Visit Springbank.

Wednesday night the committee eft at 4:20 to visit Springbank. Thursday morning the committee will leave at 6:30 a.m. for Chatham, going from there to Windsor:

It is expected that the committee will continue two months on its tour going into every part of Ontario with its investigations.

The hotels will probably be graded according to their standards of accommodation, and later steps may be taken to compel hotelmen who are not supplying adequate accommoda-


